Tied for eighth were Tom Musso, Mike Richey, Paul Block and James **Heneghan** with a score of 440. The average score of the 69 solvers was 378. The average score of the experts was 454.

In addition to the winner receiving a free play at the WBL Unit Game, I will play with anyone who gets a perfect score or who exactly matches all five of his answers. If you send a self-addressed stamped envelope to the above address along with your answers, I will send you a copy of the new problems to ensure that you can meet his next deadline. You can pick up a copy of the problems at the WBL Unit Game in Maryland, and can send answers or requests for problems to robinswr@erols.com, You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL website. WBL Solvers Club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996. I accept only the first answer from each solver unless it is clear that the solver wants to correct his answer.

I personally score all the problems. If a majority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I consider how good the answer is and how many experts vote for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

When I picked up this hand, I wondered where we belong and more important, from which side should the hand be played. We very likely belonged in either 3NT or 4♥ but both would play better from my side. If I jumped to 3NT, partner would pass with four or even five hearts. If I double, partner would very likely bid 2NT which is Lebensohl which would get any contract played from partner's side. All weak hands start with 2NT. What bid would make it easy for partner to get us to the right strain and from the right side? 2NT! 2NT lets partner bid Stayman or lets him transfer. If he transfers, I'll jump to 4\varphi which gets it played from my side. I thought that the advantage of getting to the correct contract from the correct side was worth the risk of missing a game.

Six experts double. The problem with double is that one of partner's likely bid is 2NT. 2NT is Lebensohl which is what you bid when you have fewer than eight points. If partner holds  $\triangle xx \lor Qxxx$ AQxxAxxx or AxVJ10xxxAQxxAxx, 4V has very good play from my side but very likely down from partner's side.

Parker: "Double—And then 3NT over partner's bid even if it is hearts."

Double followed by 3NT shows some tolerance for hearts since you could jump directly to 3NT if you didn't have tolerance. Is partner supposed to correct to  $4\Psi$  with a singleton spade and only four hearts?

King: "Double—Partner is most likely to bid 2NT, Lebensohl but I can then bid 3♠ which I hope is offering a choice of games between 3NT and 4."

**Shi:** "Double—Then 3NT to show a flexible hand type. Partner could have a weak hand with a singleton spade, so I want to keep options open."

**Theurer:** "Double—A difficult problem. Partner could be broke but he also could have enough for game. We could belong in notrump or in a suit contract. Double seems most flexible for now; 2NT is an underbid and I'm vulnerable at IMPs so don't want to miss game when partner passes with some 6-7 counts. Problem may come next round if partner bids 2NT Lebensohl, I'll probably risk 3NT. and partner should know I have a reason to not bid 3NT immediately thus usually four hearts."

Korbel: "Double—I'll bid 3NT next in most auctions and hope for the best. I don't hate 2NT right now."

**Sontag:** "Double—More flexible then 3NT."

Six experts jump to 3NT. If partner has  $\triangle x \lor Jxxx$  $\blacklozenge$   $Oxxxx \clubsuit KOx$ , or  $\spadesuit x \blacktriangledown Oxxxx \spadesuit Oxx \clubsuit xxx you'll$ play in 3NT very likely down with 4♥ likely makeable. When my partner jumps to 3NT I usually pass unless I have a six-card major or unless I'm thinking about slam. Partner could have a solid minor for his jump to 3NT.

Woolsey: "3NT-If I make a takeout double, I won't be happy hearing partner's 2NT Lebensohl response. Playing from my side could be critical. If we have a 4-4 or even 5-4 heart fit, 3NT might be better."

**Chen:** "3NT—I can show my 20 HCP by A) bidding 3NT directly or B) Doubling and then bidding 3NT. Option B shows a hand with flexibility, so Advancer is supposed to pull 3NT with a five-card major after Option B but leave in 3NT after Option A. However, Option B has a big flaw in that advancer will probably bid 2NT Lebensohl and now we will wrong side 3NT. Therefore, I'm going to bid 3NT right away. Even if advancer has five hearts, 3NT by the strong hand might play better anyway opposite something like ♠ xxx♥ Qxxxx♦ Q10♣ 10xx."

**Stone:** "3NT—-I know, this is really an ugly 20count given the bidding: no five-card or longer suit; three jacks; and terrible spades with the spades behind you and no way to hold up the suit to retain control. For that reason, at matchpoints, downgrading the hand to 2NT would make a lot of sense. But this is IMPs. Partner could hold many four, five, six and seven HCP hands and pass out 2NT when 3NT will come home, sometimes aided by the opening lead. Furthermore, often when 3NT goes down, so will 2NT particularly when the defense can score five spade tricks; so you will often be trading a two-IMP loss against a 12-IMP gain, Finally, in the modern game, the partner of a weak-two bidder will almost automatically raise to three at favorable vulnerability with three-card support. So there is an inference that your partner probably holds at least two spades. In that case, the advantage of playing in a heart fit is much diminished with two likely fast spade losers, as is the advantage of being able to use Stayman over 2NT. It may not be pretty, but 3NT looks like the best IMP bid. By the way, I view

double as an inferior bid. It seems to defer an immediate decision, but it misdescribes your hand and, because of Lebensohl, is likely to critically wrong-side heart and notrump contracts."

**Veasey:** "3NT—We should have a play for it. Double could backfire on this hand. It wrong sides a heart contract and might produce an unwanted Lebensohl 2NT response on a weak hand that could make 3NT played from the South hand impossible. I'm not happy with the trick taking potential of my hand though."

**Hopkins:** "3NT—Need partner to have a smattering. I play Stayman and transfers in this auction so I could still play hearts if partner goes either route."

Adams: "3NT—Loses hearts, but avoids partner bidding 2NT when I double first."

One expert agrees with me and goes low. If partner has  $\triangle xx \bigvee Jxx \triangle xxxx - KQxx$ , his promised sixcount, you'll go down one trick fewer.

Schwartz: "2NT—If you double, Lebensohl puts you in a bind. 3NT an overbid with those spade values and doesn't allow you to get to hearts. Loses out only if partner has 5-8 points, passes 2NT and game makes."

Getting the contract played from the correct side could be worth a trick.

Playing against Michaels, there is a convention called Unusual over Unusual. West shows five-five or better in the majors. Spades are higher and hearts are lower. The other two suits are the minors. The bids of two-of-either-major shows the following. The higher of their suits, spades, shows the higher of the other two suits, diamonds. The lower of their suits, hearts, shows the lower of the other two suits, clubs. Both show limit raise or better. Since diamonds hasn't been bid yet, 24 shows at least five diamonds. 2♥ shows club support which is four or more. The free bids of  $2 \spadesuit$  and  $3 \clubsuit$  show less than limit raise strength. The prototype  $2 \spadesuit$  bid is  $\bigstar$  KQJxxx with very little outside strength. This convention works whenever an opponent shows two specific suits.

This is another hand where side could make a difference. If South plays the hand, his  $\forall$  AQ is protected. Give partner  $\bigstar xx \forall xx \spadesuit QJ10xxx \clubsuit QJx$  and  $5 \spadesuit$  won't make if they lead a heart and you lose a trick in the minors; but,  $5 \clubsuit$  is makeable if you only lose one trick in the minors. Your heart holding needs to be protected and the only way is to play this hand in clubs.  $5 \spadesuit$  guarantees that the contract will be played from partner's side. All other bids gives you a chance to play in clubs.

Four experts bid  $5\phi$ . They don't try to play in clubs which would protect the hearts.

**Parker:** "5♦ —Might make, might be a good save, might be a phantom. Give partner ♠ xxx♥ xx ♦ KQxxxx♣ xx, we make on a low spade lead assuming clubs are 3-1."

But what about with a heart lead?

**King:** "5♦ —Maybe we can make, maybe they can make. At IMPs especially it seems right to take out insurance."

**Shi:** "5 — We could have slam but I think I'll bid a sedate 5 • . Sometimes the opponents get confused and double you."

**Hopkins:** "5♦ —This should be close to making. I would feel more comfortable about defending if I could lead my stiff spade against 5♥ -doubled."

Four experts bid 4NT. My rule is that if the opening is a major, 4NT is RKC but if the opening is a minor then 4NT is choice of minors. Would partner bid  $5 \clubsuit$  holding  $\spadesuit$  Jxx $\blacktriangledown$ xx $\spadesuit$  KQxxx $\clubsuit$ Jx? With a heart lead,  $5 \spadesuit$  loses one spade, one heart and one club. Playing in clubs the hearts are protected so if you can hold your club losers to one, you'll make  $5 \clubsuit$ .

**Woolsey:** "4NT—Holding seven clubs, I think it is right to give partner the choice. Playing from my side could matter considering my heart holding."

Chen: "4NT—This bid should be takeout for minors, not Blackwood. I want partner to pick between 5♣ and 5♠. Partner could have something like ♠ Jxx♥ x♠ QTxxxx♣ Kxx and 5♣ is safer. Bidding over their 4♥ only loses if both 4♥ and 5♣/5♠ go down, which I think is a low percentage on this deal."

**Stone:** "4NT—Offering partner a choice of minors. I think this is slightly preferable to 5♠. Double of 4♥ seems misplaced despite your defensive potential, since you are probably playing for only a one-trick set. The opponents know the vulnerability and likely have a double major-suit fit with the possibility of more extreme distribution than already announced; so defeating 4♥ is no guarantee. Meanwhile, game for you in diamonds, and possibly clubs, is highly promising."

**Korbel:** "4NT—Not going to defend when we could easily make. I'm intending this as choice of minors."

Two experts cuebid spades. If partner has  $\blacklozenge$  KQJxxx and the  $\clubsuit$ K, slam is great.

Theurer: "4♠ —Do I try for slam or not? Wish I could be playing diamonds from my side to protect the heart tenace, but East may lead his shorter major not knowing what I have in his partner's suits. I will make a cheap cuebid and see if partner can offer any encouragement. If he bids 5♠ I will pass, over 4NT I will bid 5♠, and over 5♣ I will bid 5♠. Partner probably has some spade length over there so I'm thinking he's probably short in clubs though I suppose he could be 4=1=6=2 since the opponents rate to have a big fit when they jump to game on limited HCP vulnerable."

**Sontag:** "4♠ —Cuebid involving partner. Need a 5♣ cuebid from partner."

Three experts join me and protect their heart holding. Doesn't work if responder has ♠ Jxxx♥xx ♠ KQJ10xx♣x. However, partner is very likely to have at least two clubs.

Veasey: "5♣—I'm afraid the clubs could get lost in a diamond contract if even one of the minors didn't break well. I doubt if we can make 5♣ but they might make 4♥. Partner should read me for something in diamonds and convert to diamonds if he can't stand clubs."

Schwartz: "5. —Partner has at most two hearts so likely at least two clubs so clubs should play as well or better than diamonds and need to right side the hand. RHO could easily be 4-4 in majors and want to right side it himself with minor suit kings."

Adams: "5♣ —Guarding the heart could be the game going trick. If partner is short in clubs, the heart lead will kill the vital entry, making clubs more attractive."

Another hand where right siding the contract could be worth a trick.

We have a very good hand however, there are flaws with all of our possible calls. If we double, partner could easily bid 1 \underwind which would give us a rebid problem. If we overcalled 1NT, we could play it there with no source of tricks other than the club suit which is unlikely to be led. I don't often overcall a four-card suit but this hand is made for it. If partner has support, he can tell you if he has four-card support by jumping and you can be aggressive. If he has three-card support you would be conservative. If he doesn't have support hopefully we'll land on our fit. The good news is that West is very likely to lead a club against a heart contract.

Four experts overcall 1NT. That won't get us to our possible heart fit if partner is too weak to continue. Partner is very likely to have fewer than eight points and therefore will pass unless he has a fivecard major or has six diamonds.

**Parker:** "1NT—Shows my points. We can find a major suit fit if there is one and partner will not be able to put us in diamonds."

**Woolsey:** "1NT—I have about the right strength, and the singleton diamond doesn't figure to be a problem. If we have a game, this is the way to find it. Overcalling a four-card suit should be avoided if possible, and if I pass I'll just have problems later."

What about the best partscore? If partner has  $\bigstar xxxx \checkmark Qxxx \checkmark Jxx \checkmark xx$ , 1NT is likely down with hearts making at least eight trick.

Stone: "1NT—All choices are flawed. I think 1NT is best in that it allows you to show your values and explore game in either major or notrump. A close second is 1♥. You can show extra values over anything partner bids, but the problem is that partner may drive to 4♥ in your 4-3 fit when 3NT is best. The problem with pass is that, even if you can conveniently get back in the auction for instance (1♣) – Pass – (1♦) – Pass – (2♦) – Dbl, partner will never play you for a hand this good. Double might work, but you will have trouble exploring notrump without implying 18+ HCP."

**Schwartz:** "1NT—Partner won't want to play in diamonds without at least six and no other bids comes close to describing the hand."

I'd be more afraid of LHO having six diamonds and the opponents taking the first six diamond tricks. One expert doubles. Doubling and rebidding 1NT shows more than a 1NT overcall—usually 18-

**Shi:** "Double—Planning to rebid notrump if partner doesn't do anything exciting."

20 HCPs.

Five experts pass. Only if West responds  $1 \spadesuit$  and East raises or rebids 1NT will you be able to enter the auction. Double would be takeout of diamonds. Suppose West responds  $1 \spadesuit$ , a double by you would then show diamond tolerance.

**King:** "Pass—Good partners bid a major after a double and I guess you could try 1NT, but why not

wait and see what happens next."

Theurer: "Pass—I'd like to bid "something" but what? Double, 1NT and 1♥ all have their flaws. With all my potential defense perhaps it's best to wait and see what the opponents do, and my silence may turn out to be a benefit if we end up defending. If I was to bid, it would probably be 1NT, since that seems like the least lie only being "off" by the presence of the singleton diamond."

Isn't a  $1 \nabla$ -overcall "off" by the presence of one little heart?

**Veasey:** "Pass—No bid looks good to me. Hopefully, I can pass in tempo, and partner can do something, or the auction might develop in such a way that I can join it even with a silent partner."

Korbel: "Pass—Can't act now."

**Adams:** "Pass—I am OK with 1♥ too. 1NT and double are out."

I like the following answer. You're very likely to get a club lead which would help you in heart contract.

**Chen:** "1♥ —I'm not passing with 16 HCP. Passing also makes it easier for opponents to find their diamond fit. I'm not doubling with 4-3 in the majors and a stiff in an unbid suit. I have a good heart suit and this looks like a good time for a fourcard overcall, which is the least lie with this hand."

**Sontag:** "1♥ —Quickest road to game."

**Hopkins:** "1♥ —This is the type of hand where a 4-3 could play very well, especially on a club lead."

There are hands where overcalling on a fourcard suit is best.

This is a difficult problem. You could be cold for 7NT, 7♥ or 7♣. You can't have a constructive auction so you must guess. At IMPs I'd bid 6♣ since 6♣ is very likely to make and any slam is ok. At matchpoints you don't want to be in 6♣ if you belong in 6NT or 6♥ or some seven-level contract.

When your partner is barred, taking a sure plus is one way to go. You hope the field is going minus. Bid 3\* and take the sure plus, hoping that the field goes minus.

Eleven experts jump to 6%. 6% beats all games if it makes. If partner has 22-24 balanced, few pairs will get to slam and 6% figures to have play. A normal auction could be 2% - (2%) - 3% - (P) - 3NT. (P) - Pass and most pairs will play in 3NT.

The good news is that partner has to play it.

**Parker:** "6♣ — Might as well be optimistic since I got us in this mess."

**Woolsey:** "6. —When this happens, normally it is best to just make sure you get a plus score and hope the rest of the field goes minus. Here, however, you know enough about the hand that 6. is likely to be a reasonable contract."

You know that they can't take the first two spade tricks.

**Chen:** "6♣ — Hope it makes, we will beat all the people that stop in 3NT or 4♥. Glad Partner is playing it, I won't have a chance to make another mistake on this deal."

Stone: "6♣ —The only bid with a realistic upside. For example, give partner a balanced 2♣ opener with something like ♠ Axx♥ AKQ♠ KQJx♣ Kxx, and the only slam that makes against a spade lead is 6♣. If you bid game or slam in any other suit, you're hoping at best to break even while wrong-siding the contract, and bidding 5♣, even if it is the limit of the hand in clubs for instance ♠ KQx♥ AKQ♠ KQJx♣ Kxx, will matchpoint poorly in comparison to 3NT."

Shi: "6. —Seems a reasonable shot. Weird problem."

Theurer: "6♣ —I never make mistakes...(ha!) This is a guess with partner being barred, so I will hope he has a balanced hand with little in spades such as ♠ Jxx♥ AKQx♠ AKQ♣ Kxx. At least partner will be playing it so the strong hand can't be led through."

**Schwartz:** "6♣ —Would guess the best spot is 3NT from partner's side but."

**Korbel:** "6♣ —Wheeeeeeeeee!"

**Sontag:** "6♣ —I will tell my partner not to play with me again if this fails."

**Hopkins:** "6. —This is all a guess. I hope partner doesn't have an eight-card Heart suit."

**Adams:** "6♣ —Good luck partner."

Two experts stay out of slam.

**King:** "5♣—Partner has to play it. I guess I assume partner has a balanced 22-24 and not a spade stopper. I'd be declarer in 3NT."

This is matchpoints and playing in 5. is a very small target. All other makeable games or slams will score more.

One expert bids 3NT hoping that partner has a solid spade stopper especially since it's going to be led through.

**Veasey:** "3NT—When in doubt. Actually I don't see another choice At least it's not a team game. I wouldn't want to take a disaster back to my teammates if I guessed wrong particularly since I made the mistake that created the situation in the first place."

*I like 3♣*. *Take the sure plus*.

When partner is barred it's important to get a plus score.

You have only two cards in the majors which means that the opponents could have a large majorsuit fit. There are three reasonable choices. You could jump to  $3 \spadesuit$  which asks partner to bid 3NT with a spade stopper. He'd bid 3NT with  $\spadesuit$   $J10xx \heartsuit$   $Jxxx \diamondsuit$  x  $\clubsuit$ AKxx and you'd lose the first six tricks and  $5 \diamondsuit$  is cold. You could jump to  $3 \diamondsuit$  which shows an opening bid and a good six-card suit. If partner has the above hand he'll pass  $3 \diamondsuit$  and again you belong in  $5 \diamondsuit$ . The simplest bid is to jump to  $5 \diamondsuit$ .  $5 \diamondsuit$  has the advantage of making when partner has club honors and forces West to bid at the five-level if he wants to compete.

Eleven experts bid 3 h which asks partner to bid 3NT with a spade stopper. The problems with 3 h is that it allows West to bid four-of-either-major and it doesn't address heart stoppers.

**Parker:** "3♠ —Asks for a spade stopper, I will bid 4♠ over the forced 4♣ if partner does not have a stopper."

**King:** "3♠ —Asking partner to bid 3NT with a spade stopper."

Woolsey: "3♠ —I could bid 3NT, but a spade

lead through partner could be damaging even though RHO is weak."

Chen: "3♠ —This hand is too good for an intermediate 3♦ -bid and too shapely for a 3♠ Western Cuebid, but those are the only two viable choices. I'll make the 3♠ bid, as partner is likely to have values since LHO didn't open 2♣ and RHO passed 1♠. It is a small window where 3NT goes down but 5♦ makes if partner has a spade stopper such as ♠ QJxx♥ Axx♠ xx♠ QJxx. The other option is to make a conservative 2♦ bid, but this risks missing 3NT and it makes it much easier for LHO to compete in spades or hearts."

Theurer: "3♠ —Go for the gusto; no guarantees here but the alternative 3♦ does not promise a running seven-bagger so partner, with a small stiff diamond, might not budge even with some decent stuff."

**Veasey:** "3♠ —I play that a jump cuebid in this situation asks partner to bid 3NT with a stopper in that suit. I believe it's played that way in "Washington Standard". It's not a perfect bid in this situation because he could have the stopper, and you could still be one trick off, but I don't see a better bid."

**Schwartz:** "3 —No other bid comes close to describing this hand. A more interesting problem is if LHO had opened 3 .".

**Korbel:** "3 — This should convey at least the skewed strong one-suited nature of my hand."

Usually 3. shows a balanced solid suit. 2362 is a very likely distribution.

**Sontag:** "3♠ —Asking partner for a stopper. 3♦ is another possibility but it allows opener a chance to bid 3♥."

**Hopkins:** "3♠ —I am not going to re-open with a double. At least partner knows I have a long running suit."

#### Adams: "3♠ "

Two experts jump to  $3 \spadesuit$ . Most jump overcalls are weak but a balancing jump is intermediate. The typical  $3 \spadesuit$ -jump is AKQxxx of diamonds and an outside ace. If all you need is for partner to have the king of hearts and the QJ of clubs to make  $5 \spadesuit$ ,  $3 \spadesuit$  is an underbid. The big problem with  $3 \spadesuit$  is that it allows opener to bid  $3 \clubsuit$  if he has a major two-suiter or rebid  $3 \spadesuit$  with a six-card or longer spade suit.

The following is a good argument for jumping to  $5 \spadesuit$ .

**Stone:** "3♦ —You are confronted with two flawed "picture bid" options: 34, showing a long solid suit and asking for a spade stopper; or 3♦, showing intermediate two-bid strength in diamonds. I said flawed because a spade stopper is not your ninth trick in 3NT and because your solid diamonds and extra distribution offer more playability than the average intermediate jump bid. Even playing matchpoints, I slightly prefer 3♦, which is the more flexible bid given your extreme distribution. 3 basically limits partner to bidding 3NT with a spade stopper, but even with a spade stopper you may not have nine tricks and, regardless, the opponents may be able to run the heart suit. So partner needs something in spades and hearts, including a ninth trick somewhere. With that much value, partner will likely bid over 3♦, so you wouldn't expect to miss 3NT when it is makeable. And 3♦ better allows you to describe your extra distribution and explore the various game and maybe slam possibilities."

**Shi:** "3♦ —I'm a little strong for this but it gets my hand type across pretty well."

It's hard to evaluate the value of a void which makes  $5 \spadesuit$  a percentage action.



For team games, we guarantee a pair; singles are not guaranteed a game. (If there is an even number of players or pairs looking, the GP goes home.)

A player who anticipates needing a partner is encouraged to contact the Partnership Chair in advance to see if a match can be made. To find a partner at least a day in advance, email Barbara Doran at barb.doran@verizon.net or call 301-608-0347 between 9 am & 10 pm.

Players in search of partners at the last minute should try to arrive between 7:00 and 7:15 (or call ahead). The partnership desk closes at 7:25.

You might want to volunteer for the GP program yourself. It's a great way to meet people. You will play for free on the evening you serve as GP, and will also receive a free play for any future Unit game regardless of whether you play on the night you serve.

## IN APPRECIATION OF CHARLIE STENGER

Dr. Charles Stenger, a fixture in Washington bridge for more than 65 years and a psychologist who specialized in the care of former prisoners of war, died on April 29 in Rockville. He was 95 years old.

Charlie was president of the Washington Bridge

League from 1968 until 1970, and served as a board member from 1971 until 1973. He was elected the District Six representative to the ACBL Board of Directors in 1980. He served three four-year terms.

During that time, he was also president of District Six, president of the Mid-Atlantic Conference and chairman of the District Six Judiciary Committee. He was the first winner of the WBL's sportsman of the year award, in 2006. At the time of his death, Charlie had 11,989 masterpoints.

During his time on

the ACBL Board, Charlie headed a committee that recommended new ranks above life master (there are now nine) and another committee that began to formulate changes to the alert procedure. He chaired the committee that produced a national nosmoking policy. He also complained vociferously (and successfully) when the host hotel boosted room rates just before the start of the 1984 North American Bridge Championships in Washington.

On Dec. 21, 1944, Charlie was captured in Belgium by German soldiers during the Battle of the Bulge. His unit, part of the 106th Division, was about to be overrun when Charlie found a piece of white cloth and surrendered his men. A combat medic, he was held at various prison camps until May 3, 1945.

During his captivity, Charlie suffered from frozen feet that bedeviled him for the rest of his life. He also suffered back injuries when a boxcar in which he and other POWs were riding was hit by Allied bombs.

"But he never complained and he never talked about it," said his widow, Mary Lou Guandolo, also a member of the WBL. "Charlie always said, 'There

are never any problems, only challenges."

As a bridge partner, he was always even-keeled and always looked on the bright side, Mary Lou recalled. "He would play with anybody," she said. "And he never came home and said. I'm playing with

> an idiot.' He would say, 'We played well, we just didn't score well.'

Charles Albert Stenger was born and brought up in Akron, Ohio. He had a twin brother, John Stenger, who died three years ago. John was Charlie's first bridge partner. The Stengers learned the game around the kitchen table in their home.

Charlie married his first wife, Jeanne Stenger, in 1946. She died about 17 years ago. He received a BS in education in 1947 from The University of Akron and a PhD in clinical psychology in

1952 from Western Reserve University in Cleveland.

One of his prized possessions was a letter of reprimand he received from his academic adviser. shortly before he was awarded the PhD. "It's wonderful that you have time to play bridge when you should be working on your dissertation," the man wrote.

Charlie joined the Veterans Administration in 1947 as that fledgling agency's first chief of psychology. "No one even knew what a psychologist was supposed to do," recalled a longtime colleague, Rod Baker. Charlie spent 33 years at the VA, supervising a large staff and developing a specialty in the treatment of POWs. He was recognized several times for the care he delivered to POWs from the Vietnam War. He also treated former service members who had fought in Korea and the Pacific.

After his retirement in 1980, Charlie joined the American Ex-Prisoners of War Association as national director of services. In 2016, he was awarded the Prisoner of War Medal—one of the U.S. Army's highest decorations—at a ceremony in his home. In remarks that day, Charlie said he would always be proud to be "a soldier for life." Charlie also

earned a Bronze Star and a Purple Heart.

Charlie was happy to be old-fashioned, his widow said. "He never used a computer. He never sent an e-mail. He didn't feel he needed to," she said.

And he was always ready to offer counsel about the emotions of his fellow soldiers.

One day, about ten years ago, I approached Charlie at the end of a bridge session and asked if I could speak to him. My father-in-law, who had served in France with the U.S. Army during World War Two, was near death. I had always been curious about his service, but he would never talk about it in any detail. Now the window

"Sit down," he said, in his ever-so-calm way.

For the next 30 minutes, he explained that, despite a lot of pop psychology, many former GIs coped with the horrors of war by filing those days away and trying to move past them forever. Charlie assured me that it was nothing personal. But he said that my father-in-law could not be begged, badgered or cajoled into talking. "He was a healer," said a longtime colleague, Ed Nightingale. "Charlie will be remembered as a generous soul, always offering his time and encouragement."



#### CONTINUATIONS IN A 2/1 GAME FORCING AUCTION

Now, we're going to discuss continuations when an auction has started with a 2/1 game forcing bid. In particular, we'll focus on how Opener should act based on his hand strength -- whether holding a bare minimum, average, or strong opening hand. Remember, Responder is unlimited at first, so Opener must not cut off possibilities prematurely, even with a weak hand. We'll also discuss in which situations Responder shows true trump support when bidding Opener's first suit, and when Responder is merely taking a preference. And, we'll note that notrump can sometimes be bid in 2/1 auctions without being absolutely certain that all four suits are stopped.

#### Consider the following auctions:

(assume no interference by opponents)

1♠ /2♣ /2♠ /2♠ Responder can have: ♠ QJx ♥ QJx ♦ KQx ♣ QJxxx

1♠ /2♦ /2♥ /2♠ Responder can have: ♠ AKx ♥ Ax ♦ KOxxx ♣ Kxx

**1**♥ /**2**♣ /**2**♦ /**2**♥ Responder can have: ♠ xx ♥ AQx ♦ KQxx ♣ Axxx

Notice that Responder can have a very good hand, a very bad hand or a reasonable hand for his three-card support at the two-level

#### This is in contrast to the following auctions:

1♠ /1 NT/2♦ /2♠ Responder can have: ♠ xx ♥ KQxx ♦ Qxx ♣ Jxxx

1♥ /1 NT/2♣ /2♥ Responder can have: ♠ Jxx ♥ xxx ♦ Kxxx ♣ Qxx

1♥/1♠/2♣/2♥ Responder can have: ♠ Axxx ♥ xx ♦ Kxx ♣ xxxx

It is well known that Responder in these auctions is simply taking a preference, and is most likely to have two cards only in the trump suit. If

Responder has three-card support, he has fewer than eight support points. In the last auction, Responder should support hearts if he has three-card heart support and ignore the spade suit.

#### Consider the following auction:

1♠ /2♥ /3♣ /3♠

Here, Responder supports Opener's first suit at the three-level.

Here again, Responder is showing three-card trump support.

Unless Opener has a truly sub-minimum hand, Opener should not jump in the bidding. Opener must remember that Responder is unlimited.

#### Are you in the slam zone?

After 1♠ /2♣ /2♥ /2♠ :

Opener bids  $3 \spadesuit$  with a minimum opening bid, such as  $\spadesuit$  KOxxx  $\blacktriangledown$  Axxx  $\spadesuit$  OJx  $\clubsuit$  x.

With extra values, Opener shows his distribution. He bids 2NT with 5=4=2=2, such as ★ KQJxx ♥ AKxx ♦ Ax ♣ xx. Opener bids 3♣ with short diamonds, such as ♠ KQJxx ♥ AKxx ♦ x ♣ Axx and bids 3♦ with short clubs, such as ♠ KQxxx ♥ AKxx ♦ Axx ♣ x. This way, Responder knows which honors are fitting and which are wasted. He can also rebid his heart suit to show five hearts and extra values. After Opener shows his distribution, Responder can start showing aces and kings.

Use logic and judgment when cuebidding. Cuebid up the line (lower to higher suits).

When using Blackwood conventions, always show all of your key cards, even when you have shown them through cuebidding already.

Opener generally should not jump to game in these situations. It takes up too much space. Give Responder a chance to show potential slam interest below the level of game.

#### 1 /2 /2 /2NT/3NT

In this auction, Opener has shown either 12-14 or 18-19 points. Of course, if Opener has 18-19, he will bid 4NT over Responder's 3NT.

Remember, when Opener bids a new suit at the

three-level following a 2/1 response, such as  $1 \spadesuit /2 \spadesuit /3 \clubsuit$ , it shows extra values – at least a good 14 high card points.

Blackwood conventions should be used mainly to make sure you stay out of a slam missing two key cards. Blackwood is not the main tool for figuring out whether or not the partnership should be in slam. The latter is determined more by the strength and fit shown in the bidding prior to bidding game. Cuebidding can be an important part of exploring for slam.

If Opener has Ace-King-Queen of the trump suit, that counts as extra values. Both Opener and Responder should shade their hand value up slightly with really good trumps, and devalue it slightly without.
