met Father Christmas at our Historic Holiday Houses event, then you've met Dick Williams! Along with being an active docent, Dick also currently serves on the board of directors for the GDPA. But Dick's memories of the park go way back to his early years as an 8 year old scout. He has fond memories of Coloma while growing up visiting the park with his family back int he 50's and 60's. Dick moved out of state in 1965 but when he returned some thirty years later, he recalls returning to the park and feeling like it was "old home week". Then around 2004 his church pioneer group began visiting on a regular basis. In 2009 Ranger Mark Mikalski suggested they take the docent training program. It was around that time that the group received permission to open the Mill Workers Cabin for various activities.

Dick enjoys conducting presentations at the cabin presenting the history of the original sawmill and worker's cabin and weaving stories of Coloma pioneers and the gold discovery- something Dick says is always a pleasurable occasion. He loves to see the light in park visitors eyes when they catch the vision for what happened here.

Dick's ancestry comes from the English and Welsh. It was some of these ancestors who helped develop a cattle trail originating near Elko, Nevada crossing over the Sierras into the San Joaquin Valley. Many year's ago Dick had the honor of helping organize an international committee that studied the early travels of the trappers throughout Canada obtaining much of his research from the historical Hudson Bay Company archives. Dick says, "I suppose you could describe me as a fella always wanting to see what was over the hill".

Dick attended college in Sacramento and earned a BA in Sociology with specialization in Law

Enforcement, however his business path led into the food industry both in production and management levels. He married Sandy - his childhood sweetheart - and together they have some wonderful kids. They have two sons from Sandy's first marriage and one son and three daughters from Dick's first marriage. Two of their daughters are adopted and are Native Americans. Dick is proud of the fact that years ago, he was formally adopted into the Oglala Tribe of the Sioux Nation.

Since the park is always involved with repairs and maintenance of buildings and the surrounding park grounds, financing is a major factor in protecting various building sites from further decay. Educating the general public and seeking out those individuals and or, businesses that are willing to assist in the re-hab transformations is always a challenge. Dick says, "This is the work we do as a GDPA association and I'm proud to be a part of it." Dick has always loved the peaceful setting seeing the deer in the early hours or in the evening and wishes he lived closer to the Park so he could spend more time as a volunteer. It's a true labor of love.

TREASURED ITEMS PRESERVED

As the American River Conservancy gears up for their very special event in June 2019 to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the Wakamatsu Colony, the park is also gearing up for our contribution to the event. Back in 2001 the Veerkamp family decided that State Parks (more specifically Marshall Gold) would be the best place to keep some treasured items that once belonged to the Wakamatsu Tea and Silk Colony, so they donat-

ed them to the park. These items included the Colony banner and a Tanto (small dagger set). These

items had been kept safe with the Veerkamp family over generations. The Veerkamps, played a major role in the story of the Wakamatsu, with Francis Veerkamp purchasing the property and a farmhouse there after the colonists had stopped farming due to their financial backing drying up.

For many years the banner and Tanto were kept down in the Sacramento Archives until the new Statewide Museum Collections Center (SMCC) was designed as the home for State Parks to keep their valuable collections. These items were brought out once a year and put on display when the Wakamatsu would host an event. Now,

with this great event coming up it was decided that both the banner and the Tanto could use some

cleaning and conservation as a lasting way to protect them when they are displayed. Park staff along with help from staff at SMCC decided that once the preservation was complete, they would be placed in an artifact friendly frame for the banner and case for the Tanto (which are being built specifically for these pieces) so they can be viewed from all sides when displayed. The Tanto too needed a good cleaning and a small piece that had broken off over the years that needed to be reattached.

Both the work on the banner and Tanto has all been funded by the GDPA who heartily agreed that this was a very important project to protect these priceless





items from falling into disrepair resulting in their loss. Both items are in the conservation process as we speak! We all look forward to seeing the end result to see them properly displayed at the Wakamatsu event next June! The value of the work the GDPA (our wonderful Cooperating Association) does to raise funds for projects can be seen and appreciated especially at times like this. The association understands the park mission of protecting and preserving what we have for our future generations and we are grateful for their continued support. We will keep everyone updated as the work is completed and we are able to display these items once again. Remember to save the date for WakamatsuFest150 which will be held June 6-9, 2019. A Sawmill A Wise and Wonderful Investment

Many much needed projects are moving forward because Marshall Gold has been able to purchase a Wood-Mizer sawmill. The addition of the mill has given our park the ability to make use of the massive stock pile of downed trees. The mill is able to cut logs up to 36" around and 20' long. Park Maintenance and volunteers have already begun to cut and stockpile lumber which is being used for different projects.

Superintendent Barry Smith frequently invites state parks representatives from District and other state parks to tour our park. In doing so, he is able to not only impress

them with the progress and improvements which are being made here, but also to give them insight into some of the areas where we have needs.

A piece of equipment, like the sawmill, can be used as well for district purposes. Folsom has recently requested some full dimensional lumber for one of their projects which we were able to cut on our mill and supply it to them.

In the past, the GDPA has worked together with MGDSHP to make arrangements to transport logs to be milled by someone who lives locally and owns a sawmill. With our own mill, we no longer need to pay for the milling of lumber. Superintendent Smith says that we have already milled the equivalent of the cost of the mill.
















Rennovation & Reorganization

The carpenter's shop sits below the road near the Blacksmith shop. Here is where all the wood working projects take place. If you have stepped inside the carpenter shop in the past you would have viewed a much different scene. Park staff found it challenging to work in a shop that was cluttered and unorganized as well as lacking in the proper tools and machinery. They didn't realize just how limited they were until Pat and Barry stepped in to make needed improvements. Under the direction, drive, and vision of both Pat Metcalf (head of Maintenance) and Superintendent Barry Smith - the shop has taken on new life. Bob Silva says, "We've seen more happen in the past three years than we did in the first seven I've been here!"


As you can see by the photos, the shop has undergone some great improvements. Everywhere you look you can see that tools, paint, and different items used for projects are all neatly organized on shelves, toolboxes, and pegboard walls. The area is open so they can freely move about while working.

The improvements are a work in progress and sort of evolving as they realize what they need or think of ways they can improve the shop. Instead of feeling frustrated (like their hands are tied), they can move ahead with projects. Some of the tools and equipment the park has added to the carpenter shop are: a vacuum dust collector, an air compressor, drill press, drum sander, a resaw (which is an overgrown band saw) and a router. The electrical in the building has also been upgraded as well as the lighting. As funds become available and approved by State Parks, next on their "wish list" are a joiner and a moulder / planer.

These tools help our guys do things from fixing fencing, decks and steps, siding on buildings, - to building rough sawn furniture like the tables you see over in the gold panning area (thanks to volunteer Don Sauer) and the fine cupboard display in the Gold Rush Mercantile (thanks to Dave Teves) ...and that's just a small list of projects! In fact, Dave is currently working on two large slab signs for CGRL for the entrances to Tent Town.

Barry, Pat, Bob & Dave are still working on future solutions to make the shop more comfortable to work in during times of extreme weather. They have a woodstove in one corner as well as a swamp cooler, but they'd like to possibly insulate the ceiling and a whole house fan.

With a big smile on his face, Dave exclaimed when speaking of the shop, "Miracles have been happening."











Like Bob Silva, Dave Teves has also been with Marshall Gold for about ten years. He is the main woodworking guy in the Maintenance Department. Dave is in his element here in the carpenter's shop. He says he's had an interest in woodworking since high school when he wanted to finish the body work on the wood frame of his 1928 Chevy. He was, instead, sent to the metal shop where he learned to be an automotive machinist and later became a heavy equipment mechanic. Now, skilled in many areas, Dave is enjoying doing what he loves and has created some amazing pieces for the park!

A few examples of some of the various projects taking shape around the park: pictured (above middle) the new steps trailing down behind the Blacksmith shop. Compare these to the old steps off the back of The Monroe House which have yet to be replaced. The new steps and rail are on the list of upcoming projects which will add safety and stability to the structure. And pictured (upper right) is the new fence built around the Post Office.

The carpenter shop has a new electrical panel box and hose reel (middle center). Park staff have been working hard to decipher old maps and have discovered where the irrigation pipes are located. A new water main has been installed with a rough sawn wood enclosure surrounding it. (Middle right) Barry Smith shows us the "before" and "after" tables in the gold panning area. Thank you Don Sauer for your time and talent in making these new tables! All of these projects are done with lumber milled on our new sawmill.




Happy Birthday Barry
