## 50th Anniversary Series: The Genesis of Green Valley Enterprises

Fifty years ago a group of people were inspired to develop a future for families and individuals with special needs in our community. They put into action a plan that created Green Valley Enterprises, Inc., a non-profit agency that serves over 600 disabled people and their families each year.

Who were these founders and what drove their desire to develop such an organization? It began in 1966 with a group of likeminded people from Dodge County including educators, parents, civic leaders, and organizations, all who believed people with special needs deserved a purposeful life. Originally known as the Dodge County Sheltered Workshop, it would be a workplace, or "sheltered workshop"

that would transition people for placement in private industry as soon as their skills reached a competent level. In addition to vocational training, they also provided counseling on how to live independently.

In January of 1967, small group discussions in a countywide "inquiry meeting" brought together those interested in the project. Rev. Richard

Olson from Beaver Dam served as the acting chairman. A key decision from these meetings was that a board of directors should be appointed to provide leadership and guidance. Four individuals were named to select the board of directors, Mrs. Dan Carter, Glenn Mittelstadt, Arthur Cothran, and Rev. Richard Olson.



In 1968, an agreement was developed and approved by the Wisconsin Department of Vocational Rehabilitation. They would provide vocational rehab services and funding for approved clients. The state of Wisconsin certified Articles of Incorporation for Dodge County Sheltered Workshop Inc. on February 12, 1968. The first budget was set with guidance

provided by the Fond du Lac district supervisor of vocational rehabilitation services. With some of the funding secured, the goal of making this special place a reality was coming to fruition. The workshop opened on Rowell Street in Beaver Dam in September 1968.

In 1966, John Kotek was the special education teacher at the high school. He was instrumental in starting the sheltered workshop. Kotek grew concerned for his student's lives after they graduated from high school. He reflects on how it all came together, "Parents played a key role in developing the workshop with their valuable individual experience. This helped tremendously to develop programs that fit each client's specific needs. At this time, there were three main state

institutions serving a large segment of this population so a sheltered workshop was a new and attractive idea in Dodge County. There were many challenges to starting a sheltered workshop, namely, finding the resources necessary to make a workshop feasible. We would need good leadership, a facility, equip-

#### Making a Difference with Modifications in Production

New tooling, fixtures and jigs have been upgraded to meet the needs and various abilities of our participants and at the same time provide quality and accuracy to Green Valley Manufacturing's customers.



One of the accommodations we made allows participants with limited hand use to assemble and package hardware. The fixture holds the bag open while participants sort and slide required components into the package.

Another fixture allows participants to produce a quality part to meet cus-



tomer specifications with a high degree of consistency. The fixture allows the perfect assembly of terminal covers each and every time.

The maintenance department has also engineered some creative modifications. A jig was made to use a modified vice ing products with a clevis pin and e-clip.



All of the modifications promote ergonomic safety for the participants, with the quality and accuracy that our customers require.

While providing our participants a wide range of training and work opportunities, we are working hard to "Make a Difference in Peoples Lives".

#### GVE Approved For Two Medium Buses ~Bob Anderson

Green Valley Enterprises has been approved for two medium buses through the 5310 Government Grant. We expect the buses to arrive sometime early 2018. We are also waiting to hear back from the state on the grant that we wrote this year. That grant includes a mid bus and a five ambulatory passenger and two wheelchair accessible Transit van. If we're approved for this grant, the vehicles should arrive late 2018.

Now that Winter is here, we need to talk about weather conditions. Whether we like it or not we will be dealing with fog, ice and snow. What may come along with these conditions are possible delays in our transportation routes. As always, Green Valley puts the safety of our clients and drivers first. There are times in certain situations that the drivers will need to slow down which will cause a delay on our morning and afternoon routes by hopefully only a few minutes. If we need to have a two hour delay in the morning an announcement will go out to all the families and group homes by two o'clock the previous day. This will allow everyone riding our transportation to schedule their mornings as they see necessary. These announcements will be sent out through our Alert-Now phone system. We will take whatever safety precautions necessary for your loved ones while riding GVE transportation.

#### Santa Visits Birth-to-3 ~Kathy Clark

The Birth-to-3 staff held a Holiday Party for the Birth to 3 participants and their families. Santa is definitely the focal point. For most, this is their initial exposure to Santa. Our Santa, Lloyd Clark, helped us make this first meeting with Santa eventful. As you may know, it is not unusual for a child to be a little apprehensive of sitting on the lap of a big jolly bearded man in a red suit for the first time. Well intentioned parents are always eager to sit their child on Santa's lap and stand back to snap pictures while their child may be struggling to understand why they are being abandoned on a stranger's lap. Our environment allows children to approach Santa on their own terms

when they are ready, not just when it is their turn in line. It is not uncommon for a child to return two to three times before they are comfortable enough to actually visit with Santa. Birth-to-3 therapists help the child to act as Santa's helper which helps put the child at ease.

Other activities included decorating cookies, snowman bowling, ice fishing on bubble wrap, crafts, a playdoh activity and a large scale drawing activity. Our Birth to 3 staff assisted children to interact with families. It is always fun to see some of the children who have aged out of our program catch up with their families along with the



children that are currently in our program.

To date our Birth-to-3 Program has served 345 children in 2017. I hope Santa is resting up!

John Kotek, a Board member for 42 years says it best, "The organization's leadership, parent input, and community involvement were key to providing quality services to individu-

als with special needs. It was true 50 years ago, and it is just as true today."

# FROM THE DESK OF THE Executive Director

2018 is a very special year for Green Valley Enterprises (GVE). Fifty years ago in 1968, Green Valley Enterprises began its existence as the Dodge County Sheltered Workshop, Inc. Over the years much has changed in terms of the scope and types of programs offered, the agency's location, funding sources and even our name, but what has remained amazingly consistent is the purpose on which GVE was founded.

When Green Valley was incorporated as a 501(c) not for profit in 1968, our stated purpose was to "Provide training, educational and recreational facilities for the mentally and/or physically handicapped without regard to race, color, sex or creed which may develop employability for placement in competitive extended remunerative employment as needed." The terminology has changed over the years but GVE's emphasis on employment has not.

It is very hard for us to imagine today how much courage it must have taken for our grass roots founders to embark on this uncharted journey. In 1968, many people with cognitive disabilities were removed from their communities to large state operated facilities where they lived their lives in total segregation. Others lived at home but often had limited opportunities for employment and social integration. GVE's founders had to be true visionaries to see their dreams come to fruition

In order to commemorate GVE's 50th Anniversary, we are going to participate in a year long celebration. Planned activities include:

- Researching and creating a timeline of historically significant GVE events and presenting the timeline at GVE's upcoming open house.
- Creating a series of articles on GVE's grass roots genesis, GVE's history, GVE's present services and GVE's future.

 Setting up a GVE Open House for March 21st as a Chamber Business After Hours event. Tours of the agency, including our John Deere home maintenance kit assembly line, will be conducted and other enjoyable activities will take place as well.
