Course Description:

SSE 212: Casework Methods II

Prerequisite: None

Credits: 3 cr. hrs. (3 pds: 3 lec.)

Course Description: Theory and practice of casework within the context of the Southwest. Includes case management, interviewing, case history and review, treatment planning, and development of helping relationships. Also includes major helping theories and strategies and case samples from varied settings, and provides a theoretical foundation and skills base for social work interventions with individuals, small groups and larger systems.

Course Objectives:

During this course students will be able to understand the foundations of

Social Work case management, by using best practices that have been identified by the

Council of Social Work.

Students will learn about the ethical core professional responsibilities.

Students will learn about cultural competence and how it impacts Himdag studies.

Students will learn and understand effective communication skills.

Students will learn how to interact with clients and be able to assess their strengths and needs.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs) : (Three to Six)

After completion of the course students will be able to understand *the Case Management Process, interact effectively with a variety of clients, and understand the ethics of social work practice.*

Course Structure:

This class will cover the first part of case management.

During the 15 weeks, a chapter will be covered each week. Information will be reviewed seminar style, with a great deal of class discussion. Each class will have simulations and case studies.

Students will be asked to reflect on their past learning experiences and determine how they will contribute to the overall classroom learning. Social work is a team effort. Students will learn to understand how the concept of team work is used to maximize case outcomes.

Each chapter will be guided by a PowerPoint presentation and actual case exercises,

The concept of Self-Determination will guide the learning experiences. Understanding the vital role the client plays in their own case is important. The following will guide the class work:

What does the client see as the problem?
What does the client believe should be addressed first?
What kind of services is the client seeking; does the client have something specific in mind?
How does living in a rural Native American environment impact the possibility of success and how does the cultural basis of understanding the client improve the client outcomes?
