





The dance itself was less traditional than the one Sue described. Emily said there was only about three to four slow dances, which is similar to the number of ones at last year's Homecoming. # These stories may haunt many to the bone

Across the nation, there are countless landmarks rumored to be haunted by the spirits of those who have long since died. Some of these deaths may have happened naturally or brutally, the folklore surrounding them always on the verge of controversy. But no matter the situation, most paranormal occurrences are left unexplained.

“Spooky York, Pennsylvania” is a book written by Dinah Roseberry and Central graduate Scott D. Butcher, the latter of whom is the brother of Central’s Mrs. Debbie Bieber. The book explores places in York that are famously known, some even nationally or world wide. Featured on TV shows like Ghost Hunters and Ghost Adventures, there are quite a few attractions in York County that reel in speculating tourists, only to leave them with unanswered questions.

In the book, Roseberry begins with “City Haunts,” most interesting of which is the William Goodridge House, located on East Philadelphia Street in York City. A renowned historic landmark, it belonged to William C. Goodridge, who was “an ex-slave, born in 1805, who became a prominent businessman 1824 - 1863.”

Goodrich earned his freedom in 1822, and kept a rather low profile after the passage of the Fugitive Slave Act in 1850 that made aiding escaped

slaves a federal crime. However, there’s no doubt he hosted his home as a stop on the Underground Railroad. Goodrich died in 1873, and since then, there have been witnesses who have investigated to say he and other slaves may haunt his former home. There are stories of hearing “a soft leather-soled boot walk across the floor above” the basement when nobody else is in the house. Roseberry later explained how she also used an EVP (an electronic voice phenomena), to which she had recorded a “low monotone male voice” indistinguishably saying, “va-dum,” and she was sure it was not any other living person, animal, or street sound.

“It would seem that ghosts who frequent jail establishments have some kind of unfinished business, negative karma to work out, or are stuck without knowing how to get to ‘the other side,’” wrote Roseberry, continuing on to none other than the Old York County Prison on Chestnut Street. Most investigations in prisons do not go as well as expected. The ghosts, in a sense can be very unhappy, and they can lash out at living people who trespass onto their haunted grounds. However, these angry ghosts “want to be seen. They want to be helped.”

The Old York County Prison acted as the county’s jail from 1906 until the late 1970s, said Roseberry. The complications varied as to why it was

shut down, including poor nutrition, insect infestations, and the brutality of segregation.

With both suicides and murders that have happened in

the confines of this prison, there have been incidences of a red glow of a cigarette, without a person smoking it. “Your heart might pound a bit harder to find that, as you make your way up to the second floor and see the first cell block, two or three ghosts just may be following you,” she wrote. The building in general gives a certain aura of unsettled business.

Continuing on to the entire county instead of only the city, there are other landmarks that circulate around bigger land and bigger stories. The Seven Gates of Hell has been deemed a topic speculating whether it’s real or fiction. Roseberry said she pushed the story off until last minute, wondering if the place “actually exists.” It could be an urban legend. It could be real. It could be in a different place or ten different places.” There’s also questions surrounding where it is truly located. There may be a “Toad Road” or not—maybe it was merely a trail, or a dirt path. Long story short, it’s difficult to find the Seven Gates.

There are too many stories that come with the land. One is about an insane asylum burning down, at which the patients escaped and killed all the members of a search party out in the woods. Another involves a home with a mother, father, and baby. Mother supposedly kills baby for some unknown reason, hangs herself, and there’s an instant haunted house. There’s also a couple tales of farmers—


some killing their sons, or sons killing their fathers. There’s suicide. There’s murder. And then there’s Bigfoot . . . which is something better left unsaid.

But what most can all agree upon is the seven gates surrounding the property, and how the journey going through all of them can lead oneself straight to hell. “Word has it that no one has ever been beyond the fifth gate,” wrote Roseberry. Other legends involve seeing apparitions, hearing strange noises, watches stop working, there’s fog, and some have even had “things flown at their head.”

Next is the Accomac Inn, a restaurant located in Wrightsville. Originally the “Ferry Inn,” it served as a ferry and a hotel, owned by John Coyle, his wife, and their son, Johnny. When a woman named Emily Myers came to work for the Coyles, she was milking the cows out in the barn and Johnny proposed she marry him or he’d shoot her.

“Emily had no interest in marrying the wild young man,” Butcher wrote. “[Johnny] picked up a gun and shot her through the heart.” In 1884, Johnny was hanged for his crimes and was later buried on the property of the Accomac Inn. His grave was marked with a haunting message: “Mother Dear, Weep Not for I am not Dead but Sleeping Here.”

“Workers and guests have experienced the ghost of Johnny Coyle,” wrote Butcher. “He appears in windows, and moves plates and other items,



sometimes slamming dishes and breaking glasses.” Although the Inn is proud of their paranormal guests and often holds “ghost dinners” at the restaurant.

Lastly, saving the best and more famously known, is Rehmeier’s Hollow, including a base of an intriguing story planted in witchcraft. In 1928, Nelson Rehmeier lived peacefully in his two-story home, practicing the work of “powwow,” which is a type of shamanic healing. Powwow also has a literal meaning of “one who has visions” and “spiritual leader.”

However, soon enough, with Rehmeier’s name traveling about the area, a man named John Blymire believed wholeheartedly that Rehmeier placed a curse on him. John was then willing to do whatever it took to “lift” the curse. Along with two other men, Blymire broke into Rehmeier’s house to strangle

and beat him to death, originally coming for the book of spells and a lock of Rehmeier’s hair. They then attempted to cover up their crime by setting the body on fire. Somehow the flames blew out, leaving the house standing, and there was fortunately enough evidence of Rehmeier’s mutilated body to charge the men, soon to be known as the “York Hex Slayers.” Now, Rehmeier’s spirit is supposedly haunting his lonesome home as well as the road it sits on.

These five supposedly haunted locations in York belong to the county itself, secrets kept in the safe as to what exactly happened in the past. The stories are conspiracy and theory. No one will ever know the true tales that intertwine with these specific lands. Skeptics are still on the fence, historians are still digging deeper, and those who want hands-on experiences are making the journey to investigate more of what cannot be explained. As they say, you can always enter at your own risk.



Nowadays seeing a movie on the big screen involves more thinking than it should, so it's important to make the best decision possible.

With most movie theatres costing as high as \$10.70 (for a regular ticket), it begs the question, should more people consider going to the slightly less expensive drive-ins (while seeing two movies and not just one) during the summer?

But with the sometimes poor quality of films that the drive-ins offer, it must be asked, are the lower prices and family fun worth it?

The closest place for

someone in York to go to the drive-ins is Haar's on Logan Road, in Dillsburg. Tickets are \$8 for ages 12 and up and \$2 for ages 3-11. They will play a movie for kids and then usually play a PG-13 movie for teens and adults.

Luke Rohrbaugh, 17, has been a fan of the drive-ins since he was a little kid.

"It's so unique, and there's nothing that compares to it," said the senior.

Rohrbaugh appreciates the refreshing, different way of viewing movies. "It's mid-century technology," he said, "and it's stuff that has become obsolete for today." This just makes Rohrbaugh enjoy going to the drive-ins even more.

Rohrbaugh thinks people

will have more fun at the drive-ins. "At the drive-ins there's more room [for kids] to run around and have fun. Kids don't have to sit in the same spot the entire time."

Rohrbaugh is disappointed that the drive-ins are slowly dying. He realizes that with the fewer locations, people won't want to drive farther distances and in turn choose to go to the theatre.

To get more people to go to the drive-ins, Rohrbaugh thinks they should play classic, older movies.

"If they played films like *The Empire Strikes Back*, *The Godfather* or *Back to the Future*, I think they would bring in a lot of revenue."

The major movie theatres in York are Regal West Manchester

and Frank Theatres.

Regal is at the West Manchester Town Center. Prices for a standard viewing are \$8.95 for children and \$10.70 for adults. The price for a 3D ticket for children is \$11.45, and it's \$13.20 for adults.

Frank Theatres is in the Queensgate Shopping Center. The price for a standard ticket for children is \$8.50, and \$10 for adults. To buy an IMAX ticket, it costs \$15 for children and \$17 for adults. A D-Box ticket cost \$16.50 for children and \$18 for adults.

Senior Carter Grimm, prefers Regal over Frank's, except while watching IMAX. He is a huge fan of going to the theatres, and goes at least once every two months.

"It definitely adds to

the experience of a movie," said Grimm.

For Grimm, seeing *Star Wars: The Force Awakens* at midnight, on opening night, was the greatest experience he's had at the movie theaters.

"It was the closest thing to a religious experience that I've ever had in my life," said Grimm. "It was blizzarding outside, and everyone showed up in some type of [Star Wars] outfit," said Grimm. "People of different backgrounds and age groups, and everyone was silent the entire time, unless everyone was cheering."




8. Addams Family Values: The Addams family tries to rescue their beloved uncle Fester from his alleged true love, Debbie, who just happens to be the new family babysitter.




7. Sleepy Hollow: Ichabod Crane is shipped down to the mysterious old-fashioned town of Sleepy Hollow to investigate
