This day celebrates the social, political and economic achievements of women, while focusing world attention on areas requiring further action.

1. ROME UPDATES

1.1. Pope Francis' Prayer Intentions for the Month of March. The Pope's universal prayer intention for March is "*that all cultures may respect the rights and dignity of women.*" Let us pray that the Pope's intention be realized, that we "[...] create still broader opportunities for a more incisive female presence in the Church. Because "the feminine genius is needed in all expressions in the life of society, the presence of women must also be guaranteed in the workplace" and "in the various other settings where important decisions are made, both in the Church and in social structures". (Cfr. *Evangelii Gaudium* # 103)

1.2. Pope Francis' Lenten Message. This was presented on February 4th 2014 in the Vatican and it is strongly JPIC in tone typical of Pope Bergoglio, calling for concern for those "who live in material, moral and spiritual destitution." The title of the message taken from 1Cor. 8:9 invites us to "imitate Christ who became poor and enriched us by his poverty." Lent is a fitting time for self-denial; we would do well to ask ourselves what we can give up in order to help and enrich others by our own poverty. 2.1. March is Women's History Month. 2.2. Neema Namadamu a Visionary Game Changer. Neema Namadamu is a Congolese woman from the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) who defines herself to be a "Visionary Game changer." She has founded many projects and organizations, starting with *Maman Shujaa*, a national woman's group, which means "Hero Women." She also started The Synergy of Congolese Women's Associations (SAFEKO) as an association of local women-led associations that work together toward women's empowerment and community development. Her life story is worth reading and it resonates well with the 2014 International Women's Day theme: "Inspiring Change." 2.4. Economic Justice Issues

2.4.1. The World Could Face War and Terror Over Water Shortages. On January 17, scientists collected findings among the small groups of researchers who track the world water reserves. The findings show that the world water reserves are running low in a world where water is increasingly in short supply because of growing demands from agriculture, an expanding population, energy production and climate change. Analysts believe that this will cause instability and state failure, increase regional tensions, and distract countries with shortages from working with the United States. 2.5. International Year of Family Farming and Agriculture

2.5.1. The 5th Global Farmers' Forum Calls for Greater Support to Smallholder Family Farmers. More than 90 leaders of national and regional organizations representing hundreds of millions of smallholder farmers, fishers, pastoralists and rural producers globally, gathered at the headquarters of the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) for the 5th Global Meeting of the Farmers' Forum on February 17–20, in conjunction with the 37th session of IFAD's Governing Council held on February 19–20. They called on IFAD and governments to provide greater support to smallholder family farmers around the world. Louisa Huni-Dadzie, SHCJ recommends the most recent United Nations Report (February 2014) and the annual U.S. report (February 2014) on human trafficking which provides the best updated information for what is happening in the Americas (USA, Canada, Mexico, Central America, South America). While this report is very comprehensive, the majority of photos represent situations of trafficking in countries *other than* the United States. You keep looking for a truck stop or a field of produce to be picked or a slaughterhouse or a restaurant dishwashing area—all possible locations for trafficking in the USA.
