


The United Fund provides through its 22 Agencies 65 special individual services — services which can and will be used by you and me, our families and the people we come in contact with every day.

A BANKER LOOKS AT THE UNITED WAY

The Case For Unified Fund Drives

Not long ago another United Fund volunteer and I visited the new president of a sizable Buffalo firm and asked him to help us solicit a few corporate gifts on behalf of the current Torch Drive.

Although personally a generous contributor, his response was: "I have just one job, that is to make money for the stockholders of this company. It is my sole responsibility."

Here was a relatively young man who had been concentrating on getting to the top of his organization—but it was hard for us to believe that a man of his intelligence and undoubted ability could have reached the executive suite without some exposure to the philosophy of community service, especially the sound, business-like concept represented by the United Way.

United Funds, Community Chests or Community Welfare Councils are names of similar organizations which exist to raise funds in one cooperative campaign for both the local and national agencies serving the health and welfare needs of their communities. Beginning shortly before World War I and growing steadily since, in 1963 some 2,200 United Funds and Community Chests raised more than \$540,000,000 to support 34,500 voluntary health and welfare agencies. It is estimated that nearly four million volunteers helped raise this money and budget it among service organizations throughout the nation.

After long discussion he was finally convinced that he had a wider responsibility; that much is owed to the community in which he lives and works, and from which his company draws the men and women to keep his factory running. He is now a hard working volunteer, and is, as a matter of fact, taking a keen delight in tackling some of our more difficult prospects.

But the experience set me thinking about the United Way or more particularly, the businessman's attitude toward it. Why do we as businessmen give our time, our money and our service to this cause, and encourage our employees to do so?

My concern deepened as I began to review the problems — some old, some new — which confront Community Chests and United Funds. Here are a few of these problems.

Separate Health Drives

In recent months there has been a renewal of attacks on the United Way concept. These attacks have taken the forms of mailings to physicians, speeches circulated widely to business leaders, articles in publications directed to doctors, and special-pamphlets for health agency volunteers.

Among the arguments advanced are these:

- (1) "The United Way raises less money." The record does not support this argument. Since 1959 United Funds have increased their annual income by 27%. Few independent drives can match this record. For example, one of the major independent health agencies during the same period increased its income by less than 9% and in 1963 raised less money than in 1962. And in several areas where separate campaigns have withdrawn from United Funds, they have suffered considerable loss in income while the United Funds went right on increasing.
- (2) "The separate health drive is a major force for health education, as volunteers distribute printed

I PAY FOR MY KIDS - WHY SHOULD I GIVE?

Agencies which can, charge fees according to the ability of the client to pay, based on a graduated scale. The basic premise is that those who can well afford to pay for services should. Services are never denied to those who can't pay. If fees were not collected from those well able to pay the cost of service, the United Fund would have to raise a great deal more money.

I CAN'T AFFORD TO GIVE!


Let's think this over. Do you mean you can't give anything or can't give what might be considered your "Fair Share"? Only a few cents a day (two minutes of pay) or an hour's pay a month adds up to "Fair Share" giving. This small sum may well mean hope for a sick child, a comforting assist to a family in distress or life itself to the victim of a dread disease; it can mean saving a life through water safety or first aid. Surely this isn't too much when you can pay it any way convenient to you ...over a year's time.


My Wife and I Both Work - SHOULD WE BOTH GIVE?



WHO DO OUR UNITED FUND AGENCIES HELP? The aged and infirm and lonely; the blind and the crippled and other handicapped persons; those lying gravely ill in hospital for whom timely blood transfusions can mean the difference between life and death; young people in trouble; men and women discharged from prison or penitentiary; families with financial and emotional problems; the mentally ill and convalescent; retarded children and those born with brain injuries; people in urgent need of home nursing care; families that have lost all of their possessions by fire: people afflicted with multiple sclerosis; youngsters whose parents cannot afford to send them to summer camp or pay for other forms of organized recreational activities - in fact, people of all walks of life who can benefit from services which are not otherwise available to them.

THEN, WHY SO MANY PICTURES OF LITTLE GIRLS WITH THEIR DOLLS? The 20 member agencies of the United Fund provide such a wide range of services (we counted 112 recently, but probably missed one or two), that it is altogether impossible to embrace them all in a single symbolic photo. 


