Title: Civil Rights Protections for transgender people

Purpose: To ensure equality and access for transgender people

Whereas, the International Association of Official Human Rights Agencies (IAOHRA) is a professional association of over 140 state, county and city governmental human rights commissions in the United States of America and Canada; and

Whereas, IAOHRA goals are "to foster human and intergroup relations, to enhance human rights practices under law, and to promote civil and human rights around the world; and

Whereas, IAOHRA envisions a world community where justice and equality prevail and all people appreciate and, accept differences celebrate diversity, and live in peace and harmony; and

Whereas, IAOHRA's mission is to promote civil and human rights for all people around the world; and

Whereas, The states of California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Illinois, Iowa, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, Oregon, Rhode Island, Vermont, Washington and the District of Columbia all have laws that protect the rights of transgender people in housing, employment and places of public accommodations.

Whereas, on Friday, May 13, 2016, the United States Department of Justice issued a letter stating that elementary and secondary schools must allow students to use the gender segregated facilities that corresponds with their gender identity or lose federal funding; and

Whereas, Several states are suing the United States of America, based on speculation that the Department of Justice's letter will cause irreparable harm; and

Whereas, There is no evidence that allowing transgender people to use the gender segregated facility that corresponds with their gender identity has increased sexual assaults and violence against women and children; and

Whereas, there is evidence that forcing transgender people to use the gender segregated facility that corresponds with the biological sex at birth increases the risk of sexual assault and violence against transgender people; and

Therefore, be it resolved, that IAOHRA supports civil rights protections for transgender people and the cities, counties, states and government entities that create those laws.

Title: Indigenous Peoples' Day

Purpose: To Replace Columbus Day with Indigenous Peoples' Day

Whereas, the International Association of Official Human Rights Agencies (IAOHRA) is a professional association of over 140 state, county and city governmental human rights commissions in the United States of America and Canada; and

Whereas, IAOHRA goals are "to foster human and intergroup relations, to enhance human rights practices under law, and to promote civil and human rights around the world; and

Whereas, Columbus Day became a federal holiday in 1937; and

Whereas, in 1990, representatives from 120 Indigenous nations at the First Continental Conference on 500 Years of Indian Resistance unanimously passed a resolution to change Columbus Day into a day to strengthen unity and to provide an accurate historical record; and

Whereas, the United States endorsed the United Nations Declaration on December 16, 2010, which recognizes that Indigenous People have suffered from historic injustices; and

Whereas, August 26, 2013, IAOHRA, passed an International Human Rights resolution, "To promote and encourage a broader understanding of international human rights" as articulated in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights; and

Whereas, IAOHRA opposes systemic racism towards Indigenous People; and

Whereas, at least nine cities in the United States have replaced Columbus Day with Indigenous Peoples' Day: and

Whereas, we all walk upon the traditional lands of Indigenous People who have inhabited the Americas since time immemorial; and

Whereas, Columbus' first voyage to the Americas initiated the slave trade and his second visit began the genocide of Indigenous People; and

Whereas, Columbus Day should be replaced by Indigenous Peoples' Day, a day to reflect upon the continued struggles of Indigenous People, recognize the contributions of Indigenous People of this great nation and celebrate a rich culture.

Therefore, be it resolved, that IAOHRA recognizes the second Monday in October as Indigenous Peoples Day.

Therefore, be it further resolved, that IAOHRA encourages other governments, institutions and businesses to recognize Indigenous Peoples Day;
