The church at Sutterby, whilst not of monastic origin, was gifted to nuns in Chester in 1219 and indeed was surrounded by monastic institutions, such as Kirkstead Abbey. St Leonard's Chapel is the *capella ante portas* of the great Cistercian house and is an exquisite, tiny Early English church.

This is the first of a number of talks, which will be putting Sutterby into its local, historical context.

Professor Stocker has offered an all day workshop where we will be learning about stone tooling, reviewing photographs of the recently excavated stones to see what we can discern and then we will have a hands-on session finding and recording tooling marks from around the church. Of particular interest to those involved with the recent dig, but this event is open to all volunteers.
