#### Course Description:

This introductory course in video emphasizes the concepts of film language and communication, while demonstrating the use of techniques, tools, equipment and software necessary to create video for expressive communication, both narrative and documentary, or for promotional or commercial purposes. This course will allow students to gain a valuable skill set that is an essential part of the contemporary digital world.

# **Course Objectives:**

## During this course, students will:

- 1. Understand media literacy as they create their own films.
- 2. Experience the techniques and apply techniques underlying language of film.
- 3. Gain fundamental skills with recording equipment and ethics of documenting with video.
- 4. Gain fundamental knowledge of editing and learn ethical practices for presentation.

- 5. Apply techniques of narrative and fiction film to projects.
- 6. Critically evaluate, through studio critique, their own work and that of others using learned elements and principles of narrative and documentary film.

## Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs): (Three to Six)

After completion of the course students will be able to

- 1. Manifest ideas, theory and practice of film and video to create a story.
- 2. Synthesize personal artistic expression using knowledge of film language, style and vision to utilize indigenous, Native, and Himdag ideas to tell stories from a personal point of view.
- 3. Intentionally manipulate video and audio media, elements and principles to manifest specific outcomes.
- 4. Understand how the history of film has affected the stories they have seen on film, and how contemporary Native filmmakers are changing the dialogue.

#### Course Structure:

The classes will combine lecture, viewing of film clips, and laboratory work. Students will engage in short projects introducing the digital devices they need to utilize and will carry out classroom exercises to gain familiarity with the equipment. There will be a series of small projects that when completed, will be viewed as a class and discussed. We will view films by Native peoples.

- **1. First Project:** Choose a special place and film a story without words of that place using iPad. This will be no longer than 3 minutes, but will likely be considerably shorter. Instructions will include how to use the iPad to record video, and how to pay attention to sound, focus, light and camera movement. They will learn how to edit these to music.
- **2. Second Project/Exercises**: In class demos and exercises using T5 I cameras, lights and audio recording equipment. Instructions will include how to frame a pleasing composition, proper exposure, and control of movement within a frame, as well as the use of wide, middle, close-up, reaction and cutaway shots for story. The class will interview each other, or act out short scenes to discover the difficulties inherent in good sound recording.
- **3. Third Project:** Documentary with Ronald Geronimo. The class will form one or two teams to carry this out. With the help of the instructor, they will and set up filming locations, times, and people. They will complete their planned filming. There will be instruction and discussion about the best way to use time. Students

will be instructed to rotate positions, including the director, camera, audio, lights, and producing functions.

**4. Fourth Project: Create a Personal Story or Tohono** O'odham folk tale. Using non-fiction and narrative techniques, will work as teams to craft, schedule, shoot and edit their projects.

**Texts and Materials:** Text will be primarily films viewed in class. Occasional Hand-outs provided.

Student will have lab supplies. Materials are provided in the class include journals, each student will keep journal notes, scripts, sketches and storyboards to turn in at end of semester.

# **Evaluation and Grading & Assignments:**

40% of grade is based on Attendance and participation.

10% of grade for Project 1

10% of grade for Project 2

15% of grade for Project 3

20% of grade for Project 4

5% of grade for sketchbook filled with notes and storyboards. They are expected to fill this throughout the semester.

NOTE: Students who demonstrate respectful, interdependent work attitudes towards the Instructor and their teammates, who complete all projects and assignments to the best of their individual ability, and who enthusiastically engage in classroom discussions will receive an **A**.

The students will be asked in each project to consider place, language and meaning according to their cultural and traditional beliefs. Working together, carry out another shooting experiment with iPads. Intro to Editing concepts.

# Week 3 Edit iPad projects

Discuss as class. View films.

## Week 4 Introduce T 5i cameras

Carry out in class experiments.

Introduce Tascam Audio Recording, in class experiments, interview each other, learn 180 rule, edit.

# Week 5 Develop project with Mr. Geronimo

In class workshop. Practice dual system recording. Edit

Define shoot, and production roles. Students choose roles. Demo lights and lighting and exposure concepts. View Film clips to review.

## Week 6 Record video and audio of elders for Mr. Geronimo.

**Week 7** Continue recording elders and pertinent video.

Review and complete recordings.

# Week 9 Begin Editing Video

Editing with sound and music.

## Week 10 Continue Editing

**Week 11 Wrap-up Edits**, Review, critique as class, address problems.

**Week 12 Develop Final Project**: Create a short documentary, personal story, or Tohono O'odham folk tale. They will form teams and help each other with projects. They will discuss their ideas and build production plans together, illustrating their plans with thumbnail sketches and notes.

**Week 13** Film Final Projects. Show more film clips, discuss pacing, stylistic choices.

# Week 14 Film project, and ingest media dailies.

Week 15	Thanks Giving Week Wrap-up shoot of film, choose music, record dialogue or monologue. Begin Editing.
Week 16	Finish Final Project Finalize edits, sound, music, graphics.
