The Green Valley Manufacturing area has been busy the first part of 2017. However, GVE can always produce more projects for area businesses so please refer potential customers to GVE. The added business will not only assist GVE in meeting its revenue goals, but it will also assist GVE in achieving its mission to train people as they grow their independence. A special thank you to Nancy Balgie, Gerett Kratz, Andrea Wilcox, Tracy Borkowski, Sara Zimmerman, and Katie Brooks for coordinating the multitude of customer projects while providing training to the participants. It takes special people to balance the quality and deadlines demanded by customers while training people to meet those customer requirements.

GVE Manufacturing has been hard at work following the new Workforce Innovation and Opportunities Act (WIOA) mandates. The regulation states that every participant on GVE's production floor must receive Career Counseling sessions through



the University of Wisconsin – White-water. In addition, those same participants need to be exposed to Self-Advocacy training provided by the Aging & Disability Resource Center (ADRC). Almost 84 participants have received both aspects of the training programs which is no small task to organize, but Sara Zimmerman and Rebecca Kratz have done a wonderful job of coordinating the complex schedule.

Due to some new customer relationships GVE has a need for some part-

time production employees. If you know anyone that wants to earn some extra money please have them fill out a GVE application. These are great positions for students on summer break, people that just want to earn extra money, or retired people that want to remain active. The positions are flexible, and they are Monday through Friday with no weekends.

The Work Day of a Birth to 3 Program Early Intervention Educator

The Birth-to-3 Program would like to recognize our outstanding Early Intervention Educators and Service Coordinators and provide some insight as to what a small part of their day looks like. Our Birth-to-3 Program has three staff that have a dual role as Early Intervention Educators and Service Coordinators. These individuals are Maribeth Weissenborn, Amy Doman and Cynamon Reynolds. These ladies are on the front lines and are the first to go to the home of a new referral.

While at the home, the Early Intervention Educator administers and scores the Developmental Assessment of Young Children (DAYC-2). They have the important task of determining if the child has a 25% delay in any area of their development including cognition, communication, gross motor and fine motor skills and social-emotional skills. If a 25% delay is documented, they pass the referral on to the appropriate team member for further evaluation by a pediatric speech therapist, occupational therapist or physical therapist before qualifying the child and writing an Individual Family Service Plan (IFSP).



In April our Early Intervention Educators / Service Coordinators received 30 new referrals. Seventeen of these referrals came directly from pediatricians/physicians, six were from concerned parents, four were from social workers, one was from the Head Start Program, one was from the Public Health Department and one moved from another county where they were receiving Birth-to-3 programming. Ten of the new referrals were screened out and found not to qualify for Birth-to-3 services at this time. These children are usually followed up in three months to determine if their development has progressed age appropriately or if they are in need of further evaluation.

The Community Integration Department continues to make big strides in adding community employment opportunities for individuals that team up with Green Valley.

We appreciate our newest employer business partnerships with Schumann Printers and Grace Presbyterian Church. These organizations have hired individuals, Robert Berthiaume and Ed Berenski to their teams! Congratulations!

We are pleased that for a second consecutive year one of our employer partners has been honored at the annual Rehabilitation for Wisconsin (RFW) Conference in WI Dells. During the past three years G&W Vending has hired five individuals of varying abilities to productive part-time and full-time positions. Manager, Jim Braker, has figured out ways to maximize each individual hire's potential and how to make each person feel like a part of the team in their own way. Thank you G&W Vending!

Green Valley's Life Academy program moved to a new location mid-May in order to continue to help Dodge County students focus on learning employment readiness and independent living skills. Life Academy teachers continue to add curricula and real-life community experiences to prepare area students for community employment. Our youth transition program teams with students, families, communities and vocational rehabilitation to facilitate a plan to bridge



high school students to future career opportunities in the following ways:

- Individualized planning, focused on post school goals and self-determination, and help to coordinate school plans with relevant community agencies
- Instruction in academic, vocational, independent living, and personal social skills
- Career development services including goal setting, career exploration, job search skills, and self-advocacy
- Emphasis on paid employment such as connections with local employers, development of school-based businesses, on the job assessment and training
- Support services such as individualized mentoring and support or referrals for additional specific interventions



Green Valley's staff, volunteers and our board of directors worked very hard to make this year's Ham 'N Jam the most successful to date. You may have wondered at some point why does GVE need volunteers, donations and fund raising events? The answer is that most of GVE's programs have not received an increase in service rates since 2008. Costs have certainly gone up in the last decade, in particular labor and health insurance.

GVE's Production Department, donations and fund raising must fill the gaps in that funding shortage. There have been many fundraisers this spring, including: Benevento's fundraiser night, Elvis & Patsy Cline event, Pizza Ranch fundraiser night, Children's Radiothon and our largest event – Ham 'N Jam.


Another contributing factor to increased costs is the impact that new legislation such as the Workforce Innovation and Opportunities Act (WIOA) and Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) has on costs. WIOA and HCBS promote greater community integration, and more individualized services. In general these goals align well with GVE's Mission to promote maximum independence. One of the great challenges facing GVE at present is how these desirable but more costly services will be funded.

Green Valley's management and staff continue to monitor and learn about the changes brought about by WIOA and HCBS regulations. The management team and I attended a conference last quarter on these changes, and we continue to do our best to



stay abreast of and communicate requirements to participants, families and caregivers.

Last, it is important that I relay information about a major funding threat on the horizon. Both the state and federal government are discussing major reductions to Medicare and Medicaid. Medicare and Medicaid fund not only most of GVE's services but also most of the services that our participants receive outside of the GVE realm. If you would like to help safe guard these important services, contact your state and federal representatives and let your opinions be known.


