THE POWER OF TODAY

"Lend ear and listen :On this day, you become a nation"

Right as the Jewish people are about to enter the land of Israel, Moshe addresses us and tells us that "on this day" we become a nation of Hashem. One second, we were taken out of Egypt and given the Torah almost 40 years earlier. God, therefore, had taken us as his nation decades before. Why then does Moshe find it fit to begin his charge by saying "on this day"? What does today have to do with it?

Many commentators explain that Moshe is trying to emphasize that we should appreciate Torah each day as if "today" is the day that it was given on Sinai. Let's explore another approach.

The Talmud tells us that if a person is careful to say "shema" every morning and evening but one evening he neglects to say, it is as if he has never said "shema" before. How is it possible that by simply missing one night one could erase all that he had done for years before?

The Dubno Magid relates the following parable: Long before the invent of cell phones, satellite communication and even walkie talkies, when a commander would send his troops to war, he would station soldiers along the way between the command station and the battle field. The idea was that in order to properly relay messages to and from the battle front, each stationed soldier would have to remain in his place so he could both still see to soldier before him while still being seen by the soldier behind him. If one soldier would move, the entire chain of communication would be broken.

Each day we "charge "our connection with Hashem by saying "shema". We plug back into the t connection that began thousands of years ago. Just like if one soldier would move from his spot the commander's communication is broken, so to if a person

neglects to say "shema" he has broken his chain of connection and will have trouble fully "charging" like he would be able to had the connection never been broken.

Similarly, Moshe tells the Jews: "today you become a nation" because each day we have to reconnect to Torah and mitzvos in order to keep the strong connection that we forged at Har Sinai. If for one day we don't appreciate this connection, the chain becomes broken. Each day we consider it as if "today" is the day that the Torah has been given. Today is a very important day!

Why do we say the same special Kaddish that mentions Moshiach for Siyumim and Funerals?

Because a Siyum is the celebration of reaching a goal in learning, which helps bring *Moshiach*, and when a person has passed away it is as if they have reached their intended goal in life in serving Hashem and that also helps to bring *Moshiach*.

This past Monday the Yeshivas Doresh high school students went to protest against the Iran deal by Congresswoman Debbie Wassermann Schulz's



office in Aventura. The protest started at 5:30. First Mr. Robert Weneck, Master Of Ceremonies of the event and President of News Media Consulting Inc., started off by saying that he met President Truman, Truman asked him to make a promise to him, "No matter who is in the White House, that Israel would always have a strong voice, so that we would always have a strong ally in the middle east that we could trust". After Mr. Weneck introduced Rabbi Lipsker, of the shul of Bal Harbour to say the prayer for all armed forces in Israel and the United States, that are serving across the world. Then they called up the Mayor of Aventura, Ms. Enid Weisman to sing the National Anthem. They then called up Mr. Mike Pregent founder and director of Veterans against the Deal and former intelligence officer. They are representing over 36 years of veteran's who've lost their limbs and their lives because of Iran and their allies. First Mr. Pregent got up and explained how it was a terrible deal. He then said that he had brought some friends from his organization, first he introduced Staff Sergeant Robert Bartlett, he told us how he got injured in 2005 from an IED, and about his army experience. Mr. Pregent then called up the second guest speaker Staff Sergeant Brian Mast who is a Republican candidate running for Congress in Florida's 18th Congressional district. And he told us how he served in the United States armed forces for 12 years, Brian's service also included the honor of serving under the

elite Joint Special Operations Command (JSOC) as a bomb disposal expert, and even sacrificed his own legs while disarming an IED to make sure the United States and Israel were safe. He spoke to us about his experience and how he saw his brothers and sisters being blown up and limbs torn off sort of like himself from Iran's own attacks, or giving money to the Taliban, and several other terrorist groups and countries. Mr. Weneck then spoke about the deal again and about how we need a different deal. Dr. Martin Karp who is on the school board of Miami-Dade county public school district 3 and organizer of the protest then spoke about what Chamberlain did in 1938, he skipped all the obvious signs about Hitler yemach shemo vezichro (may his name be erased), so to in 2015, Obama is also ignoring the signs of Hassan Rouhani the Iranian President. And this is part of the reason they had a Holocaust that killed millions of people in the first place. So to if Iran gets nuclear weapons there will be another Holocaust. We then went over to Mr. Weneck to thank him, after that we went to Sergeant Bartlett to thank him, we then went to Sergeant Mast and thanked him. We then took a



picture with Sergeant Mast, Sergeant Bartlett and Mr. Damon Rosen their unofficial photographer. After that we went back to the Yeshiva.
