Month without vehicle showcases lack of transit options for disabled

It has been a long month without transportation, so it is a relief to see my now uninjured Grand Caravan wheelchair van parked securely in the driveway.


I now have a means to get out and about after the accident on Nov. 3. A friend transported the van from the body shop where it languished in East Granby* to our Ansonia home. Thus ends 28 days without any ability to get around the Valley and the resultant lack of independence.

Why? Well, there are very few options for persons who are mobility limited.

I am not here to complain about Valley Transit District - I like them, and used their service once during the month to attend a business meeting.

However, all travel must occur between 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. That's it. That is all the funding VTD gets from the state, five-days of service in a seven-day week.

Forget about wheelchair accessible taxi service in the Valley either. I don't know much about Valley Cab other than they do not have wheelchair accessible cabs (and that *in 2011 they were opposed to the DOT granting permits* for two taxi operators to purchase additional wheelchair cabs).

I'm not here to praise or vilify any transit operators who could not transport myself. The para-transit operator is only funded to allow for transit for a five-day week, the local taxi operator is too undercapitalized to purchase new wheelchair cabs.

Thus, home was the place to be for four weeks. Now that I have my vehicle back, and the body work looks much better, I'll do my best to avoid any and all embankments in the future...

* - Why was the van being repaired 60 miles away? The van has a number of specialized systems and the company that modified my van, Advanced Wheels of Technology, is in East Granby, so I asked Allstate if I could use a body shop up there so the adaptive equipment could be repaired if needed. The insurer agreed and it was sent up there on a flatbed to be repaired. And all the adaptive equipment (specialized steering, ramp) was checked and works as designed. Thanks to Allstate, Advanced Auto Body and Advanced Wheels for getting me back on the road...
