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Take Aways and Reflection Questions From the 2018 Synod

Last month the 2018 Ordinary Synod on Young People, Faith and Vocational Discernment wrapped up in Rome. The 3-week gathering of Bishops, young people, and regional delegations was rich with discussion, and at times controversy, over how the Church can more effectively engage and evangelize the next generation of Catholics. While the final text has yet to be released in English, it covers an array of topics and issues relevant to the young Church universal. Far too rich to cover in depth here, I offer a few key takeaways relevant to our local situation in the Diocese of Jefferson City.

Young people desire a Church that listens.

For many young people in our diocese they go to Church and listen to the priest. They sit in PSR and listen to the catechist. They go home and listen to their parents. And when we do ask them to share their thoughts it often becomes a springboard to share our response. At what point Young people bring hope, optimism, gifts and a desire to do we stop and listen deeply to them? Are we attune to their needs? Are we cognizant of the topics and issues that weigh on their hearts? Do we allow them a platform within our ministries or parishes to speak while we listen?


Young people desire a Church that will accompany them on their journey of faith.

Many of our parish programs adopt a school model of faith formation that advances young people through grade-levels until they are confirmed after which many stop coming. What is clear from the synod is that young people desire a Church that walks with them through the joys and challenges of their lives. How are we present to kids when they transition from middle school to high school, or to college and beyond? How do we walk with the kid whose parents are going through a divorce or whose grandparent just died? How do we celebrate the milestones of their lives that are so important to them? How do we help them recognize Jesus in it all?

Young people want to evangelize the Church.

So often we fixate on how we are evangelizing young people. This is a worthy goal. However, it falls short if we don't also allow ourselves to be evangelized by them. serve. They bring a unique perspective, and hold within them the potential our Church desperately needs. The Holy Spirit is trying to tell the Church something at this critical juncture in Her history. Let's allow ourselves to receive that message through the young people in our midst, and create a space to be evangelized by the next generation.

The 2018 Synod on Young People, Faith and Vocational Discernment has Concluded

The much anticipated 2018 synod on Young People, Faith, and Vocational Discernement concluded on October 28th. The 3 week synod brought together bishops, young people, and regional representatives from around the world to listen to the current and next generation of Catholics, and explore how She can more effectively share the Gospel with young people worldwide. The final document was passed on October 27th, and will be available in English in the weeks ahead. It explores a wide range of topics relevant to the Young Church today. While several of the subjects addressed in the final document provoked controversy and debate, overall the final document calls the Church to be one that listens to, learns from, includes and accompanies young people on their journey of faith.

Youth Synod Urges Accompaniment and Endorses Women in Church Leadership By Gerard O'Connell, America Magazine

In the final document from the Synod on Young People, the Faith and Vocational Discernment, the synod fathers wrote about the great diversity of situations of young people in a globalized world marked by grave injustices, poverty and violence, as well as the opportunities and the challenges they face in the new digital world. The document also covers the phenomenon of migration, sexuality in the lives of young people, the various kinds of abuses in the church, the role of women in the church, synodality and what it means to build a synodal church, and the importance of discernment in the life of the church and of young people as they seek to find their vocation in life.

The final document was approved on the evening of Oct. 27 by a majority vote. But not everyone was happy with the result, which was released to the press in Italian at the end of the session, together with the voting results. A two-thirds majority (166 votes) was required for its approval, and the text was approved by a vote of 191 (in favor) to 43 (against). The opposition to the text did not come as a complete surprise as many synod fathers were distinctly unhappy that the text was only available to them in Italian, a language not all are fluent in, while others do not want change in the church's approach to some issues.

I pray the retreat was just what you needed to re-energize your ministries and your relationship with Christ!





National Vocations Awareness Week

National Vocation Awareness Week (NVAW) is an annual weeklong celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated to promote vocations to the priesthood, diaconate and consecrated life through prayer and education, and to renew our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations. NVAW began in 1976 when the U. S. bishops designated the 28th Sunday of the year for NVAW. In 1997, this celebration was moved to coincide with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which falls on January 13 in 2013. Beginning in 2014, NVAW was moved to the first full week of November.







Being thankful is at the heart of our faith tradition. Moreover, Thanksgiving gives us a great chance to organize some prayer and fellowship for our youth. Use this month of where we give thanks to encourage your youth to give back and be grateful for all the blessings God has given them.

- Arrange a fasting and prayer progressive dinner


St. Andrew

Sometimes in ministry you need to make time for yourself. Self-care is important for balance in Youth Ministry. The Saintly Catechist

The director of our faith formation program asked if I could help her develop a saints' syllabus for the eighth- and ninthgrade classes. This was right up my alley.

We met for coffee to work on the syllabus, which would complement our regular curriculum. Our discussion turned to the canonization process: how does someone become a saint? As we talked about the steps in the canonization process, I wondered, "What do we have to do to be saints today?"

The answer is threefold: we have to be people of joy, love, and contemplation.

We do not find joy in the pursuit of pleasure. We find joy in the pursuit of communion. Joy does not exist in isolation. Joy exists in our relationship with others. Joy turns our gaze outward. It is not simply a good feeling or emotion—it involves entering into relationship with others. Catechists are saints because they form their classrooms into joyful communities where faith can be explored and shared.

Activity of the Month:


This new take on a classic teambuilder is the perfect activity for Vocations Awareness Week, but can be applied to any theme related to discernment, trust, or making decisions. This activity works best in a large area or outdoors.

Setup: Scatter a series of obstacles such as chairs, tables, balls, etc around the "playing area."

- Ask for a volunteer from the group. This
 person will be blindfolded and must make
 their way through the "minefield" by listening
 to the rest of the crowd.
- The group verbally takes them through the obstacles but cannot enter the minefield themselves. Members of the group are encouraged to all shout at once!
- If the person hits a mine they must return to the start. Another volunteer can then enter, but feel free to rearrange the obstacles

For Discussion:

 How did it feel to be blindfolded walking through the minefield?



3. What might be one way this activity can relate to trusting or communicating with God?

Connect:

When discerning where God is calling you, there are many obstacles that get in your way. That's why it is so important to listen, communicate and trust others and trust God through the process of discernment. As you discern where God is calling you take the time to pray, trust, and listen to safely reach the other side!

In today's world, there is a lot of emphasis placed on *knowing* and *doing* and not so much on *being*. In other words, we find ourselves focused on *what* we know and do and not enough on *who* we are. As catechists, we have the privilege of helping those we teach to develop a deeper understanding of who they are in relation to a loving God, in whose image they are created. One of the primary ways we do this is

through leading reflective prayer (also known as meditation).

Reflective prayer/meditation is not something new. (I was once accused of teaching "New Age" practices by encouraging catechists to lead reflective prayer!) The Gospels tell us that Jesus often went off alone to pray; it doesn't say that he went off to "recite prayers." As important and enriching as it is to recite traditional prayers, we also need to learn the art of just resting in God's presence and meditating on or contemplating some aspect of God's truth, beauty, and goodness.
