'Queen' addresses loyal subjects at Seymour Historical Society

Shelton High School administrator offers glimpse into House of Tudor

SEYMOUR - It was Queen Elizabeth I's father, Henry VIII, who was the first British monarch to demand he be addressed as "your majesty."

That was one of the interesting tidbits from 16th century England shared by historian Carolyn Ivanoff of Seymour Sunday at the Seymour Historical Society.

Ivanoff, a historian and Shelton High School administrator, gave a costumed presentation of the life of Queen Elizabeth I, the last monarch of the House of Tudor.

She was the second daughter of Anne Boleyn, and ruled

England and Ireland from 1558-1603. Often called the Virgin Queen and Good Queen Bess, Elizabeth never married.

Historical Society board member Elsie Valeski joined Ivanoff at the start of the presentation,



dressed as Queen Elizabeth's childhood governess and lifelong friend, Kat Ashley.

Ivanoff said Ashley was imprisoned twice over her loyal support of the Queen.

Ivanoff said Elizabeth wore regal, jewel-encrusted clothing. The Queen had 3,000 dresses and more than 80 wigs, and she invented the clothes closet. Ivanoff said closets didn't exist prior to her reign.

In 1588 Queen Elizabeth's British Navy defeated the Spanish Armada.

Ivanoff said that led to Britain becoming the world's greatest military power for the next 400 years.
