SPEAKERS



Mary Hao has been the County's Human Resources Director since February 2016. She began her career in public service working for the University of California for 4 years in its Office of Labor Relations. She then went to the City and County of San Francisco where she worked for over sixteen years. She spent 14 of those 16+ years in the Department of Human Resources negotiating and administering labor agreements and advising departments in employee relations matters. Her last two years with the City were spent managing the human resources function at the Juvenile Probation Department. Mary was born in Taiwan and immigrated to the US when she was 5 years old. She grew up in the public school system in San Francisco and then attend UCLA where she earned a degree in history and a minor in Asian American studies.



Dr. David Yoshihara has been in public education for over two decades having worked in K-12, community colleges and universities. He has served in unified districts, elementary districts, high school districts, and county offices of education. Dr. Yoshihara has worked in all major areas of education from curriculum and instruction to business services and human resources. He received his doctorate in organizational leadership from the University of La Verne. His current foci have been on addressing issues of inequity, improving instructional leadership in schools, and increasing student voice in K-12 education. Some of his major accomplishments include the formation of a first-of-its kind music immersion program to close the academic achievement gap and an innovative use of facility space utilizing master lease agreements. Dr. Yoshihara has served on various boards and commissions including but not limited to First 5 of Sacramento, Asian American Symphony Association, and the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. He currently serves as the Superintendent of the Tamalpais Union High School District in southern Marin County.



Garrett Toy has been the Town Manager for the Town of Fairfax for a little over 4 years. He has 30 years of experience working in local government. Prior to coming to Fairfax, Garrett worked for the County of Marin as an Administrative Services Manager in the Community Development Agency for 8 months. Before the County of Marin, he was the Director of Business Assistance and Housing Services (BAHS) for the City of Morgan for 13.5 years. As the Director of BAHS, he was responsible for all the City's redevelopment, economic development, and affordable housing activities. During his time in Morgan Hill, he oversaw the development of over 1,000 affordable housing units, assisted with the construction of numerous community facilities (e.g., Community and Cultural Center), negotiated the developments of a 650,000 sq. ft. shopping center and two business parks, and facilitated public/private development in downtown. Garrett has also worked for the cities of Stockton, Fairfield, and San Jose in various capacities. He has a BA in legal studies and Masters in Public Policy both from UC Berkeley. He currently lives in Terra Linda with his family.
