

Other opportunities from Constance Creek Wildlife Refuge

Educational Farm Tours

Enjoy hands-on interactions with the gentle farm animals. Tours can be arranged to fit your schedule by sending an email to visit@ccwr.ca. Volunteers will introduce you to CCWR's resident 4-legged personalities and let you know how each animal is unique and interesting. Tours last between 30 minutes and 1 ½ hours. A donation of \$2 to \$5 per person is recommended.

Mobile Farm

Let the CCWR farm animals come to you! A small group of animals can visit your location for hands-on interactions and animal welfare education. Arrange a visit by emailing visit@ccwr.ca. The minimum cost for a visit is \$200 which includes transportation and set-up plus a 1 hour interactive visit. There are additional costs for travel expenses and extra time.

Special Workshops

The topics covered in our Summer Camp can be conducted as independent workshops. Sign up a group for a single day or half-day of interactive learning on a specific animal welfare topic customized to meet your goals. Email workshops@ccwr.ca to discuss.

We're All Animals is a camp for young people providing them with opportunities to explore their fascination with animals. Camp participants are encouraged to think of each animal's feelings and needs instead of what humans want from the animals.

Suggested Rates and Subsidies

Camp Outline



Each day includes general farm animal care, exploration of life around the creek, a craft/art session and a cooling off time in the sprinkler.



Children should be prepared to spend the entire day outside. They should come with a hat, sunscreen, a water bottle, rubber boots, a change of clothes for in the sprinkler and clothing that covers their arms and legs. A packed lunch and snack must be brought and can be stored in a fridge at CCWR. Drinking water will be available.



Monday:

Small animal care – Degus, Rabbits and Chickens

Children will learn about the housing, nutrition, exercise and social needs of these animals. They will practice ways to have positive interactions with our tame animals and will learn to appreciate their personalities. Small animal wildlife issues will also be discussed.



Tuesday:

Learning about Pigs and Goats.

Children will meet our resident rescued potbellied pig and gentle goats. They will see how each animal has its own personality and will learn how to enjoy connecting to these interesting friends.



Wednesday:

Guard Animals - Donkeys and alpacas

Our resident donkeys and alpacas provide unique opportunities for children to learn about the animal's perspective and what these interesting creatures have to offer their human friends.



Thursday:

Horse and Pony care

Children will learn about horse care including the social needs of horses, grooming, feeding and safety.



Friday:

Being a friend to Wildlife

With the aid of stuffed animal versions of wildlife, children will be presented with scenarios to explore when an animal needs our help and when to leave it alone. Topics include enjoying wildlife while keeping safe, the problems of taming wildlife, how wild animals enhance our lives and the balance of nature.



Camp Leaders

Our leaders have CPR and First Aid Certification.
