## From The Principal

**NEWS FLASH!** Term 3 Student Free School Development Days are Monday 22 July and Friday 30 August.

After much consultation with the College Board we have made the decision to move the 14 October Student Free School Development Day forward to Friday 30 August. This will enable the school's teaching staff the opportunity to work with Associate Professor Lorraine Hammond on initiatives around quality teaching and instruction. This means that, other than the final day of the year, 20 December, Friday 30 August will be the final Student Free day for 2019. There will be further reminders of this change of date, but for now please make alternative arrangements for the care of your children on the following dates:

Monday 22 July and Friday 30 August

From 2020 the school will revert to holding these Student Free School Development Days on the first day of every Term. Thank you for your understanding and please accept our apologies for the change to our published calendar. Year 12 students will not be disadvantaged by this change, as we are trialling Friday 18 October as a final day for Year 12 students – 3 weeks later than in 2018.

### School Uniform

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank all students and their parents who have made an effort to maintain the school's uniform through the first cold weather of 2019. The school has an almost 100% record when it comes to students wearing the two official school polo shirts, but our standards start to slip when the cold weather sets in and the temptation to wear "any" jumper creeps in. For those parents who are unable to purchase the school jumper, or long pants/tracksuit pants, please remember that alternatives must be navy blue in colour without logos and designs and that leggings are not considered acceptable for school wear. Congratulations and keep up the good work to all parents/carers and students who are making this effort regardless of their circumstances.

Why do school's enforce a dress code/uniform? There are a few key reasons, but the three most important ones are:

1. Helps with identification of Gilmore College students on grounds and on excursions.
2. Cuts the cost of clothing for school down for parents – prevents school from becoming a daily “fashion parade”.
3. Fosters positive workplace habits. At the end of the day we are training our young people for their future careers and demonstrating pride in your appearance and compliance with workplace codes (eg. high visibility and boots for safety, or button up shirt for formal presentation in commerce) is a skill valued by all employers.



## Cold or flu?

### Know the difference



Colds are very common. They are caused by about 200 different viruses. There is no vaccine for a cold.



The flu is a viral infection affecting your nose, throat and sometimes your lungs. A vaccine is available for the flu.



Good hygiene reduces the spread of colds and flu, especially after coughing and sneezing.

### Colds and flu treatments



Get lots of rest



Drink plenty of water

Saline nasal sprays or decongestants for a blocked or runny nose



Take throat lozenges for a sore throat



Do not use cough medicines for children younger than six years old.

**✗ Myth:** The flu is not a serious illness.

**✓ Fact:** The flu is a highly contagious and potentially life-threatening disease.

**✗ Myth:** Colds and the flu can be treated with antibiotics

**✓ Fact:** Antibiotics won't cure a cold or flu. Antibiotics only work against bacteria not viral infections.

**✗ Myth:** Vitamin C supplements can prevent the flu or colds.

**✓ Fact:** There is no evidence to support vitamin C supplements as a way of preventing colds or flu.

**✗ Myth:** Healthy people don't need to be vaccinated.

**✓ Fact:** Everyone can benefit from the flu vaccine. If you are at higher risk group, the vaccine is free.

**✗ Myth:** You can catch a cold or the flu from cold weather or getting caught in the rain.

**✓ Fact:** The flu or colds are caused by viruses and not by cold climates or being exposed to cold air.

**✗ Myth:** I'm pregnant, so I shouldn't have the flu jab because it will affect my baby.

**✓ Fact:** The flu shot is safe for pregnant women at all stages of their pregnancy.

## Mission to Matagarup



*On Wednesday 12 June, I took a small group of Aboriginal and Intercultural Studies students to Matagarup, on a mission to better understand the significance of the place to the Whadjuk people.*

We first learned that Matagarup means 'leg deep' and is the original name for the area, also known as Heirisson Island. By walking around the island we could see the shallow waters described in the name brimming with shellfish, dgildgit and other wildlife, like kooljak. We also saw plenty of baby koorlbardi and three female yongas.



Finally, having avoided the rain all day, we found the statue of Yagan that we had learned about in class. It was opened in 1984 and students were disgusted to learn that 'vandals' had beheaded the statue, twice. When we sat down to lunch, we googled Matagarup and found that more recently, the island has been used by Noongar people as a site to protest against government decisions on Native Title and the closure of remote communities.

Before catching the train home, we ventured into the Western Australian Art Gallery. Students viewed a beautiful exhibition by Malik's Pop, Lance Chadd and a powerful piece by Sally Morgan, whose book "My Place" they had just read.

The excursion was a rich learning experience filled with plenty of fresh air and exercise and I hope to take more students next year.

# Remembering Indigenous Service 2019

*During Reconciliation Week, a ceremony is held at the Kings Park War Memorial with the aim of acknowledging and honouring the service of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men and women. 21 students, Miss Brown and Mr Szewczak represented the College at this event.*

Uncle Mort Hansen performed a Welcome to Country, didgeridoo playing and a Smoking Ceremony along with traditional dancers from Wesley College. Governor of Western Australia, Mr Kim Beazley, spoke to the crowd about the importance of Reconciliation Week and this year's subject, "Grounded in truth, walk together with courage." Mr Beazley said that we should do just that, tell the truth, teach the truth and support each other. He pointed out that the job of reconciliation is now in the hands of our children and several speakers commented that it was wonderful to see so many young people present.

Mrs Shirley Mooney described her upbringing, explaining how when she was little, her dream was to go to war because that is where all of her family had went. She told us about how Aboriginal women, who had enlisted as nurses in WWI, were posted on ships to take care of returning soldiers. They were responsible for saving many Australian lives and worked in horrific conditions when antibiotics were not yet commonly used.

We heard from Mt Lawley High School and Winthrop Primary School choirs and enjoyed complimentary sandwiches and hot drinks on the lawn. Afterwards, we took a stroll on the footbridge before returning to school for Period 5.

## Order in CLZ8!

*On Friday 14 June, Miss Brown's 9.5s took part in a mock trial. Ranesch, represented by Jai, pled not guilty to the charge of vandalism however, the prosecution team (Raighne and John) made a strong case and introduced new evidence at the last minute which resulted in further charges of perjury and fabricating evidence.*

As witness after witness took the stand, were sworn in and told their side of the story, the evidence pointed pretty clearly to Ranesch's guilt.

The jury deliberated for a short time before returning and foreman Gurpreet delivered the verdict of guilty. Judge Kashvi sentenced Ranesch to 6 years of incarceration at Casuarina prison with no chance of an early release. Sources say that the public gallery did get rowdy at times but Sheriff Stuart made sure everything stayed in control.

At the end of the lesson, justice had been served although we all look forward to the possibility of civil action to follow.


