

What is EU Referendum?

A vote in which everyone (or nearly everyone) of voting age can take part to decide an outcome of a political decision.

The EU referendum held on Thursday 23 June, to decide whether the UK should leave or remain in the **European Union**.

Who voted in the Referendum?

British, Irish and Commonwealth citizens aged 18 or over who are resident in the UK or Gibraltar and who are eligible to vote.

UK citizens resident overseas were also eligible to vote, provided they have been registered to vote at a UK address in the last 15 years.

What is Brexit

The word 'Brexit' is an abbreviation of the words 'British' and 'exit', used to describe the United Kingdom's possible exit from the European Union.

What was the outcome of the vote

Britain voted to leave the European Union.
Leave won by 52% to 48%.

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1. Announcement of #Brexit

24 June 2016

2. It was announced that the current International travel situation is not going to change for the foreseeable future, which means EU travel as well as visa situation remains the same.

26 June 2016

3. EU students who are eligible under current rules to receive loans and grants will continue to do so for courses they are currently enrolled on or about to start this coming year. This includes the EU funded courses such as Erasmus.

The referendum result does not affect students studying in the EU, beneficiaries of Erasmus+ or those considering applying in 2017.


