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Executive Summary

Innovation Youth Centre and Melbourne Polytechnic working in partnership to support Cert IV Youth Justice Placement students to undertake research and conduct an interview with Innovation Youth Centre youth reference group young people about what makes a young person at risk of being involved in crime and what support services exist in the northern metro area of Melbourne to support young people at risk or involved in crime. Cert IV placements students will attend a youth forum about young people rights at work and discussed prevention of crime for young people to gain feedback to reduce the risk of being involved in crime.

Specific outcomes anticipated to be achieved through IYC include; young people:

- · Having a positive voice that is highly regarded in their community
- Achieving measurable social change via innovation and participation
- Experiencing deeper sense of connection with their community through a legal lens
- Working in collaboration with legal service providers
- Building positive connection with authority bodies (Police, Local, State, Federal Government)
- Advancing themselves through greater awareness of, and access to legal services
- Deepening understanding of what constitutes respectful attitudes and behaviours
- Developing higher self-reliance through greater awareness of, and access to health services
- Gaining employment and subsequently building careers more in line with their aspirations
- Developing an awareness of what causes a young person to commit or be at risk of committing a crime


Methodology


Innovation Youth Centre and Melbourne Polytechnic conducted a focus group on 8th of July 2017 where fourteen (14) participants were asked a series of questions (via a questionnaire, viewable in Appendix to explore opinions regarding the degree of need for youth legal related services.

The focus group, (Young Workers Forum, held at Panagia Soumela Pontian Association on 8^{th} July 2017, 11 a.m. – 2 p.m.) involved fourteen (14) participants ranging in (stated) age from 17 to 49 years. There was a series of 4 questions in the survey.

Note: all participants answered every question. One question required a Yes/No answer and provided a space below for comment if the participant wished to elaborate. The other three questions required the participant to make a selection from listed options.

<u>Gender</u>






Focus Group Participants Work and School Status




IYC Consult Participants Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Community (CALD) Status

Question 1: What makes a young person commit a crime?




Additional comments:

Question 2: What stops a young person from committing a crime?




Additional comments:

Conclusion

- There was a diverse group of participants surveyed ranging from 17- 49 years of age. The group consisted of those predominantly from the Northern area of Melbourne, one individual came from the Western area of Melbourne and a singular individual from Adelaide. Over 50% of participants were either employed or in school.
- The reasons given for why young people commit crime were fairly consistent; suggesting that alcohol and other drugs, as well as unemployment are the greatest precursors to crime.
- Comparatively, family support and solid plans for the future provided the greatest deterrents of crime.
- Results indicate the 57% of participants surveyed had some knowledge of where to get legal help, should they need it however, this is likely to be because over 50% of the surveyed participants were either in school or currently employed. 43% of participants surveyed were either at risk or had previously involved in crime.
- Feedback indicates a need for a greater awareness of available legal services in the Northern Metropolitan Area.
