The Stonewall Riots were a series of violent demonstrations by members of the gay (LGBT) community against a police raid that took place in the early morning hours of June 28, 1969, at the Stonewall Inn in the Greenwich Village neighborhood of Manhattan, New York City. The riots are widely considered to constitute the most important event leading to the gay liberation movement and the modern fight for LGBTQ+ rights in the United States.

The Stonewall Riots were led by five local queer and transgender people of color activists that were fed up with the constant mistreatment by the police, and were tired of being forced to live their lives in the shadows of society.

QUEER LIBERATION

50 years ago the revolution for queer liberation was ignited, but we cannot forget that in our history there have always been people leading the charge to build safe and sacred spaces for us to be our authentic selves, and that these efforts whether recorded in history books or in the hearts of those that lived the experience deserve light and celebration.

This Pride season we continue to honor the elders of our movement, Sylvia Rivera, Marsha P. Johnson, Miss Major Griffin-Gracy, Stromé DeLaverie, and Raymond Castro, who led the charge during the Stonewall Riots and fought for the dignity and freedom of queer and transgender people, resisting police harassment and violence for us to live and be our beautiful selves. While our community has made valiant strides toward equality, we cannot forget that there exist active efforts that harm our communities, diminish our magic, criminalize our bodies, and stifle our grace.

From the police violence that claims the lives of Black and Brown bodies, the unsolved murders of our transgender sisters of color, the inhumane immigration system that detains and violates the dignity of queer and transgender migrants seeking refuge in the US, to the pinkwashing and rainbow capitalism that profits from our communities but doesn't invest in our collective liberation

It is our duty to continue the work that has been laid for us, fighting for the most marginalized members of our society through a critical race and gender equity lens, and always centering an intersectional approach to justice for all queer and transgender people. No one is free until we are all free.

On the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall Riots, make the conscious choice to uplift work led by and for queer and transgender communities of color.



The Marsha P. Johnson Institute (MPJI) protects and defends the human rights of BLACK transgender people. This organization was founded as a response to the murders of BLACK trans women and women of color and how that is connected to the exclusion of BLACK trans people from social justice issues, namely racial, gender, and reproductive justice, as well as gun violence.
