## Bonita Bay Community Association

Board of Directors Meeting - March 10, 2016

**IN ATTENDANCE** were Board members Chris Corrie, Bruce Mohl, Dave Eckrich, Jack Palmer and Rod McKenzie.

President Dave Eckrich greeted approximately 50 attendees and began the meeting by stating that this would be the last meeting that Bruce Mohl would be seated on the Board. Bruce's term of office is complete as of March 24 at which time the new member of the Board will be announced at the Annual Meeting (SEE PAGE 21). Dave thanked Bruce for his invaluable service to the Community.

Eckrich noted a Leadership Meeting attended by HOA presidents was held on March 1 in order to update the group on Community matters. He also mentioned a major accident occurred just outside BB main gate when an automobile exiting the Community was struck by a dump truck. Fortunately there was no loss of life, but the take-away lesson is: be a defensive driver in this very busy time of year in SWF.

Treasurer Jack Palmer indicated that a full budget report will be available for the meeting on March 24.

A question of liability was brought up in cases where a car is struck by the automatic gate arm as it comes down as cars enter and leave the community. It occurred three times in the past month and was determined through video monitoring that the liability goes to the automobile owner. Beware of the warning: "Stop - One Car At a Time".

Manager Robin Leete reported that new beach chairs have been ordered because of storm damage to existing chairs this season. The new design will be raised in height for ease and comfort when getting in and out of lounge chairs.

Design Review Committee Jerry McPherson reported receiving 65 submissions of which 56 were approved, 4 not approved and 5 pending. Board Member Chris Corrie asked McPherson the process by which mangroves in Bayview I

## Meet William Logan, Normandy Vet

*THE D-DAY INVASION* had finally started. William Logan, a 23-year-old from Massachusetts with his Seabee battalion, moved the large floating pontoon causeways deliberately toward shore. Pushed by LSTs (Land Ship Tanks) as barriers were cleared one by one, the enormous barges were pushed up onto the beach to form landing causeways. Logan drove the large Caterpillar D6 dozer onto the beach, using heavy cable to anchor his causeway. Then, returning to the pontoon causeway, he directed a continuing stream of LST cargo over the causeway to unload tanks, ammunition, fuel, food, medical supplies and other materials of war - for days, for weeks, for months. His causeway, and others, were the initial supply route for the battle for Europe.

Logan says, "It's amazing how long you can go without sleep and food. We knew we had a job to do. We worked, ate and slept for a few hours at a time on the causeway, and there was no relief. We were the source of supply until harbors and airstrips were able to move cargo." Periodically targeted by enemy machine gun and artillery fire, "We just dove for cover wherever we could, and waited for the firing to end," says Logan.



# Who's Who in Bonita Bay

## Kay Crosby Wall

**WHEN KAY CROSBY** went for her first interview in New York City in the 60's, she wore a power suit; her hair was lifted into a French twist, and she donned white gloves. She was at the front of a long line of women to start her career in a man's world, balance work and home life and fight her way to the top. There were no role models, no mentors. It didn't come easy.



Kay pursued a career at the right time and in the right place. She was at the leading edge of women from a new generation. She put off marriage and family and ran with her career. She traveled regularly to major cities, became accustomed to being the only woman in the room and learned the tricks of single travel by trial and error. "Thank heavens for room service," she says.

Kay was born in West Virginia but raised in Connecticut. She attended Wheaton College near Boston and headed to NYC when she graduated. She was a logic/philosophy major but realized those fields offered little employability. So the summer before her senior year, she took courses in programming – FORTRAN, to be exact. She applied for jobs in what is now referred to as the tech industry. She was in a sea of men and kept landing jobs that most people didn't even know existed.

J Walter Thompson and Young & Rubicam were two of the early adaptors of computer technology in the advertising industry. They collected data, analyzed it and sold it to their customers. So Kay went that direction. And when several of the pioneers broke from the agencies to form their own syndicated services, Kay went with them. When you are one of four in a small start-up that makes it big, you shoot to the top. She was an Executive VP just three years out of college.

Fast forward eight years. She joined Simmons Market Research Bureau – the "Nielsen ratings" of the magazine industry. In nothing flat, she was named President of Syndicated Services, responsible for researching readership, buying habits, demographics, product consumption.

Kay Crosby met her husband Peter Wall when she was 17 and living in Darien, CT. They attended neighboring high schools but were several years apart. They dated, on and off again. She was 37 when they married. Not exactly a whirlwind courtship. They had a son Andy, and raised him in Connecticut. She commuted to the City. She had it all.

When Andy was 5, she decided to stay home. But she didn't rest on her laurels. Once a Type A, always a Type A.

She tutored; became President of the PTA; founded Save Our Schools, promoting academic excellence in NY/NJ/CT public schools; served as board member for the Children's Educational Opportunity Foundation; and inundated herself in civic activities, including serving on Greenwich's Representative Town Meeting.

All of her volunteer activities, it seems, were preparing her for a second career. When Andy went off to college, she launched into education. She became Director of Admissions for a newly opened private school in Greenwich in 1999. She was the new kid on the block again. But this time, she had earned her stripes. No white gloves. No French twist. Just the platinum blonde braid that swings sassily down her back to this day.

She pursued that career for six years. Then retirement called. From Florida. Her parents had lived in Sarasota and her college roommate had vacationed in Pelican Landing for nearly 30 years. So it was natural for this New Yorker to end up on the non-New York side of the state.

She bought in Bonita Bay and moved her mother from Connecticut to The Terraces across the street. Her mom is the oldest resident there, starting in independent living but transitioning to assisted living because of eyesight issues. She is the Belle of the Ball over there ... a very active resident who is more than a little irked if Kay checks in too often. You can see where Kay gets her spunk.

Here in Bonita Bay, Kay was an avid tennis player when she arrived ... until she came down with vertigo last year. She has given up competitive tennis and just plays socially now. She is a highly skilled bridge player. A speedy knitter. An enthusiastic attendee at cultural events. An ardent traveler.

Kay is still a Type A personality. She doesn't do "relaxing" well. I think that's what drew me to her in the first place. That, and the white gloves. Which may be THE perfect accessory for the all-white rule at Bonita Bay's newest pastime: croquet.





# On the Bookshelf




## **The Secret Chord** by **Geraldine Brooks**

*Elaine Brotman, Bay Woods*

The author of *The Secret Chord*, the fictionalized story of King David based on the Old Testament and authentic religious sources, is a former journalist and Pulitzer Prize-winning novelist. Brooks stays true to the biblical history, but adds many intimate details allowing the reader to imagine what David was like as a real person. The book is narrated by Nathan, the prophet who advises David and through whom God speaks to David. He convinces the middle-aged monarch to let him document his life so that he will be remembered not only as a great king, but also as a man. With David's permission and help, Natan interviews David's mother, surviving brother, three of his eight wives and others who love and fear him. Much is learned about David's very human side through these interviews and through Natan's memory and experiences. David is a contradiction: composing sensual songs with a secret chord of divine inspiration one moment and becoming a murderous, vindictive soldier without remorse the next.

Even though *The Secret Chord* tells of David's early life, his slaying of Goliath, his psalms, his conniving sons, his bloody battles and his uniting of Israel, it really centers on his relationships with the people around him. The book depicts David's great love of Avigail, his third wife, mother of Daniel and one of his closest advisors. It frowns upon David's decision to do nothing when his son, Amnon, brutally rapes his half-sister, Tamar. It explains the influence Bathsheva has on David as she plots with Natan to have her son, Saul, become the next King of Israel. This fast-paced, well-written saga of devotion, hatred, desire, incest, rape, polygamy, fratricide, contrition, cruelty and heartbreak gives the reader an insight into the Second Iron Age when women were held in low regard, and leaders had to have both mental and physical strength to rule.



## **Did You Ever Have a Family** by **Bill Clegg**

When you first see the title of Bill Clegg's debut novel, *Did You Ever Have a Family*, you immediately think, "Yes, everyone has a family." But what does family mean? Is it only a biological connection? Can it also be something we create because of life's happenings?


It is the evening before June Reid's daughter Lolly is to marry Will. The wedding is to take place in June's backyard in a small Connecticut town, Wells. Staying at June's home are the soon-to-be married couple, Adam and Luke. June and Adam divorced when Lolly was in high school because of Adam's philandering. June excused his early indiscretions and kept them secret. Finally, she realized she must leave and accepted a position as a curator of a London museum. Lolly decided to stay in New York with her father. June couldn't tell her the truth about her father. Time softened but did not completely restore the relationship between mother and daughter.

Luke is June's young lover, who wishes to marry her. The ghosts of June's past prevent her from marrying Luke. He has been in prison on drug charges of which he was innocent. His mother Lydia, aware of his innocence, played a major part in his arrest. June has helped Lydia and Luke to begin a reconciliation.

But there wasn't to be a wedding. There were to be funerals. An explosion in June's kitchen killed Lolly, Will, Adam and Luke in the early morning hours before the wedding.

June flees Wells, uncertain where to go. On her journey, she discovers some of Lolly's belongings in the trunk of her car. Lolly's writings lead her to Moclips, WA, a small town along the Pacific Ocean. Moclips was where Will spent his formative years and was to be buried. There she settles into a quiet life in room six of the Moonstone.

Lydia, withdrawn and alone, revisits her past. After many months, she decides she must find June. She joins June in Moclips, where they will stay, as long as they need to become a family.



## **Destiny and Power: The American Odyssey of George Herbert Walker Bush** by **John Meecham**

John Meecham was given remarkable access to the 41st President and his family over a number of years, and to his diary which "41" dictated daily. The result is an intimate and sympathetic portrayal which at times seems almost autobiographical. However, there are just enough other points of view to maintain balance.

Bush's life story is reasonably well known, but it remains interesting. He was a WWII pilot, oilman, chairman of the RNC, Congressman, Ambassador to the UN, envoy to China, Vice President, President, father of a president, family man and retiree. During his presidency, he had to deal with large deficits, the collapse of the Soviet Union, the possible reunification of Germany and the Iraq invasion of Kuwait. Through his diary we learn of Bush's thinking and inner turmoil as he faces momentous decisions.

In Meecham's telling, Bush's basic values of honor, service, fair play and decency served him and the country well. Among other strengths, his ability to forge international coalitions was vital in the Gulf War. Worth reading whatever your political point of view!

Ask the owner for several references you can call. Be sure to communicate directly with the owner. Check the pictures carefully -- the more pictures, the better! Read the description carefully. "Near" the Eiffel tower could be 10 miles away. Check the cancellation and refund policy. **DO NOT** give your credit card information on the internet unless it's via PayPal or through the Airbnb system. Buy an insurance policy. Airbnb has an insurance policy to be sure you don't damage the home. But, what if the home is not what it says?

I remember the commercial for a jewelry store several years ago: "an educated consumer is our best customer." We're not against Airbnb; we just want you to be informed and be careful!



# Big Screen Movie Reviews

## 10 CLOVERFIELD LANE

**Director:** Dan Trachtenberg  
**Screenplay:** Josh Campbell, Matthew Stuecken, Damien Chazelle  
**Stars:** John Goodman, Mary Elizabeth Winstead, John Gallagher, Jr.  
**Runtime:** 103 Minutes



After you watch this film (and you should), try fitting it into a *genre*. You know, a category like drama, or thriller, or horror, or something. Fitting into just one or two is next to impossible. Add to that the great performances and the movie works like a charm. It will make you a little edgy, keep your attention, sometimes shock you and provide surprises right up to the end.

To describe this film in any detail is to rob you of a fun movie experience. What little publicity this title has gotten has been about its history of the surrounding secrecy while in development and production. There has been no typical give-away-plot trailers or advance interviews of the stars. The marketing approach has been called groundbreaking for Hollywood, but, after seeing the movie, it seems like that was the only approach that was possible or logical without ruining the effect on the audiences.

Also, what little publicity there has been has dealt with the relationship of this movie, *10 Cloverfield Lane*, to the movie *Cloverfield*, released in 2008 and produced by Bad Robot, which happens to be the same production company that produced *10 Cloverfield Lane*. Admittedly, there is a slight connection between the two movies. But (and read this as a *strong* “but”), the connection is slight. Guessing, the connections in the titles and movies are an attempt to capture the earlier movie’s younger audience for this movie - more properly referred to as a marketing gimmick.

If you saw the 2008 *Cloverfield* and weren’t particularly impressed, you shouldn’t let that keep you from seeing this movie. The earlier *Cloverfield* showed video footage of young adults running through New York City while it’s being razed by a giant green thing. The group of young adults, who are friends and lovers, are slowly picked off by the green monster as they videotape the catastrophe up close and personal - until they can’t anymore.

*10 Cloverfield Lane* has a much more dramatic story that starts out introducing Emma (Mary Elizabeth Winstead) who runs out on her boyfriend and ends up in a survival bunker with its builder, Howard (John Goodman). There’s a third character: Emmett (John Gallagher, Jr.). Howard claims he saved Emma from a car accident and they have retreated into his bunker because of the current invasion by someone or something above them. The

amount of time they can expect to live in the bunker without going above is uncertain. Is Howard telling the truth? What’s really going on above them? Is Howard the monster or is it outside? What’s the real story behind the character, Emmett?

John Goodman’s performance is excellent. There are a lot more movies and performances to come in 2016 but this movie and Goodman’s performance may rank among the best. Enjoy.

## WHISKEY TANGO FOXTROT

Was it worth the price of admission? Arguably, yes. Did it entertain? For the most part. Was it comedian Tina Fey’s best movie? Doubtful. Would you recommend it to a good friend? How good?

*Whiskey Tango Foxtrot* (WTF) is based on an autobiographical book by Kim Barker published in 2011 describing her life as a news journalist covering war and politics in Afghanistan and Pakistan. The movie Barker, confusingly named Kim Baker (Tina Fey), is an ambitious New York TV reporter, who, loosely attached to her live-in boyfriend (Josh Charles), takes a three-month assignment to cover the war in Afghanistan. She stays three years.

Arriving in Afghanistan and with no experience covering a war, Baker stumbles around making faux pas, some funny, some not. She quickly attaches to Tanya Vanderpoel (Margot Robbie), one of the few other females covering the war; Ian MacKelpie (Martin Freeman), a Scot who eventually becomes her love interest, and good older, helpful General Holland (Billy Bob Thornton), a straight-up Marine commander.

In real life, Fey is an accomplished comedian who uses touches of irony and short snarky comebacks. Her claims to fame are her parodies of Sarah Palin on “Saturday Night Live,” Liz Lemon in the TV comedy series “30 Rock” and a few, successful feature films, all comedies.

In the book on which the movie is based, author Barker was described by a reviewer as having created a “Tina Fey character.” Reportedly, that led to Fey working with the studio Paramount to acquire the movie rights. Her production company produced the film and, of course, she stars. It might be a Fey character in the book but the drama and inevitability of chaos in war don’t play to Fey’s wheelhouse of straight comedy. Wait for the DVD, or better, yet, watch old reruns of the TV series “M\*A\*S\*H.”

*Zootopia*, released a few weeks ago by Disney Animation Studio, is a sweet movie that can be enjoyed with or without the little ones. It has the usual things you expect from Disney. The detailed animation (which keeps getting better and better), the plethora of jokes, the nuances and lovability of characters and their expressions, the perfect synch of voices, the moral and ethical references and the good outcome.

The title of the movie refers to the world that has been created, in this case for all animals. It's one in which both predator

and non-predator animals live in peace and one in which a lowly rabbit dreams of becoming a police officer. Together, and with Judy's job dependent on success, they go on to break a conspiracy hatched by a government official to turn the Zootopia population of non-predators against the predators. A superior race touch.

During the process of breaking the nasty conspiracy, Judy deals with discrimination, prejudice, bad guys and good guys and individual abilities versus dreams. There are take-offs of the *Godfather* movie, an experience with the Department of Motor Vehicles and loud neighbors. The movie is full of good laughs and it's easy to miss a bunch. I'm looking forward to a second chance during an upcoming hangout with the grandchildren.

# A Walk in Bonita Bay: Simple Strategies for a Safe Stroll

**PM NOT VERY ATHLETIC.** Everyone in my family got that gene, but for some reason, it skipped past me.

So I'm in awe of the physical prowess demonstrated by so many Bonita Bay residents. I watch the fierceness of the pickleballers at Riverwalk Park. I notice the sweat dripping off the gaggle of neon-clad bikers headed back from their multi-mile treks.

And while these athletic endeavors may not be for me, there is one activity I default to regularly.

I walk.

Maybe you do, too. After all, Bonita Bay is an incredibly special place for walkers. With our 12-mile network of well-maintained paths and gorgeous views, there's no lack of options for a casual roam, a serious hike and anything in-between.

But over the years, I've learned a few things about walking in Bonita Bay. Here are three simple rules that help keep me strolling safe and satisfied.

## 1. The One Earphone Rule

Sometimes, I enjoy a quiet, meditative walk through our community's beautiful landscapes. But often, I'll listen to podcasts or music as a way to keep stuffing my brain with ideas and inspiration. And honestly, whatever I'm listening to distracts my body from shouting, "Hey, your bunion is throbbing."

But after years of wandering Bonita Bay routes alone, I've created a rule that keeps me safer, especially during the people-packed winter months.

Whenever I walk outside, I only use one earphone. I keep the other ear unplugged at all times.

While this minor shift might alter my music appreciation, it helps make sure I'm tuned into my surroundings, like the beautiful birdsong, the rustle of a Bonita bunny or the giggle of your granddaughter.

But much more importantly, it helps me stay aware when your son-in-law from St. Cloud – who hasn't been on a bike in three months – speeds by.

*(Wait--you DID teach him proper path etiquette, right? That he should call out loudly, "Coming up on your [left/right]" long before reaching passing distance of anyone else, right? You're a role model for this safety strategy, too, right?)*

Walking our paths isn't like walking a treadmill at the gym, where no one will suddenly appear and accidentally knock you off balance. So avoid the surprises, and try keeping at least one ear free at all times.

## 2. The How To Cross The Road Rule

When I was in high school, the local mini-mart hit gold when they installed video games. And one of the most popular games was called Frogger.

The goal of Frogger was to quickly but carefully maneuver a digital frog across a road of busy traffic without getting squashed.

I used to feel like Frogger at every intersection on Bonita Bay Boulevard, until I learned the rule of how we walkers should cross the road.

First, stand confidently at the corner where you're crossing. Look up. Straighten your spine. (If you're like me, you're ready for a stretch and a breath at this point anyway.)

Second, look BOTH ways (yes, people have occasionally gone the wrong way even on our one-way streets).

Now, if there's no car in sight, continue on. Repeat these steps when you get to the median.

But if a car's approaching, **don't assume that a stop sign guarantees it will stop.** Yes, you may think you have the legal right of way, but it'll be no fun arguing that from your bed at orthopedic rehab.

Do this instead.

Look drivers right in the eye. Smile. Wave. The goal is to make sure you have their attention.

You never know what may be on their mind. Sure, some of them might be thinking about their day at the beach or their next Jalapeño Margarita at Roy's. But some might also be coming back from an upsetting doctor's visit or be on the verge of a significant life moment.

Waving and eye contact assure that your body is on their radar screen, so that they'll put their foot on the brake of that 3000+ pound vehicle rolling your way.

Finally, I think another small wave and a mouthed "thank you" is a nice touch after you've safely crossed the road. It's a kind way to give drivers the "all clear," and to reinforce their awareness when the next pedestrian hops into their route.

## 3. The "Make a Stranger Smile" Rule

When I lived in Atlanta, I walked around a big in-town park. And while I'd sometimes run into a neighbor or friend, most of the time, the folks on my route were strangers.

One day I wanted to see how many strangers I could cajole into smiling back at me during my journey. So I forced myself to smile and say hello to everyone, no matter what kind of crappy day I'd had. The challenge has stuck with me to this day.

Sure, this game's a lot easier here in Bonita Bay. But it's still worth playing, especially on those days when life's giving you grief.

So smile and say hello to everyone on your walk. Because that's the kind of place this is: friendly, kind, caring.

Even if you're not athletic.

# Obama's Last and Final Budget

**THE OBAMA ADMINISTRATION** just released its proposed 2017 budget. As expected, it includes several proposals for revenue generation that relate to income and transfer taxes. Although the Republican-controlled Congress may make it difficult for these proposals to be implemented during this election year, it is worthwhile to consider them as they provide insight into changes that might come as the makeup of leadership in Washington is in flux with every election cycle.

Under one proposal, children of deceased IRA owners would be required to take inherited distributions over no more than five years. The present rule provides the option to spread the distributions over the life of the child which can be very advantageous in deferring income tax over a very long period of time. In the past, Republicans have been supportive of this change.

Another proposal in the 2017 budget is to restore the estate, gift and generation-skipping transfer (GST) taxes to their 2009 levels. That would set the estate and GST tax exemptions at \$3.5 million. It would also de-unify the gift tax exemption back down to \$1 million. In addition, the estate and gift tax rate would increase from 40% to 45%. Compared to today's unified exemption amount of \$5.45 million, that is a very significant move. Taxpayers would still be better off than they were in 2009 because the new portability rules (surviving spouse being allowed to use the deceased spouse's unused exemption amount) would remain intact.

Presently, donors are permitted to make annual gifts of up to \$14,000 per beneficiary without using up their gift tax exemption. For donors with many children and grandchildren, this can be a very effective way of gifting wealth tax-free. Rather than being able to give \$14,000 to an unlimited number of beneficiaries, the 2017 budget would cap the total single year tax free-gift amount at \$50,000.

The implementation of a capital gains tax on appreciated assets

transferred at death is another departure from the current system suggested in the proposed budget. For these assets, the death of the owner would be deemed a realization event, and tax would be imposed on the "unrealized" gains. In the present system, most appreciated assets transferred at death escape capital gains tax and pass to the beneficiary with a step-up in basis. Under the proposed plan, there would be some exceptions such as the transfer of a primary residence.

Another proposal in President Obama's budget, the implementation of "The Buffett Rule", is designed to address the reality that very high earners often pay taxes at a lower rate than their lower earning peers. This is often the case because the highest earners source their income from capital gains rather than ordinary income, and capital gains are currently taxed at a lower rate. The Buffett Rule aims to rectify that disparity by imposing a "Fair Share Tax" for taxpayers earning more than \$500,000 per year.

The 2017 budget calls for reducing the time period that multi-generational dynasty trusts would remain estate and generation-skipping transfer tax-free to 90 years. Florida law currently allows a 360-year time period. Any new limitation on the time period would apply to trusts created after the date of enactment and not retroactively.

Although the changes discussed here are still just proposals, it is wise to stay informed of developments in this very dynamic tax landscape. Prudent taxpayers will see change on the horizon, and remain flexible and prepared to make adjustments in estate and tax planning before the need arises.



and Bayview II were granted permission to be trimmed. The criteria that the Design Review Committee uses is that the homeowners must apply and receive the applicable permits issued by the State – if granted, DRC approves project. Chris suggested that perhaps Bonita Bay should take a second look at cutting of mangroves in these eco-sensitive areas of the Community. It was decided that the Design Committee rules will be reviewed at a later time.

Nominating Committee Chair Jack Palmer reported that 1200 ballots were received; however, some arrived late and others were filled out inaccurately and therefore could not be counted. Results of the voting will be available at the Annual Meeting.

Risk Committee reported that the fencing will be extended in the area of the North gate. A pedestrian entrance will be installed at the Main gate by which a four-digit code will be required to enter. This number will be distributed to residents by the Community Association and changed periodically. The Club uses a similar coding system at the entrance to the Lifestyle Center.

Technology Committee Chair Chris Corrie reported that the group met once again with Summit Broadband and learned that Summit has changed its policy of building in the cost to the consumer of laying the fiber optic cables in the communities they serve. This cost will no longer be passed along to the individual user. Going forward, a strategic plan has been designed that includes the development, within the next six weeks, of a survey for Bonita Bay homeowners in order for the Committee to understand the needs

and wants of the Community.

North Gate Traffic Light update – Roger Brunswick reported that the light will be in place by the end of summer or early fall 2016. The total cost to Bonita Bay is expected to be \$215,500.

New Business –

- A process has been developed for BB communities that do not have an HOA to apply for security cameras in their neighborhoods – contact BBCA for more information.
- Results of the Homeowners Survey will be posted on the web site.
- Bonita Bay is actively using social media to promote the community.

Residents Questions -- A homeowner of Hidden Harbor asked why the Board is spending funds on another rest room facility in Riverwalk Park when there is one already available; a resident from Wedgewood questioned the increase in assessments and suggested that the various Clubs in Bonita Bay pay their own way; a new resident of the Community living in Bay Harbor cautioned bikers and cars need to be more aware as he almost had a collision with a bike.

Meeting adjourned.





# Invictus Games 2016

**GEOFF MASON** of Mahogany Ridge is Head of Production Planning for ESPN’s coverage of the 2016 Invictus Games in Orlando next month.

What are the Invictus Games? They are the ultimate Paralympic-style sporting event for injured servicemen and women. They are the “darling” of Prince Harry who launched the inaugural Invictus Games in London in September 2014. In an interview on BBC Radio in the summer of 2014, he said:

“This (Invictus Games) is basically my full-time job at the moment, making sure that we pull this off.” As President of the Invictus Games, Harry attended all events related to the 2014 Games, and is expected to attend most events next month in Orlando. First Lady Michelle Obama and Dr. Jill Biden will also be on hand ... to support Team USA and cheer from the stands.

Prince Harry was inspired to bring the Invictus Games to London after visiting the Warrior Games in America in 2013. The Prince sees these Games as an important part of a broader legacy of warrior support, through a combination of on-going care, training and employment opportunities, to the wellbeing of those men and women who have served their country. He has said that his experiences in Afghanistan inspired him to help injured personnel.

The Invictus Games Foundation covers all costs for the athletes and their families to come to the Games. The national teams have various other funding schemes for their normal training/competing activity. (For instance, the Department of Defense underwrites some of this for the US team.) The Foundation was set up to develop this legacy, manage the process of selecting the hosts of future games and oversee their delivery.

The inaugural Invictus Games were attended by over 400 competitors from 13 nations. They used the power of sport to inspire recovery, support rehabilitation and generate a wider understanding and respect for wounded, injured and sick servicemen and women – and their families.

“There’s a huge percentage of guys and girls that came through in the last Invictus, that are no longer here, because they’ve

used it as part of their rehab, and are now back in employment or wherever it may be,” Prince Harry said in a recent video. “The Games are much more than a sporting event. Every single one of these competitors knows that through the Invictus period, they are naturally becoming role models.

“I look forward to celebrating and honoring the sacrifices of veteran and active-duty service members and their families from around the world.”



Following the London games, Prince Harry announced that the next Invictus Games would take place in Orlando, May 8-12, 2016 at the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex at Walt Disney World®. Although the location is in the USA, the Games are still a UK enterprise. The Games will be their first opportunity to dip their toe in global waters.

Welsh mezzo-soprano Katherine Jenkins OBE, and a former *Dancing with the Stars* contestant, has been named as the first Celebrity Ambassador for the 2016 Invictus Games. As part of that commitment, Jenkins will be supporting competitor training events, and raising awareness for adaptive sports and the important role they play for the wounded and injured.

## **ESPN the Network of Invictus Games 2016**

So how did Bonita Bay neighbor Geoff Mason get involved in the Games?

Geoff has been in sports broadcasting for decades. He has won 26 Emmys for his efforts. (See my “Who’s Who” article in the March 2012 issue of *Bay Watch News* available online.) Two years ago he headed up all production planning for the 2014 FIFA World Cup in Brazil. And he was scheduled to produce ESPN’s Latin America coverage of the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio this summer.

But last year, when he and his team produced the Special Olympics World Games in Los Angeles, they became profoundly passionate about the spirit of those Games. So Geoff asked ESPN if he could be reassigned to the Invictus Games when they were announced. Rio’s transportation issues, the outbreak of mosquito-borne diseases, cost overruns and sewage-infested waters are a just a few of the issues Geoff



has been able to skirt in his new assignment. And traveling to Orlando is certainly a lot easier than flying to Rio (he made 14 trips south of the border in preparation for the World Cup!).

ESPN will cover the Opening and Closing Ceremonies, along with each of the 10 competitive events. All athletic competitions will take place at the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex in Orlando. Road Cycling will be contested on nearby roads. The Opening and Closing Ceremonies will take place at Champions Stadium, which is home to the Atlanta Braves Spring Training.

ESPN's Chris Fowler, who calls College Football and Wimbledon, will host the coverage in May.

The sporting events include:

- Archery – the traditional skill of using a bow to propel arrows
- Indoor Rowing – a rowing machine is used to simulate the action of watercraft rowing
- Powerlifting – a strength sport that consists of three attempts at maximal weight on three lifts: squat, bench press and deadlift ... not unlike strongman competition
- Road Cycling – the most widespread form of cycling which includes recreational, racing and utility cycling
- Sitting Volleyball – a team sport for athletes with a disability; players must have at least one buttock in contact with the floor whenever they make contact with the ball
- Swimming –one of the most popular Olympic sports, with events in freestyle, backstroke, breaststroke, and butterfly; team or individual
- Track and Field – a sport based on the skills of running, jumping and throwing
- Wheelchair Basketball – played by people in wheelchairs, considered one of the major disabled sports practiced



- Wheelchair Rugby – a team sport practiced in 25 countries and a summer Paralympic sport
- Wheelchair Tennis – adapted for those with disabilities in their lower bodies; athletes use specially designed wheelchairs and the ball may bounce up to two times; doubles only, no singles

Some 500 athletes from 15 countries are expected to compete in the US version of the Games. Most hail from the UK and the US. Teams include former and/or active members across all military branches, wounded in conflict or non-combat situations.

Other featured events are a wheelchair rugby exhibition match (which included Prince Harry in 2014) and a Jaguar-Land Rover driving challenge (two courses: off-road and speed course of random gates).

“We will cover the Opening and Closing ceremonies live,” says Geoff. “And there will be a one-hour recap show each evening on ESPN2. ESPN3 – our online network – will present live coverage from all the venues each morning, afternoon and evening.

“We will also present in-depth focus on six athletes in segments called ‘Up Close and Personal’ ... how they got there, what it means to them and

how they are coping. These segments – just as they were last summer during our coverage of Special Olympics – will be very special indeed.

“Special Olympics is about taking part . . . every athlete gets a medal, or a ribbon,” Mason explains. “The Invictus Games are different – it’s all about winning – and the level of intensity from these competitors will reflect that. To get a medal from Prince Harry will be the ultimate goal of everyone who comes to Orlando this May.”

“Invictus” -- meaning unconquered – is a poem published in 1888 by English poet William Ernest Henley, who lost a leg to tuberculosis. It provided inspiration to Nelson Mandela during his years in prison. The poem’s most oft-quoted lines: “I am the master of my fate; I am the captain of my soul.”

*“The combat on the beach was terrible, a real slaughter. TV and movies don’t show the way it was, as there were no cameras that I saw on the beach until the second day. During that first day, soldiers were mowed down when they left their landing craft, and the losses were high.”*

*The events that led Logan to that beach tell the story of another member of the America’s “Greatest Generation”, and it is my privilege to share that story with you.*

Logan was born in Dedham, MA on May 23, 1922. His family was severely affected by the Great Depression, and by the fact that his father was injured on his railroad job and lost a lot of work time as William grew up. There was no money, and William delivered papers for a fraction of a cent apiece through good and bad weather to help his family and to have some money of his own. When he was a freshman in high school, he worked at the three service stations in town pumping gas, greasing cars and doing whatever work he could find.

“I was a pretty good hockey and football player,” Logan says, “but schoolwork wasn’t very interesting.” He did enjoy the drafting and drawing classes during his later high school years, and he started a drawing of a large, elaborate steam engine his senior year. As spring approached, he could see he wouldn’t be able to finish the drawing, so his teacher arranged access for him after school was out so he could finish his drawing.

Finally, when the drawing was done, he rolled it up and walked straight to B.F. Sturdevant, a local manufacturer of large blowers and heavy equipment, in search of work as a draftsman. Presenting his 30” x 36” drawing as proof of his talent, he offered to work in any job that would lead to an opportunity to use his skills.

He was hired, and started his \$.10-per-hour job in the blueprint room, using chemicals to reproduce blueprints. He’s never thought to ask what the pay would be.

“It was hard work and not at all what I had hoped for, but I decided they were testing me so I stayed with it,” says Logan. “After a couple of months, they offered me a move to the engineering and drafting section, and I immediately accepted. I did a variety of drawings, and one day they gave me a drawing of a large U.S. Navy steam engine and told me to trace it onto a large piece of cloth. This was hard – I’d never done anything like this before, but I was very careful and determined to make this work excellent, and finally finished it.”

When he finished, he rolled the cloth drawing up under his arm, hopped into his small Ford roadster and drove to Boston to call on a Mr. Bjork at Stone and Webster, a large engineering and engine manufacturing company. Bjork’s secretary didn’t like the fact he didn’t have an appointment, but William waited. When he finally was granted an interview, Bjork looked at the traced drawing, saw the U.S. Navy seal in the lower corner, rolled it up and left the room. William wondered if he was in trouble!

But Bjork returned, said he was impressed with the work and asked when Logan could start work. He answered that he’d have to give Sturdevant two weeks’ notice, and he started work as a draftsman shortly after. His boss was Andy Lewin, a good manager who had a strong influence on him. Logan learned quickly, working with trained engineers on large, fast-moving projects. And his pay was \$1.80 per hour, a big improvement. He worked in some night school classes to improve his qualifications, and then along came Pearl Harbor!

Logan was incensed at the Japanese attack and decided to enlist in the Naval Air Corp as an aviator. His processing into the Navy began in January, and part of the testing for pilot training was to read pages of colored dots that revealed a numeral of various colored dots on each page. Logan answered “5” and “7”, and the processing corpsman said, “You’re color blind – you’re not going to be a pilot.” But based on his previous employment at Stone & Webster, the Navy viewed Logan as an engineer and sent him to the Seabees, whose slogan is “We Build – We Fight.”

With the Allied Africa campaign beginning, Logan was transferred to the Mediterranean theater where his battalion was assigned to build amphibious ramps for shore landings. These ramps were needed to support tanks and trucks as they were unloaded from landing craft to go ashore. Built as large floating pontoons – 5x5x7’ steel boxes – these pontoons could be quickly connected to create a causeway to carry their load. A problem was that the amphibious pontoons would separate from one another in heavy, rolling seas. The pontoons would break their connectors and float away, making them useless. This was a mission critical problem.

Logan designed and created drawings for a new universal joint

to connect the pontoons durably even in rolling seas. Accepted by his commanding officers, the design was returned to state-side manufacturers. In only a few weeks, a large supply of the new universal joint connectors arrived. The new connectors worked, and were part of the amphibious campaigns in North Africa and in Italy. Logan participated in two North Africa invasions, which ultimately resulted in the severing of Rommel's supply lines and shortened the North African war. Along the way, he learned to drive a bulldozer, a skill that came in handy later in life.

His battalion moved to Italy and supported invasions at Palermo, Salerno and Enzo. Logan remembers that the invasion at Salerno was the worst, as Italy had surrendered and Allied forces expected little resistance. The Italian army had withdrawn but the Nazis had moved in, expecting the invasion, and waited until most of the forces were on shore before beginning an artillery and machine gun barrage. Logan remembers, "We lost half of our battalion at Salerno – it was a terrible disaster, and we learned a very difficult lesson." As the Italy campaign achieved success, Logan's battalion was moved to the coast of France where, after months of waiting, the Normandy invasion began.

With the Normandy invasion complete and the need for the beachhead supply route fulfilled, Logan's battalion had finished its mission and his three-year enlistment was almost complete. He was transferred to Maine to a recuperation center for a few months before his service ended. He had shrapnel wounds, with scars still showing on his arms, but he had escaped serious injury in spite of his exposure to shelling during multiple invasions. He and Gloria were married before his discharge in early 1945 and, on November 3, 1945, he became a civilian again.

Returning to Boston and his job at Stone & Webster, Logan says, "I became a workaholic. I was so glad to be back. Our work was building steam power plants and, with more night school classes and on-the-job training in the engineering department, I was able to be certified as a mechanical engineer. That meant I could take more responsibility during the one-year design cycle for a new power plant, and then I become the on-site resident engineer while the plant was constructed. The pay was great – housing was provided; all personal expenses were paid while building the plant, and my pay increased as a full engineer."

Gloria worked as a secretary at Stone & Webster, and a resident engineer needed a secretary on site while the power plant was being built. So Gloria became William's secretary and the Logans' growing family moved to the construction site. This worked while the children were young, but with students in elementary school, problems developed.

Logan says, "Boston schools were very strong academically; when I took resident engineer responsibility for a new plant built for Pacific Gas and Electric in California, our kids fell way behind. Gloria and I knew we couldn't continue to do this traveling work with our family."

When the PG&E job was done and the family returned to Boston in 1952, Logan began to look for other opportunities outside the company. Studying maps of land around his home town of Dedham, he identified a 150-acre parcel that would be

perfect for home building to meet the emerging post-war demand for housing. The parcel was "back land" owned by four parties – two country clubs and two large estates. The owners had been paying taxes for years but the owners had no apparent plans for the acreage, so Logan put together a proposal.

The local assessor told him that the value of the land was \$800 per acre. Logan made an offer to the four owners to pay them \$2400 per acre, but they would put the land in his name and he would pay them on an installment basis as he built houses on the land. He expected a long negotiation with

lawyers for all parties, but the owners accepted his offer and he laid out a plan for the first 23 houses on the property.

The next step was roads, sidewalks and utilities; and with his mechanical engineering certification to stamp his plans, he did his own engineering and received city approval to proceed with construction. With the savings he and Gloria had accumulated during his work as site engineer, they funded the early costs of development of the land. He did some free engineering work for the city, and helped them with some problems, and his development and home construction moved along smoothly. Over the years, the Algonquin community near Canton grew to an impressive collection of estate-sized, elegant homes on multi-acre lots overlooking their two neighboring country clubs. The last of the 150 homes in the community were completed in the 1990's.

As years passed, Logan's three sons grew and started families, and he and Gloria enjoyed ski vacations and long winter boat sojourns to Florida and the islands in a variety of yachts. As

# Bridge Lesson

As you plan the play on these two deals, consider the similarities and differences between them. How do the differences affect your play?

On Deal #1, you can count nine tricks off the top: four spades, four diamonds and one club. Your problem isn't developing enough tricks; it's avoiding the loss of too many heart tricks before you gain the lead. The key play to ensure a heart stopper comes at trick one. What card did you play? Playing dummy's ♥2 guarantees that you will have a heart stopper no matter how the East-West hearts are distributed. The complete Deal #1 appears below.

If you play the ♥2, East has to play the ♥A to prevent South's ♥J from being a stopper. Once the ♥A is played, dummy's remaining singleton ♥Q combined with declarer's remaining doubleton ♥J are strong enough to force out the other top heart and provide a stopper on power. The extra heart trick gives you an overtrick – a trick you couldn't build if you had to break hearts yourself.

A common mistake is for students to play dummy's ♥Q at trick

one, leaving dummy with the ♥2. East wins the ♥A and returns a heart through declarer's remaining ♥J8, allowing West to play the ♥10 or ♥K, whichever is necessary, and then run hearts to set 3NT. Declarer's main concern on Deal #1 is to guarantee a heart stopper. Since dummy's ♥Q and declarer's ♥J are touching equals, playing low from dummy ensures that one of them will win. Playing dummy's ♥Q opens declarer's ♥J up to attack.

Dummy's heart holding on Deal #2 is the same as on Deal #1. You might think that declarer should play dummy's ♥2 here too but the situation is different. Declarer has only six tricks off the top and must promote the needed three tricks in diamonds. While declarer's ♥A is a sure heart stopper, the lead must be lost so declarer's goal is to prevent the defenders from running too many hearts when they win the ♦A. One way to do that is to hold up on winning the ♥A, hoping to deplete the player who has the ♦A of hearts but a better option is to hope the ♥Q will provide a second stopper so 3NT will make no matter who has the ♦A. The best way to do that is to play dummy's ♥Q at trick one. If West led from the ♥K, the ♥Q will win and declarer can save the ♥A for later. Leaving the ♥Q as a singleton in dummy won't do anything to provide a second stopper. If the ♥Q isn't played at trick one, it will be a singleton and should have no chance of winning. If you think declarer's ♥8 has a chance to win the first trick, did you stop to analyze the opening lead? The ♥J 10 9 are missing. If they were all in West's hand, West would have led top of the touching cards, not the ♥5, at trick one. When the ♥Q is not played, East will play one of those three cards to force out declarer's ♥A.

It takes some thought to determine whether to play dummy's honor at trick one. It can help to focus on the top five cards in the led suit. And forget about the saying "second hand low," which is for the defenders who don't know their side's complete holding in a suit.

Deal #2 appears below. You can see that declarer needs the second heart stopper since West has both the long hearts and the ♦A.

# One Writer's Thoughts on "Getting Writing"

*Don't be polite.*

*Bite in.*

*Pick it up with your fingers and lick the juice that  
may run down your chin.*

*It is ready and ripe now, whenever you are.*

**EVE MERRIAM** was not talking about writing but she could have been. I think her lines capture "spot on" the inherently messy business of writing.

So, if you want this thing, bite in and write; no more excuses. *Nulla Dies Sine Linea*— "never a day without a line" — fine advice from Donald Graves whom I met one summer at University of New Hampshire. I took this powerful motto back to my students. I wrote it in bold letters all across the chalkboard. And we wrote; every day; spilling out onto paper whatever thoughts were bashing around in our noggins. If there *was* nothing there, then we **WROTE** that there was nothing until we got so sick of it that *something* eventually fell off the ends of our pens. I told them not to be critical; first drafts are always rubbish, but they stoke the fires of creativity. Later they'd use these ramblings, like so much flotsam on the beach, and hunt for something worth picking up. There usually was.

Maybe the biggest surprise for me as a writer is the surprise; that when I sit down at whatever I write on, I really don't know where it is all going. This is a blessing and a curse. I love the way I can laugh or take my own breath away. A character pops up. A turn of phrase that seems to come from nowhere thrills me. I collect phrases. I love them to pieces. Sometimes they are not even mine.

The curse is that you can end up with a muddle ... a whole lot of threads that need to be followed or snipped off altogether. Tim Wynne Jones, a favorite writer of YA (young adult) fiction, talking about his latest book, *The Emperor of Any Place*, finds himself in this sort of verbal labyrinth.

"Oh, the threads. The threads were a complete schmozzle! There were so many threads — far more than made the final cut. At one point I had thirteen point-of-view characters all clamoring to tell their stories!"

Now I *love* writing for kids. Not little kids, bigger ones, because I like bigger words. I've written a couple that, perforce, have some biographical detail I have labored to disguise. One, as yet unpublished, is set in Montreal. I loved that because I could bring in my glancing command of French at intervals or let my mind crunch along the snow-banked sidewalks of Sherbrooke Street and watch the sparks fly off the tops of the street car lines. Finding a beloved setting is critical in writing a good novel. It

must sit there comfortably and believably. The reader has to be able not only to see it, but smell it and feel it and hear it. I think I have done this rather well in my *finally* published novel, *Shire Summer*, set on the Scottish coast where I grew up. I put in the pipe bands and the gulls for noise, the slippery seaweed and the gritty sand, the pong of a fishy harbor. And for good measure I added adventure and a hint of magic. You can do this for the young at heart; nothing bloody, nothing sordid, nothing overtly sexual. Maybe not your kind of thing at all but there it is! We write what we write.

Another thing: writing keeps me awake or, more accurately, wakes me up — an annoying habit that goes with the territory. One more guru in my past said that the best time to be creative is during that Neverland between waking and sleeping when the preconscious is still at work; when the ideas that have been brewing as we sleep morph into inspiration. The brain is a powerful thing and often works best when it isn't pushed. Some of my most astounding breakthroughs occur at 4:30 in the morning when I roust myself from bed and scribble my "Morning Papers."

And you might try leaving that keyboard alone for a bit. Get yourself a nice little notebook (I believe Hemingway used a few!) and just write. Many writers claim that there is an actual connection between the finger and the brain that allows thoughts to flow better. Some, Alistair MacLeod comes to mind, write entire novels out in longhand; astonishing in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. Obviously, all the recopying, the *actual* cutting and pasting has proved more than worth the effort. If you have not yet read *No Great Mischief*, consider an evening or two in MacLeod's company.

Personally, I don't LIKE transcribing. It depresses me. I've done it, with my travel journals because there is nothing like the immediacy of writing on the road, in a boat or on the back of a camel to capture details. But later, I keep myself sane by treating these notes in the way an artist might treat a sketchbook, adding or deleting till it pleases.

A hilarious book for all struggling writers is Anne Lamott's *Bird by Bird*. She devotes whole chapters to problems like "Sh\*\*ty First Drafts" or how to end a story. Rather like putting an octopus to bed, she quips. And I must learn from her example and do just that.

Ms. Lamott's book is also available on audio.

Several factors have probably contributed to fewer sales YTD. One factor is the devaluation of the Canadian dollar. The current value is \$.74 to the US dollar. In following up with

many Canadian buyers, they have stated this is not the time to buy. Not only does their money have less value but combined with our increased value in Bonita Bay (10-15 %, or greater in many cases), it becomes a roadblock for a sale! You know all the other factors. You hear it on the news every day!

We still have March to finalize our results for 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter 2016 and perhaps meet or exceed 2015 for the same period. While we do have more inventory than the previous year, the challenge comes in finding the right property for the buyer. Many Bonita Bay residents who are downsizing from large homes are looking for a smaller single-floor home. Several new listings have only been on the market one day or minimal days prior to going “Pended.” Buyers are realizing they must move quickly if they find the home that suits their criteria.

# Food and Wine Pairing

## Chef Susan's Menu

- Cold Gazpacho Soup
- Lobster Salad
- Coconut Sorbet Summer Sundae with Salted Caramel Sauce and Cashews

## Lana's Wine Recommendations

The nights are shorter; the days are warmer; the humidity is rising, and our thoughts are turning to lighter cuisine. Spring is a great time to shake up our wine drinking. Put aside the heavy tannic chunky wines. A well-thought-out dinner starts with lighter wines and progresses to more intense ones; otherwise your taste buds won't be able to taste the delicate wines at the end of the meal.

These are perfect warm weather recipes that call for lighter wines. Is there such a thing as the ultimate pairing? Most people think that there is only one perfect wine for each dish, but I like to set two wine glasses in front of each guest and pour two different varietals or styles of wine. This lets people compare how each wine affects the taste of the food and what the meal does to the wine.

Gazpacho is a refreshing uncooked cold soup which hails from the Andalusian region of Spain. An obvious pairing choice is Spanish white wine, like unoaked Rioja or Albariño, but almost any light dry white wine will do. The very high acidity of this soup works well with Italian whites like Trebbiano or Soave, Pouilly-Fumé from France, German Riesling Kabinetts, California Sauvignon Blancs or Viogniers and Oregon Pinot Gris. For a different twist, try Fino or Manzanilla sherry. It's one of the best bargains in the wine world. Avoid red wines. They would not do justice to the soup or the wine.

The decadent lobster salad presents an interesting wine pairing. By adding less of the blue cheese topping, it favors white wine drinkers, but by piling on more, it now pairs with light fruity red wines. For this second course, our choice of white wines can be bigger and bolder than the wines with the gazpacho. Think French Burgundy, Premier Cru Chablis, California Chardonnay or Viognier, or Blanc de Blanc or Rosé Champagne. Champagne and lobster have been a personal favorite of mine for years. For a compromise, try a dry chilled rosé. California and France make some beautiful dry ones. These are not your mother's white Zinfandel! They are perfect warm weather, cold food companions that are quickly overcoming their image problem. Lobster is such a sweet delicate flavor that can easily be overpowered by big tannic high alcohol red wine. If you absolutely have to drink red wine, light Pinot Noir or fruity Syrah is the preferred choice.

Ice cream requires a sweet dessert wine and something low in alcohol. It pairs very well with late harvest wines like Riesling, fino sherry, demi-sec Champagne or Moscato d'Asti. If you like a lot of caramel sauce on your dessert, then go with tawny ports. The port takes on a vanilla and honey caramel profile from spending years aging in oak barrels. It's a symbiotic relationship with the caramel topping. Remember to serve the dessert wines slightly chilled. Cheers!

"I have memories of playing on the beach, scrunching my toes in the sand, collecting beach glass and watching clams burrow and blow bubbles through their air holes on the beach", she recalls.

She thinks this is the perfect time to indulge in a sumptuous lobster salad. She created this dish making use of seasonal, fresh ingredients and lobster – the quintessential indulgence. She recommends serving this entree salad with a warmed baguette and salted butter and you're ready to go!

The soup is the perfect starter for your lobster salad, making use of fresh vegetables and a surprise finish with a drizzle of basil olive oil. This soup is intended to be served cold so if you don't plan to serve this immediately, place in refrigerator until you are ready to enjoy.

And finally, the key to great desserts is flavor and visual presentation. Find your prettiest ice cream bowls or clear glass cups and allow the ingredients to show off!

## Cold Gazpacho Soup

### Ingredients


- 6 heirloom tomatoes or very ripe large tomatoes
- 2 cucumbers, seeded and cubed
- 1 avocado, ripe but firm, pitted and cubed
- 1 yellow summer squash, cubed
- 4 scallions, chopped
- 6 to 8 basil leaves
- 4 tsp. basil olive oil- 3 for blending in the soup, 1 for the finishing drizzle
- 1 Tbsp. white balsamic vinegar

### Instructions

1. Clean tomatoes and basil. Cut tomatoes into quarters and place basil and tomatoes in a blender. Add the white balsamic vinegar and 2 tsp. basil olive oil. Blend until completely puréed. Pour into a bowl.
2. Add cubed cucumbers, summer squash and avocado and stir to mix.
3. Pour soup into individual serving bowls. Sprinkle chopped green onions on top of each serving then take 1 tsp. of basil olive oil and drizzle a little on top of each serving.

## Lobster Salad

### Ingredients (serves 4)

- 4 lobster tails - thawed or fresh
  - Steam or simmer for 12-14 minutes until cooked.
  - Allow to cool, remove from shells and cut into large bite-sized chunks.
- 1 head chopped romaine lettuce
- 2 avocados -- 8 slices per avocado
- 2 tomatoes -- 8 slices per tomato
- Yellow onion -- thinly sliced, quantity to taste
- 2 ears sweet white corn -- hulled with kernels removed
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Dressings:
  - Light vinaigrette to toss the salad
    - ¼ cup EVOO
    - ½ tsp. kosher salt
    - ½ tsp. Dijon mustard
    - ¼ cup lemon juice or more to preference
  - Mix until creamy and smooth
  - Blue Cheese dressing for top of salad
    - ⅓ cup sour cream
    - ⅓ cup crumbled blue cheese
    - 2 Tbsp. milk
    - 1 Tbsp. Mayo
    - ½ tsp. kosher salt
    - ½ tsp. black pepper
  - Blend and serve -- you want it to be fairly thick.



### Instructions

1. Cut lobster into large chunks.
2. If corn is sweet and in season, do not cook. Remove kernels from the cob.
3. Slice the avocados, onion and tomatoes.
4. Put lettuce in a bowl with sweet corn, onion and tomatoes and lobster.
5. Toss with a light coating of vinaigrette.
6. Arrange even portions on four plates of the salad. Ensure lobster pieces are on top. Arrange avocado slices around plate.
7. Put 1 dollop (about 2 Tbsp.) blue cheese dressing on top and serve.

## Coconut Sorbet Summer Sundae with Salted Caramel Sauce and Cashews

### Ingredients

- Coconut sorbet or ice cream/gelato
- ½ cup roughly chopped cashews
- Caramel sauce, any quantity desired per serving
- Sea salt

### Instructions

1. Heat caramel sauce until very warm.
2. Place 2 scoops of coconut sorbet in each serving dish; scoops should be round and full.
3. Drizzle 1 to 2 Tbsp. caramel sauce over each serving.
4. Scatter cashews on top of caramel sauce; if desired, place 1-2 whole cashews on top.
5. Grind a very small amount of sea salt lightly over sundae and serve.

# ...more “View From a Different Angle”

**IN CASE YOU THOUGHT** you just couldn't wait until next season for more “View from a Different Angle” by Charlie Vogt, he submitted two more of his slightly wacky insights on life in Bonita Bay to hold us over - enjoy!!

## **Bonita Bay or Big Brother?**

Even if the routing problem gets solved, some scaredy-cat types have pointed out we're the lightning capital of the United States. Still the idea of a giant BB balloon drifting across the skies supporting a flowered pergola basket has some appeal.

DIRIGIBLES would be less likely to blow off course, but would require larger groups to be economically feasible, and that would require everyone to assemble on time. Car pools with just one foursome have ended up in fistfights over late arrivals. With a hundred or more passengers, the dirigible group could end up with quite a melee. Furthermore, a Hindenburg-type event could put a severe dent in our membership count. (See earlier reference to lightning.)

HIGH SPEED WATER TRANSPORTATION seems safer than any of the above ideas, and still could be thrilling. Unfortunately the only route available so far would bring us in through the 10,000 Islands. There we could easily lose our bearings and wander around like the Lost Dutchman, or, worse yet, be mistaken for “business boaters” bringing in cargoes of high interest to the Coast Guard.

TUNNELING might be considered. But with our water table, the conduits likely would fill up with water pretty regularly. Completely

# Tavira First to Get Blue Zones Recognition

**TAVIRA AT BONITA BAY** will become the first Blue Zones-recognized organization in Bonita Springs. In addition, it is the first Blue Zones-recognized high rise in Southwest Florida area. Tavira is a concerned and close-knit community with many activities that encourage friendships, support and engagement in every area. Owners established *Tavira Cares*, a volunteer program offering short-term support to fellow neighbors in need by providing meals, walking pets, driving to and from doctor’s appointments or picking up prescriptions. Tavira also established a ladies’ book club, mah jongg groups, social bridge and an extremely active social committee which provides large catered gatherings with entertainment and informal roof top socials once a month. In addition, a group of Tavira women recently formed Nautilus Women’s Network, which organizes speakers on topics that support and enrich overall well-being, including nutrition, health issues and meditation. The Blue Zones initiative very much enhance the numerous initiatives already in place.

“The Blue Zones Project is such a natural fit for us,” responded Cris Hayes, Tavira resident and chair of the project. “We’re already a very health-conscious community with many walkers and bikers, and have an active social committee sponsoring healthy living programs. Our owners are proud to be in on the ground floor of this exciting opportunity,” said Hayes.

Recent initiatives and activities launched at Tavira to further

the mission of the Blue Zones project include:

- Walking Moais (pronounced “mow-eye” - a word that comes from the Okinawa Blue Zone) is a social group that commits to regular walks, potluck dinners or to discover their purpose together. Two Walking Moai groups meet on Monday and Thursday mornings at 8 a.m. They include different levels of walkers: the SOBS (short of breaths with a more easy-going pace) and Walkie Talkies (who walk at a faster pace).
  - A “Blue Zones Live Longer Better” monthly discussion group meets to encourage each other’s quest for healthy living and hosts talks on healthy cooking, juicing and smoothies demonstrations and other topics.
  - To help Tavira residents source convenient, nutritious meals, local Chefs deliver prepared healthy meals and fresh produce from local farmers.
- In addition Tavira has a wide array of life-healthy amenities and events that promote a better quality of life:
- the 1<sup>st</sup> Blue Zones informational meeting hosted in Bonita Bay in January (2016) introduced the community to the project

- a tobacco-free environment protects residents’ health and comfort
- articles in the weekly Tavira newsletter about well-being and upcoming Blue Zone activities are an ongoing resource
- an exercise room, spa area, pool and bike racks make exercise accessible to everyone.

Research shows nurturing friendships with loyal, positive and supportive people can play such a big part in adding years to your life.

“Tavira is a community in which residents enjoy spending time together,” according to Hayes. “Our Blue Zones activities provide additional opportunities to strengthen resident connections, add more fitness to our routines and discover new ways to incorporate healthful eating behaviors at our tables and social events.”



# In Bonita Springs

Tavira has certainly taken the lead in demonstrating how one community can enthusiastically embrace the principles identified by Blue Zones to live healthier, happier and longer lives.

## Background Information on Blue Zones

Blue Zones are geographic regions where high percentages of centenarians are enjoying remarkably long, full lives. The recipe for longevity is deeply intertwined with community, lifestyle and spirituality.

In 2004, Dan Buettner teamed up with National Geographic to identify pockets around the world where people live measurably longer and better. In these “Blue Zones,” they found that people reach age 100 at rates 10 times greater than in the United States.

After identifying five of the world’s Blue Zones, Buettner and National Geographic took teams of scientists to each location to identify lifestyle characteristics that might explain longevity. These areas include:

*Ikaria, Greece:* People on this tiny Aegean island live eight years longer than Americans do. They experience 20% less cancer, half the rate of heart disease and almost no dementia.

*Loma Linda, CA:* An Adventist community in California, these residents outlive the average American by a decade.

*Sardinia, Italy:* A diet and lifestyle has evolved on this Mediterranean Island since the time of Christ. These mountain villages have produced more male centenarians than anyplace else.

*Okinawa, Japan:* Home to the world’s longest-lived women, these South Pacific islands offer three foods that can help every American live longer.

*Nicoya, Costa Rica:* People in this Central American region are more than twice as likely as the average U.S. resident to reach a healthy age 90.

They found that the lifestyles of all Blue Zones residents shared nine specific characteristics referred to as “the Power 9®”.

Buettner’s subsequent book, *The Blue Zones*, hit the *New York Times* best-seller list and took the author everywhere from Oprah to TED to Bill Clinton’s Health Matters Initiative. The success prompted a new challenge: could health and longevity be improved in the US? Blue Zones are now being built in cities and businesses across the country.

Blue Zones Project experts have gathered the best practices from around the world for creating healthy environments in the places people live, work, learn and play. When an entire community participates -- from worksites and schools to restaurants and grocery stores -- the small changes contribute to huge benefits for all: lowered healthcare costs, improved productivity and, ultimately, a higher quality of life.

The Blue Zones team has been working in Naples, and has expanded to Bonita Springs this year. They are helping establish this area as the next Blue Zone. We hope you’ll be inspired to join the Blue Zones initiative and help us all better our lives.

# Playing by the Rules

## LOOSE IMPEDIMENTS

The rules recognize circumstances when it may be unfair for a player to play the ball as it lies. In January, we discussed potential relief from obstructions - artificial objects existing on the course. This month we consider potential interference from loose impediments. Loose impediments are defined as natural objects such as stones, sticks, leaves, insects, etc. which are not (1) fixed or growing, (2) solidly embedded or (3) adhering to the ball.

Generally, a player is entitled to move a loose impediment unless both the ball and the loose impediment lie either in a bunker or in a water (lateral water) hazard.

## LOOSE IMPEDIMENT TRUE/FALSE QUIZ

Questions:

1. Sand and loose soil are always loose impediments?
2. A solidly embedded stone on the green may not be removed?
3. An insect may be removed from a player's ball?
4. A player's ball is on the green and he is about to putt. A leaf lands on the ball and in the process of attempting to move the leaf, he moves the ball. The player is penalized for moving the ball?
5. Dew and frost are considered loose impediments?
6. When the ball is in motion, a player may move a loose impediment that might influence the movement of the ball?
7. An ant hill is considered a loose impediment?
8. A banana skin that lies near the player's ball in the bunker may be removed without penalty?
9. A player's ball lies on a road and is eligible to take relief from the road as an obstruction. The player elects to play the ball where it lies but moves some of the loose gravel/shell on the road. This results in the player being penalized?
10. It is permissible for a player to remove loose impediments from the area where the ball should be dropped?

Answers:

1. False. Sand and loose soil are only considered loose impediments when they are on the putting green.
2. True. If the stone is partially embedded and can be picked up with ease, it is a loose impediment. If the stone is solidly embedded, it is not a loose impediment and should not be removed.
3. True. A live insect is not considered to be adhering to a ball, thereby the insect is considered a loose impediment and may be removed.  
If the ball is in a bunker or water (lateral water) hazard, the player may not physically touch the ball or insect; however, he or she may take action such as waving a hand or club to encourage the insect to move.  
If the ball lies other than on the green, or in a bunker or hazard, the player may remove the insect with his fingers or blow the insect off the ball. If the ball is on the green, the player may take similar actions but there is no penalty if the ball moves as a result of these actions.
4. False. A player is not penalized for moving his ball on the green if the ball moves while the player is in the process of removing a loose impediment.
5. False. The only place on the course where dew and frost may be removed is on the teeing ground.
6. False.
7. True. The ant hill is considered a cast or heap made by an insect.
8. False. As a natural object, the banana peel is a loose impediment which cannot be removed in a bunker.
9. False. While the road is artificially surfaced and thereby an immovable obstruction, the covering on the road is still considered a loose impediment.
10. True.



## Golf Tip

**ONE OF THE MOST** overlooked components of improving one's golf game is the clubs. All the equipment manufacturers claim every new club will add distance for any golfer. There are a lot of truths in their claims, but one must be properly fit to gain the advantages of new technology.

Most golfers know that lie angle can affect the way the club interacts with the ball and turf at impact. However, an improper lie angle can also promote an incorrect set-up position, which in turn will lead to swing faults.

A full turn is necessary to maximize distance and accuracy. The length of the clubs is a major contributor to this important swing variable. Proper club length puts the golfer in a neutral address position, allowing a full turn and aides in preventing early extension, swaying and sliding.

These are just a few of the many scenarios where properly fit clubs can improve your swing.

full and the route would be impassable; and only partly full, they would be an inviting habitat for alligators. Large alligators, that like the dark.

INDIVIDUAL TRANSPORTATION is what it seems to come back to, giving members greater flexibility (plus a chance to show off their new cars). But what to do about all those other cars, especially at rush hour times.

We could copy the renowned brilliance of the Florida Legislature, which recently proposed adding toll lanes to interstates -- and we could go them one better with ELEVATED lanes. # Curious Sea Creatures

**THE MANATEE**, also known as the sea cow, has been on the endangered species list for over 40 years. Concerned citizens and conservation groups around Florida have worked hard to protect the beloved manatees. In January 2016, after more than four decades on the endangered list, the US Fish and Wildlife Service proposed reclassification; the manatee is now viewed as “threatened”. It is thought that there are over 6,000 manatees living in Florida.

Manatees are HUGE mammals that can range in size from 8-13’ long and can weigh 800-1300 pounds. They are solitary creatures, with the exception of a mother with her new calf. They eat over 60 different types of fresh and salt water plants, usually in shallow waters of depths of just 3 ½ to 6 feet. They use their flippers as scoops, and feed using their extraordinary lips to munch down about 100 pounds of vegetation per day, approximately 10-15% of their body weight, which requires them to graze for up to seven hours a day. They spend approximately 50% of their time sleeping under the water, although they need to resurface every 20 minutes for a quick breath of fresh air, before returning to their slumber. Life is good for this peaceful, salad-loving, nap-taking sea cow, who can live to around 60 years of age.

How likely is it that you could have a chance encounter here in Bonita Bay?

Resident Darla Highley told *BWN* about a recent sighting: “Six visiting high school classmates and I decided to take out the



Bonita Bay Community Association kayaks for a fun SW Florida adventure. We went the ‘go right’ route from the Spring Creek launch. Just before passing under the Tamiami bridge, returning kayakers excitedly reported three manatees, two adults and a juvenile, ‘about a five-minute paddle’ beyond 41. Oaring as gently as possible, our team of three kayaks and one canoe was just about to give up when we spotted a manatee surfacing for a gulp of air. For the next 20 minutes, an adult and a baby coasted under and alongside our boats very close to the surface. They’d occasionally come up for air, and change direction. We were so close that, sadly, we saw several markings where the adult had apparently been struck by a propeller.\* It was a magical kayaking experience that would only have been better were we to have also seen the dolphins reported by another group that morning!”

Also, according to legend, there is a cove in BB known as “Fish Bowl” where manatees tend to congregate during the winter months because of the warmer waters.

How lucky are we to live in Bonita Bay where we can witness this marvel of the sea. If you are fortunate enough to encounter a manatee, be quiet and respectful, take a photograph, and please let us know at *Bay Watch News!*

*\*(Editor’s note: Two of the main causes of death for manatees are habitat destruction and red tide poisoning, but by far the greatest danger is boat strikes.)*

# My Name Is Jose

**“HI. MY NAME IS JOSE,** and I’m 18 years old and attending Florida SouthWestern State College (formerly Edison College) in Fort Myers. I want to tell you my story about how I got here, and why I am so grateful to those who cared about me and helped me. My story is not finished, but I am looking forward to a happier ending than I might have when I was younger ...”

I met Jose when I was volunteering in an after-school tutoring and mentoring program called New Horizons. Founded in 2002, the program works with at risk students who largely come from ESL (English as second language) homes – kids who grow up speaking Spanish at home, and then attend schools where only English is spoken. Jose’s story will help you to understand what stands between young Hispanic students and a productive adulthood, and I think you will find this story to be a cause for hope and encouragement.

Jose came to this country from Mexico, with his parents, when he was one – a brand new baby – and lived briefly in Orlando and then Immokalee before moving to Bonita Springs. Speaking only Spanish, Jose’s father worked as an hourly laborer and agricultural worker, and his mother worked seasonally in the produce packing plant in Immokalee. During season, a shift in the produce plant is often 16 hours; sometimes Jose’s mother came home from a shift, made dinner for the family, and then was called in for another shift. The family moved into a small camping trailer that became their home and, while money was very scarce, they managed to get by.

Jose’s earliest memory of school was about homework – he doesn’t remember which subject – and he asked his mother to help. It was in English, and she had no understanding. The homework was turned in and it was all wrong; still, his mother and father were determined that their son would graduate from high school. They knew it was his only hope to have a better life, and they never let him forget that their expectation was that he would complete high school – but he was always getting poor grades and facing continual frustration.

His brother and sister – now 16 and 15 – came along after a few years, and then another brother was born with a birth defect. The doctors were amazed that the baby survived the surgery to address his problem. Then when he was two, he crawled under a neighbor’s car that was backing up and was run over – causing more trauma and severe pressure on his brain. After more surgery and an extended recovery, his mother calls him her “miracle baby” because he is now 11, in school and doing sixth grade work in the fifth grade.

In the fall of 2014, Jose became certain that he couldn’t graduate. He needed too many credits and needed to pass the ACT with a minimum score to get his diploma, and it seemed to be impossible. His long-time friend, Maria, had tried to get him to join the New Horizons Teen Club for tutoring and mentoring that could help him improve his school work, and he finally attended one day. All the teens knew each and Jose felt like an outsider. He didn’t go back the next day.

Maria and her friend Evelyn insisted that Jose return, and Javier sat down with him and promised to be his friend. Javier was sure that Jose could graduate if he was willing to make the sacrifices, and Jose started to come to Teen Club every day. Ellen Nichols, who founded New Horizons and works with the Teen Clubs, visited his guidance counselor with Jose to make a plan that would lead to graduation.

This plan was not easy – Jose had to do his current senior school work and earn passing grades while studying on his own in other subjects to earn those credits. His friends and New Horizons staff were on board with Jose all the way, and he finished one class after another. But by January of his senior year, it was certain that he would not be able to complete everything to graduate on time.

Nichols and Jose’s parents encouraged Jose to stay with his plan, and he enrolled in Florida SouthWestern State College, contingent upon his high school graduation. When he completed that last course work with a 2.8 grade point and scored a passing grade on the ACT – he had made it! His mother cried when he received his diploma. In his first term in college, he received a 3.0 grade point in his studies in medical technology, and is on the path he started when he joined ROTC at Estero High. He plans to join the Army after college to become a battlefield medic, and then to work in medical technology and health care after the Army.

Jose’s brother and sister are attending New Horizons regularly, and are succeeding in school and moving toward graduation. His parents deserve to be extraordinarily proud of their oldest child, who provides a lesson for us all in perseverance and resilience. But Jose knows that he would likely not be where he is today without the strong support, mentoring and advocacy that he experienced with New Horizons. He gives back by working as a teen counselor at the Estero Teen Club four days per week, and even has counseling success with those students most don’t understand ... Middle Schoolers!

Jose says, “When I came to New Horizons for the second time, I knew this was where I was meant to be and where I

**AS THE END** of the season approaches, I find myself with so many restaurants piquing my interest and little time left to review them. So I decided to spotlight my favorite dining experience this winter---at a new shining star on the horizon of Bonita Springs!

**Petar's Restaurant**, named after its 31-year-old owner/chef, opened recently in the Center of Bonita Springs Plaza at Bonita Beach Rd. and US41. His gracious wife Anna warmly welcomes diners to their 35-seat bistro. While feasting in this cozy eatery, diners can watch Petar and his culinary staff work magic creating mouthwatering dishes. The limited menu allows him to maintain high standards in both quality and presentation of exclusively fresh cuisine he prepares nightly.

The starter section of food offerings features five selections. The Mediterranean salad is an attractive display of local tomatoes, cucumbers, roasted red peppers, Kalamata olives, feta cheese and fresh basil drizzled with homemade creamy balsamic vinaigrette (\$7) -- a savory blend of quality ingredients. Incorporating the subtle flavors of butternut squash, al dente Arborio rice, freshly grated parmesan cheese and fresh herbs, the chef's version of risotto is so rich and creamy that it warrants sharing as an appetizer (\$9).

Six regularly presented entrees, in addition to several nightly specials, are highlighted by Petar's signature dish---lobster linguine (\$33). This luscious meal encompasses perfectly cooked house-made pasta topped with fresh lobster meat and tossed in a scrumptious bisque-based sauce. This is a seafood lover's dream!

A memorable finale for this gourmet dinner is a serving of two homemade crepes filled with fresh bananas and delectable chocolate sauce. The other dessert options consist of crepes with fresh berries and crème anglaise in addition to traditional crème brulee. All are priced at (\$6).

**Petar's**, already a distinguished restaurant providing excellent meals with flawless service provided by an attentive, well trained wait staff, has been discovered by many discriminating diners. Thus, dinner reservations are a must!

## THE NEW MICROSOFT BROWSER “EDGE”

**EVERYONE SEARCHES** the web, whether it is for information, purchasing, leisure or business. Microsoft has introduced its new web browser named Edge in Windows 10. It is available on both PC and mobile devices running Windows 10.

One of Edge’s best and new features is its integration with Cortana, which is Windows 10’s virtual assistant. Cortana will automatically appear as you browse in Edge. Cortana has many features that it can perform. By highlighting any text, right clicking it, then selecting “Ask Cortana,” the user is able to find out information. This is beneficial whether it be for details about a restaurant or just basic information about a certain subject.

Edge also includes a Reading List feature that lets you save articles and webpages for later reading that can be viewed in chronological order. There is a note-taking mode that enables the user to mark a webpage with thoughts, then save that image right to OneNote or share it with another application.

Another feature that is making its debut in Edge is Reading Mode. This feature allows the user to strip out all the extra junk on a webpage aside from the main text and images. This creates the ability to read undistracted. It can be very useful for many sites with all of the advertisements and sidebars to create

a nice, clean reading experience.

An important security feature is that Adobe Flash support is built directly into Edge. Microsoft says it is working with Adobe to make sure that performance is high, and security is the top priority. Edge shares a universal code base and the user interface is designed to adapt to any device the user prefers whether it be a phone, laptop or desktop PC.

Browsing in Edge can definitely be an enjoyable experience with the ability to load pages quickly, scroll smoothly and seems to have far fewer issues than there were with Internet Explorer. It has a clean, attractive, unobtrusive interface. Edge has the same experience on all of its supporting devices, which makes it a favorite. Microsoft has delivered a product that is familiar but gives a fresh look. Give Edge a try and you might find that it is your favorite web browser.
