Course Description:

This course examines the influences of family, culture and community on the development and learning of young children. It includes developing a personal framework for understanding cultural differences in attitudes about play, child rearing and diversity of teaching methodologies. Students explore cross-cultural communication techniques, ways to assess and utilize family strengths, and strategies for involving families in the school and classroom.

Course Objectives:

During this course students will:

- Identify biases they have about how children, families and communities interact and behave
- Identify cultural differences in attitudes about play and education
- Identify and interpret verbal and non-verbal communication cues
- Explore culturally-appropriate teaching methodologies
- Explore ways to increase family and community involvement in school activities

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs):

After completion of the course students will be able to:

- Create culturally-relevant activities that promote building a positive classroom community
- Explain to family and community members the importance of providing time for children to play in school, at home and in their community environments
- Explain and demonstrate how non-verbal communication cues can influence verbal communication messages
- Design a classroom/school event and invitation letter that will encourage families and community members to participate in the children's educational activities and school environment
