

Happy anniversary SWP

Somerset residents are marking a significant double anniversary. It is two decades since all six Somerset councils - five districts and the county – agreed to jointly help households waste less, recycle more and save money. And it is 10 years since that agreement created Somerset Waste Partnership (SWP) to unify services, improve efficiency and secure savings.

There will be much more in the next briefing on what SWP has achieved, and more, too, on the progress planned for the coming decades.

Drivers and loaders wanted

Assisted collection review

During September, SWP carried out a review of its assisted collection service. Letters were sent to over 5,500 households registered for this enhanced service, asking residents to confirm their continued need. Positive requests for assistance have reduced to just over 3,500.

The review is carried out every few years to ensure that the correct resources for this vital service are maintained, while still providing value for money.

Do not be an autumn waster

Autumn is a great time to avoid household waste by not buying one-use costumes or decorations for Halloween or bonfire night.

End Use Register

SWP has launched the latest End Use Register. This guide gives an easy-to-read picture of the next destination of materials collected both at the kerbside and through recycling sites. In 2016/17 Somerset residents reused and recycled 128,154 tonnes of waste, saving an estimated 122,638 tonnes of carbon emission, with 96% recycled in the UK. Recycle Foil in your black box

Somerset residents are being urged to renew efforts to recycle aluminium foil. To make that easier, all foil can now be recycled in the same box – usually the black one – as food and drink cans.

Somerset Waste Partnership (SWP) wants to collect all aluminium foil, such as from take-away containers, trays from festive mince pies, lids from some food packaging, and clean aluminium wrapping from Christmas cooking.

Metallised plastic foil, such as pet food pouches, cannot be taken. To check, squash the foil - if it springs back, it is plastic based and not recyclable.

At the end of your washing-up, rinse foil used for food to remove the worse of any contamination, scrunch it all together so it will not blow away, and add it to your black box so it can be easily spotted by the collection crew.
