



POINT IN TIME RESULTS 2011

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BOWIE COUNTY

The Texas Homeless Network annually coordinates a Pointin-Time homeless survey for communities in the Texas Balance of State Continuum of Care during the last week in January. The "known location" methodology is used with volunteers surveying everyone found at sites identified by the community where persons suffering from homelessness are known to congregate. The resulting survey sample is represented by people in homeless situations and persons



who are at risk of becoming homeless. The number of survey responses does not represent the total population suffering from homelessness, so estimates are provided in this report. This information is used by local communities in the development of short and long-term strategies to alleviate homelessness.

Average age of all respondents is 27.4

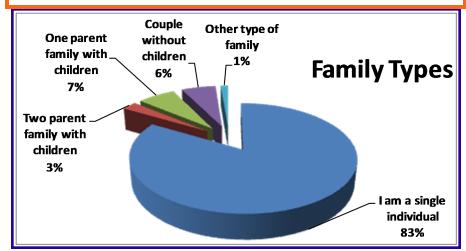
How you can Help

The gender breakdown is 63.75% male and 36.25% female.

51.3% of those surveyed reported their race as white African American and 48.1% White

2% stated their ethnicity was Hispanic/Latino.

This survey represents up to 205 people. 175 Adults and 30 Children.



56.5% of respondents fit HUD's definition of homeless.

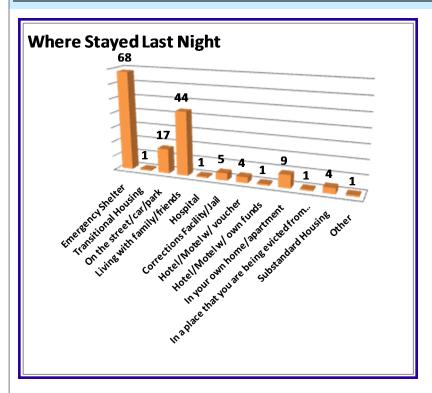
The median age of the adult respondents from Bowie County was 49.7.

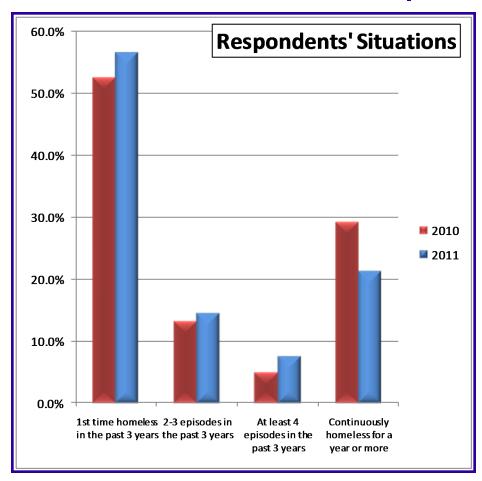
POPULATION ESTIMATES AND HISTORY

Length of Stay

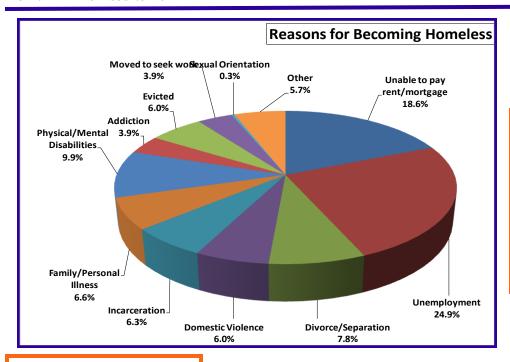
- <u>56.6%</u> described their situation as the first time homeless in three years
- 33.6% reported not having a separate episode of homelessness in the last 12 months
- For those not born in Bowie County the average year they moved to Bowie County was 2003.

The median age respondents became homeless for the first time is 40.

With the range of homelessness from one day to 30 years, the median length of homelessness was 11 months, which rose from last year's median of 9 months.

^{1 §11302.} General definition of homeless individual: (a) In general For purposes of this chapter, the term "homeless" or "homeless individual or homeless person" includes- 1. an individual who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence; and 2. an individual who has a primary nighttime residence that is – A. a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designed to provide temporary living accommodations (including welfare hotels, congregate shelters, and transitional housing for the mentally ill); B. an institution that provides a temporary residence for individuals intended to be institutionalized; or C. a public or private place not designed for, or ordinarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings.

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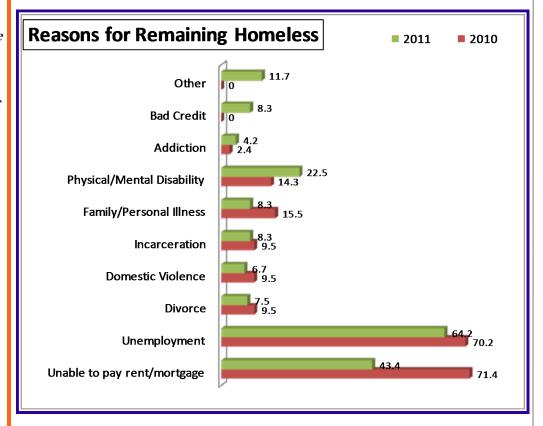


The two most cited reasons for becoming and remaining homeless in Comal County were unemployment and the inability to pay rent/mortgage

The unifying condition for virtually all of Texas' homeless population is extreme poverty.

Furthermore, many people who are homeless also experience some type of personal vulnerability that places them at risk, such as:

- Family Violence
- Physical disability or chronic medical problems
 - Mental Illness
 - Substance Abuse
- Developmental disability or brain injury
 - Criminal background

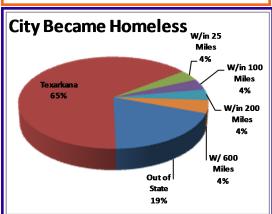


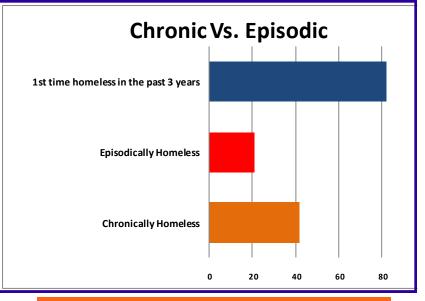
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CHRONIC VS. EPISODIC



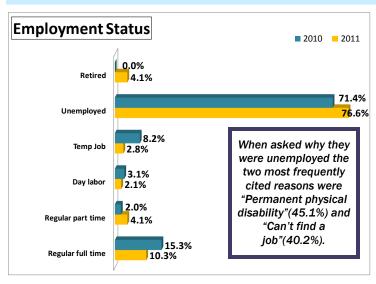


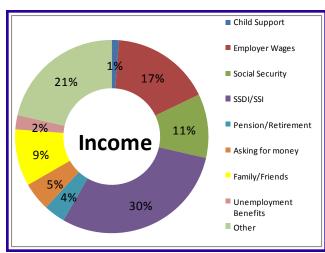




A chronically homeless person is an unaccompanied disabled individual who has been continuously homeless for over one year.

EDUCATION & EMPLOYMENT

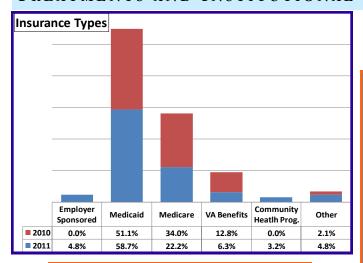




- <u>64.4%</u> of respondents report attaining a high school diploma or higher degree in this sample.
- 35.6% did not graduate high school and 8.2% of those did not pass 8th grade.
- 57.4% of respondents indicated that they were able to work and 19.3% are working (10.3% full time).
- Those that work average 30.5 hours per week and their median monthly income was \$592.50.
- However, <u>76.6%</u> are unemployed and the median length of unemployment is <u>ten months</u>; which fell from last year's median of 24 months..
- When asked where they get income the top four responses in order were: <u>SSDI/SSI</u>, <u>Other sources</u>, <u>Employer wages</u>, <u>and Social Security</u>.

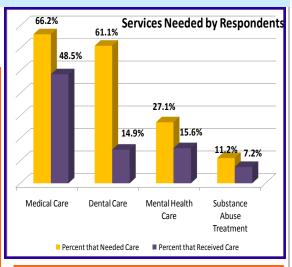

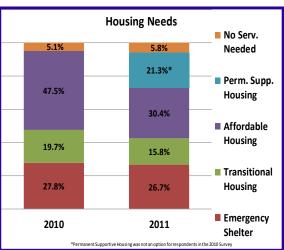

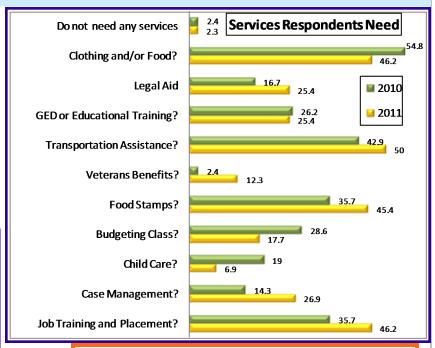
