Our Pastor's Article

This past weekend I had the joy of watching my 11 year old son play four lacrosse games in a provincial qualifying tournament. They needed to win three of the four games to move on to the provincial championship tournament. Ultimately, they won two of the four games ... their season is over. However, I'm not writing about their record. I want to focus on something much more important.

Over the course of two days and four games I was able to see something absolutely wonderful. I saw a group of about 12 boys who are part of a team and recognize the value of playing together as a team. This is a group of boys of various backgrounds who come together for something they love (lacrosse) and who work together to bring out the best in each other and the team. Sure, there are some who like to get the glory of a beautiful goal or a good (and fair) hit, but overall they are committed to working together for the larger purpose of their team ... to play well and to achieve their collective goals (in this case, winning individual games and ultimately the tournaments they have played in).

As I watched (within a very hot and very very stinky arena – the result of hundreds of sweaty boys over a weekend), I thought about the church, particularly our church. No, I don't mean the heat or the smell, though yesterday was particularly hot in the sanctuary. I mean the way LABC has diverse people learning to work together to achieve the goals that are laid out for us or we have discerned are our calling as Christians and as people of faith at LABC.

LABC has a lot of very gifted people. This means that in some cases our division of labor falls along very specific lines. We have preachers and teachers and leaders and builders and helpers and prayers and ... you get the idea. There is a place for everyone on the team at LABC. We are willing to work together and support one another in good times and in struggles. There are times that we together succeed, and there are times that we fail.

That being said, when we are down, we are willing to refocus on the goals at hand and work together to get back up and try again; to reevaluate what may have gone wrong and to look for a new approach that may have greater success in the future.

Obviously there are differences between a lacrosse team and a church. I'm not trying to say they are exactly the same. What I am suggesting is that many of the values of a successful team may also be seen in a faithful and obedient church, full of people working together for the good of the whole, the good of the community, and the glory of God.

I encourage you all to take a look at two things. First, look at yourself and ask what role you can and do play on the team we call the church. Second, look around and ask yourselves, what can I do to help my teammates called the congregation to be the best they can be? Perhaps it's a word of encouragement, a helpful hand, or a simple smile.

My son lost the tournament with his team, but they won at having a successful year together. Their success had nothing to do with their record and everything to do with their success as a team, a group of people together doing something bigger than themselves. We too at LABC are a team, working together for the glory of God and the love of the world.

INTERNET SAFETY TIPS FOR SENIORS (AND ALL OF US!)

Thanks to today's technological advances and the relative ease of getting online, we are able to learn new things instantly, check for random weather changes, reconnect with old friends, and check our bank account statements all in the comfort of our own homes.

For many seniors, avoiding the computer isn't an option and they don't seem bothered with the technical details of a computer. They dive right in to master tasks such as saving and printing a document, receiving an email and browsing the World Wide Web. Seniors have discovered that this "new" technology is able to enhance and simplify their lives.

BE SAVVY ABOUT ONLINE FRAUD AND SCAMS

Not only do seniors these days manage their money on the net, play games and order their groceries, some have become bolder and have searched for a soulmate online. There are plenty of dating clubs on the internet geared specifically towards senior citizens.

But what about internet safety tips for seniors who are newbies to the online experience? After all, seniors didn't grow up with computers and aren't aware of scams, online fraud, identity theft and spam that they'll soon encounter. Seniors many times aren't aware of the fact that you can't be handing out your home phone number and street address to all those who enter your orbit on the internet. For seniors it may seem as harmless as leaving a business card with someone interested in your products and services, but on the internet it can come with unpleasant dimensions.

PROTECTING YOURSELF AND YOUR LOVED ONE FROM THE PERILS OF THE WEB.

If you are computer savvy, don't allow your mom and dad's unfamiliarity with the web to be a barrier to them enjoying a safe experience while surfing the net. There are some simple but effective internet safety tips for seniors that will protect them against online threats.

In fact, these basic precautionary measures will benefit anyone who uses the computer.

- Make sure the computer has security software on it and also check that the auto-update feature is enabled to ensure your computer has the latest security.
- Passwords need to be unique and strong these passwords need to be made up of upper and lower case letters as well as numbers. Never reveal your password to anyone online. Passwords are an excellent guarantee of safety and security online.
- •Post with caution on social networking sites. It is a good idea to also understand how privacy settings work on social networks.
- Don't automatically install a software because it is free
 these types of software are generally riddled with spyware which can slow or crash your computer.
- •Attachments can contain a virus and the virus can be transmitted to your computer just as soon as you open the attachment. Be wary of suspect attachments, even from people you may know. If an email or attachment seems suspicious, don't open it. Online criminals often use email to get personal information from you in order to steal your identity. Sometimes these emails will invite you to click a link which downloads malware to your computer.
- •Although online banking is very convenient for seniors, be sure to only enter information into security-enabled sites. Sites for instance which begin with https:// means that the data is encrypted in transit. Look out for this and don't enter any bank details or credit card information into websites that start only with http://. (which doesn't have an "s")
- Emotional abuse is as rife online as it is elsewhere. It is best not to satisfy the abuser with any kind of response.

DON'T VENTURE ONTO THE INTERNET WITHOUT PRECAUTIONARY MEASURES

The internet holds enormous benefits for seniors, but even though the internet is a useful tool, there are dangers which come with its use. If you are a seasoned internet surfer, do inform your loved one of the nasty side of the internet. They need to use it wisely to ensure it remains an exciting medium of communication for them.
