If you teach at a school that has recently instituted *e-learning days*, here's a list of free online resources and tools to design and create learning activities and assignments for your students. In the list below, many have a short video overview or tutorial of how to use it with your students. These tools range anywhere from music theory lessons and exercises to playing videos and composing. *New!* There are some detailed how to videos for Flipgrid, how to create a screencast, and a list of online music available for your students.

- Assign measures from band music or practice etudes. Students can record their practice and progress on Flipgrid. Be sure to share practice strategies they can use to improve.
- Sight Reading Factory exercises customized to key signatures, range, rhythms and overall difficulty. \*Teacher subscription needed
- Watch a performance of the Berlin Philharmonic on the Digital Concert Hall and write a review.
- Personal reflection of at home practice.
- Watch Jupiter artist Harry Watters host a daily warm-up livestream, focusing on the fundamentals for brass musicians of all levels. \*Begins March 16, 2020 @ 11:00 AM EDT
- Record a video of improvising on the B flat scale.
- Write out the melody to a common folk song and using FLAT (or any online notation software),
  have your students create a variation and record on Flipgrid.
- Using EDPuzzle or Quizizz, introduce a new music concept or review one previously learned. With EDPuzzle, create your own video and upload or search from existing ones.
- Give a private or small group lesson online to your students using Google Meet.
- Have students use a tuner and complete an Intonation Survey submitted by Adam Gohr
