



Entry of Norton in Hales in Britain in Bloom 2018

After a very long history of taking part in the Bloom' competitions, Norton in Hales became Britain in Bloom Champion of Champions in 2015. It was difficult then to see how we could top that pinnacle and of course it could not be done. As a result the village has been resting on its laurels for two years, but then, at the turn of the year, the decision was made to enter a competition in 2018. The team's efforts had not ceased during those two years of absence, but there was not quite the same incentive without the judging day goal; hence the entry in Heart of England in Bloom this year, in the village category.

Theme

At an early stage of the 2018 year planning, the main theme for the year was decided on as 'Nature in Habits'.

Key objectives for the current year are as follows:

- To reduce watering requirements by the replacement of planters by surface beds, and greater use of mulching
- Recycling plants and use of sustainable plantings
- Improvement of environmental habitats and the use of pollinator friendly plants

It is a community entry and not just about one or two people who plant some flower beds! Whilst there is a core of people who drive the project, many others take part to a lesser or greater degree to ensure that our local environment is one to be envied by others and enjoyed by those who live here














Summer Planting

May/June 2018

Plants used in the scheme this year include:

Bidens, Marigolds, Geraniums, Begonias,
Cosmos, Salvias, and Coleus.

Some of these that were difficult to source or are easy to grow were grown by members of the group in their own gardens.

Volunteers from across the village have taken ownership a certain area and are responsible for watering and deadheading over the season. Rainwater collectors are available behind the bus shelter and at the village hall and the group aim to be water wise at all times.

Overwintering and spring plants were recycled to another part of the village—either a permanent bed or The Hinds Head planters.








Colour planting theme for the year

Members of the group expressed the desire to have a fairly colourful theme this year, majoring in on yellows, orange and purple. This could be seen to great effect in the spring with wallflowers and tulips, and has again been used for the summer bedding.

Village road sign beds have been enhanced this year with new stone from the local area. The

bedding at these main routes into the village share the planting theme throughout the year.














Winter work and planting

Working parties meet almost every Monday throughout the year. A list of jobs is created and volunteers meet up and work through them. Many volunteers look after a certain area which may require extra hands at times.

A list of jobs goes out to members of the group in advance so that there is a coordinated approach, however in addition to this several volunteers will work on projects in their own time throughout the year.



Spring in the village

Over 400 tulip bulbs were planted in beds, barrels and planters around the village in Autumn 2017. Along with 1000 wallflowers and daffodils also planted by the group there was a very colourful display across the village. Wallflowers were also sold to anyone who wished to support the planting scheme. In early summer members of the group and willing volunteers set to removing and storing the bulbs for use next year and sorting the beds for the summer plants.

Other plants were added to the barrels and were then recycled to the Hinds Head pub planters or the beds on the village square. The cherry tree pictured below put on a fine display on the village green.

Much work is put into maintaining the beds at the cricket club and the fine displays are enjoyed by many people. Cutting the hedge back has widened the beds and sustainable planting is a key theme. This is a large area and the dedication of members of the group makes the difference. The planting themes here mirror those of the centre of the village.





Parton's Pool

Habitat work begins!

This area is owned by a local farmer, who kindly allows the group to manage it for wildlife and allows the villagers to enjoy its tranquillity and wildlife.

Over recent years the tree cover had become excessive and this winter a number of people agreed to thin it out. None of the brash or large branches were removed from the site. Everything was reused to improve the hedging and create new wild-life habitats. In addition those that worked on this project thoroughly enjoyed climbing trees, using chainsaws and creating the dead hedges, which will last for many years.

A few volunteers have agreed to lead the management of Parton's Pool and have developed a seasonal work calendar that has ensured this area is managed effectively and supports our local wildlife population.















Another project undertaken at the Pool was to replace the steps down to the river which had become unsafe and to line up the stepping stones across the river. Most of the work was undertaken by the village group who maintain and improve footpaths in the parish.

The work undertaken has greatly improved this unique feature that those going for a walk greatly enjoy. During the previous winter the group erected a temporary fence to protect the river bank form erosion. During spring plants were again starting to establish. Wild garlic grows profusely along the banks.

The group also maintains a bench and information at the Pool. The site provides regular sightings of kingfisher and heron and greater-spotted woodpecker and blackcap both nest here.









Crocus Planting

For the last 3 years the group has worked with the Rotary Group to publicise their work in eliminating polio across the world. Newcastle Rotary Club have supplied us with several thousand crocus corms and children from the village school have planted them.

This has made makes the children aware of the problems of disease and gives them ownership of an area of the village.

The Bloom Group continue to support this initiative and it received publicity in the local press.




Wildflowers at remote graveyard

There is a remote graveyard out of the village along Bearstone Road which has a lovely view across the valley from the far end. A strip along the hedge was selected for wildflowers. The ground was prepared in early Spring and native wildflower seeds sown.

This project had a focus on our theme Nature in Habitats and it is hoped that we have provided more pollinating plants and seeds for birds later in the season, such as the goldfinch—this photo was taken in the village by the Bloom Group and shared on the Norton in Hales website.

Talk by Ross Underwood of Hodnet Hall Gardens

Head Gardener at Hodnet Hall gardens, Shropshire presented a talk entitled 'Shropshire to Sikhim' in April 2018.

The event was organised by the Bloom Group to raise awareness of the work being done in the village and to encourage participation from anyone wishing to volunteer. The event was a huge success and the group covered the cost of the talk and the free hot-pot supper which was provided to encourage attendance!









The Jubilee bed had long been a problem area, having thin top soil over hardcore!

Various planting schemes had been tried, to no avail. The solution was seen as making a raised bed and grassing the area outside a shrubbery.

This project was a joint effort with the parish council; they purchased local sandstone and topsoil whilst the group provided the labour and plantings.

The shrubs were also thinned out and underplanted suitably for the conditions.


Those approaching the village now enjoy the blooms and the sandstone bed matches those across the village.

A VILLAGE group has its sights set on a Heart of England in Bloom award after previous success.

Norton in Bloom has announced it will enter the national awards scheme and work is already underway to get Norton-in-Hales' green spaces ship shape.

Nigel Passmore from the group said: "The village has won this category many times in the past so every effort is being made to repeat the village's continuous run of success in the bloom competition."

"Plans are well in hand and there are regular work parties to ensure ongoing stunning flower displays; these are attended by many dedicated members of the bloom group. This year's theme is 'Nature in Habitats' to reflect the diversity of wild-

life that is being encouraged in the village environs.
"In addition two separate wildflower areas have been sown to reflect the theme.

"The bloom group has also arranged several community events including an open gardens day in the summer and a visit to Hodnet Hall gardens. Also scheduled is a talk on the subject of bats at the Jubilee Hall and a bat and moth walk in September."

Norton in Bloom was named Champion of Champions in the 2015 RHS Britain in Bloom awards. The group meets in the Hind Head on the second Thursday of each month.

Judging by Britain in Bloom representatives for this year's awards is expected to take place towards the end of July.

Nature in Habitats

A main aim for the Group in 2018 was to increase the use of pollinator friendly plants and to improve, and increase awareness of the natural environment. To this end we have:

Used more open pollinated plants

Planted a memorial small leaf lime tree

Encouraged pollinators by having honeybees in an apiary at the wildlife pool

Given school children the opportunity to build a bug hotel

Constructed a log pile and large dead hedge and have opened up the tree canopy at the pool

Sown wildflowers in the village centre and graveyard.

Put up Tawny Owl nest boxes and bat boxes

Held a talk on bats and have planned an evening bat walk later in the year

A section in the monthly village 'Messenger' providing advice on how to manage gardens for wildlife

Mick Brassington was a parish and county councillor for many years. He also ran the council front gardens competition and kept the In Bloom group going for many years. To mark his passing, the Parish Council and Bloom group have provided a tree and memorial plaque in a new bed on the village green.

The ground level bed had been envisaged as also serving to be more environmentally friendly than the very thirsty planters, which are now removed. In order for the bed to be maintained local residents living near the bed kindly volunteered to water and care for the plants.
