Open House set for Nov. 17 Former pastor to preach Nov. 18

This marked the latest step in a long mid-life journey for Bette, who completed a number of requirements for this commissioning while serving Broadway, including her Master of Divinity degree from Garrett Theological Seminary. The time and passion that Bette has given to Broadway these past five years on top of all her "homework" has truly been a blessing.

This summer we welcomed Carl Hetler as the new pastor of Broadway Christian Parish UMC. Pastor Carl has a Masters of Divinity degree from Trinity Evangelical Divinity School in Deerfield, Ill., and has spent the last five years as youth pastor at Evangel Heights UMC of South Bend. At Evangel Heights, Pastor Carl has preached, led the Stephen Ministry team, improved Facebook interactions, taught Lay Servants Academy, directed mission trips to Northport UMC, participated in the intercessory prayer team, and officiated funerals. He says his greatest joy is seeing youth growing in Christ. Broadway looks forward to Carl continuing to use his wisdom and skills in this and other areas.

New pastor on the move From Berkeley to South Bend, Carl Hetler steeped in a life of service

If you're looking for Broadway's new pastor, Carl Hetler, you'd better look quick. He'll be off his bike and into the midst of his ministry before you can say Berkeley, California.

After spending part of his early life in Berkeley, Pastor Carl arrived in South Bend in 2010, but his path from the West Coast to the Midwest made other stops along the way. As a student at Northwestern University in Evanston, Ill., he continued a life of service instilled by his parents, Gail and Bob Hetler, who now live in Michigan. "Together as a family we combined worship with service. It's in our DNA," he said.

At Northwestern, Carl did an internship at a shelter, where he learned about systems and functions. "I got a lot of technical advice there," he said. "I got to see the background side of how to do things."

When he arrived in South Bend eight years ago, Carl worked with Hope Ministries and other local organizations to serve those in need. He has served in United Methodist churches, most recently at Evangel Heights. He is particularly interested in youth ministry. An interview at the church

during his first month at Broadway was interrupted several times by a group of young people wanting him to go for a walk in the neighborhood. Pastor Carl was quick to wrap up the interview so he could join them.

Carl and his wife, Heather, celebrated 20 years of marriage on Aug. 15. They met as college students at Northwestern. Heather leads the Communication and Assistive Technology Team for the South Bend Community School Corp. They have three children. Erik is a senior at Trinity at Greenlawn and is interested in studying history. Anders, with a passion for cooking, is a freshman there. And Grace, who is on the YMCA swim team, is a 6th-grader at Jefferson. Heather's parents, Rick and Barb Van Wechel, also live in South Bend.

As a member of the Christian Community Development Association, Pastor Carl is fully vested in its mission to engage Christians into their communities. He says he is "honored by this privilege to not only pastor this congregation, but provide leadership and encouragement to a dedicated team of staff, volunteers and guests."

"Here we integrate faith, people on the street, and all of us in the same community... I see my role as support for the things that people here are already doing."

He names Conrad Damian as one such leader. "He's all in," Carl said, listing Conrad's work with Southeast Organized Area Residents (SOAR), the Bowman Creek project, and Downtown South Bend (DTSB). "I keep being surprised by all he (Conrad) does."

As far as what he wants to accomplish at Broadway, Pastor Carl hopes to "break the cycles" of poverty. "I want to see less need for ser-

vices provided. I want to see people be able to provide for themselves."

Role models he looks to for inspiration are pastors Mike Mather in Indianapolis and Jeff Newton in Kokomo. Mike Mather, pastor here at Broadway Christian Parish UMC South Bend from 1992-2003, and now at Broadway UMC in Indianapolis, shared the altar with Pastor Carl in July.

The two led the funeral services for Joe Taschetta. Joe's brother Tony, a Catholic priest, joined them. Joe and his wife Ronda Hughes are not only beloved members of Broadway, but are known throughout the area for their activism – and Joe for his musical talents.

This kind of camaraderie is emblematic of Broadway. And Pastor Carl has found himself engaged right from the start. Days after serving at that funeral, he welcomed a little boy into the church with the waters of baptism.

When asked for books he could recommend that particularly address the spiritual life, he thought hard. He calls *Knowledge of the Holy* by A.W. Tozer a classic on the character of God. The modern

rewrite is *God as He Longs for You to See Him* by Pastor Chip Ingram. *Poisonwood Bible* by Barbara Kingsolver helped prepare Heather and Carl for ministry as a family. He says *When I Relax I Feel Guilty* by Tim Hansel helped him understand his weaknesses and find joy. He also named anything by John Grisham for inspiring, legal humor, and anything by Stephen King for addressing evil.

His favorite movies are the Star Wars trilogy for the childhood memories and Harry Potter for the child and friendship development. "Both show good triumphing over evil through sacrifice," he said. "We just watched *The Mountain Between Us* with beautiful cinematography, compelling story and character development."

Podcasts are another of his inspirations. He likes *The Ringer* for sports, *Radiolab* for science, *Ask Me Another* for trivia, and *Catholic Stuff You should Know* for theological discussion.

Now, enough sitting still. He's off on his bike!

Couple meets and marries while working at Broadway

Among the anniversaries Broadway is celebrating, such as the 125th year of the church's founding and 100th year in this building, another came up Oct. 21. In 2017, Kathie and Dave Siders got married in the parsonage where they are making their home. Both are familiar faces at the church.

Dave, who has been coming to Broadway since 2002, does maintenance and custodial work as part of Broadway's paid staff. Kathie Hoffman came to Broadway in 2015 from Evangel Heights as a volunteer to run the Clothing Closet.

In the course of their workdays, they started up conversations and the rest is history, says Dave. "Once I was having a really bad day and I put my arm around her and said, 'You know what we could do right now? We could go to Cancun and get married.'"

Kathie smiles at the mention of his proposal. "When things get really bad, we just say 'Cancun,' and the word is pleasant enough."

"One of these days we might even get there," says Dave.

In the meantime, they are continuing to raise three of Kathie's special needs grandsons when they get home from their church work. When her daughter Ann died six years ago, Kathie became the sole guardian for Ann's boys, ages 9, 15, and 17. Kathie has five other children, 12 grandchildren (with the 13th on the way!) and two great-grandchildren. In addition to her 20 hours a week at Broadway, she also volunteers for the adult disabled at Evangel Heights.

Dave is paid for 16 hours at Broadway, but volunteers long after his paid shift is finished. He came to Broadway for the ministries offered to the homeless. "I realized there are people here who care about the homeless." The church helped him turn his life around. "I let alcohol abuse me," he says. This Christmas will mark eight years of being sober. "I realized God had a plan for me."

Kathie came to Broadway on a promise she made after the last bout of her radiation treatment for cancer. "I made a deal with God that Easter Sunday. I realized it was time to give back."

Recently Kathie has found another way to serve. With the guidance of Pastor Carl Hetler, she's studying to become a Stephen Minister to provide Christ-centered emotional and spiritual care to others. "I'm learning to be one-on-one with someone to help them through bad times, like death or divorce."

Kathie is clearly well-suited for this role. As Dave knows very well, she has a gift for knowing how to really listen. And when troubles come into their own lives, these two newlyweds know the magic word. "Cancun."

Bringing the joy

Jubilee Christmas Store seeks volunteers and donations for another spirited event

It's time again to gear up for the annual Jubilee Christmas Store at Broadway! On Saturday, Dec. 15, a hundred families are expected to participate in what is perhaps the most festive of all Broadway's ministries and projects throughout the year.

Families deemed eligible will be able to have adults come and select toys, books, stockings, and other gifts as Christmas presents for youngsters ages infant through teens. Volunteers will help stock tables, wrap presents and assist adults in selecting items for different genders and ages. Before leaving, each family will also receive a box of food for a hearty Christmas meal.

For those bringing their children along, there will be a special arts and crafts room for kids to occupy while parents are picking out their presents and where kids will be able to pick out presents for their parents as well. Recipients are scheduled in "waves" every hour from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. throughout the day. A special lunch is also served for all volunteers.

As you can imagine, it takes a lot of volunteers as well as donations of cash and items for the store. Our budget for the event is \$5,500, which includes money to buy food, needed toys and other items. Broadway accepts donations of toys all year round but monetary contributions at this time help fill the gaps for certain kinds of toys and certain age groups, such as teens.

Interns continue to contribute to Broadway's ministries

As is the case with many non-profit organizations, volunteers are the life-blood for Broadway. And college interns are a special type of volunteer that has served our church well over the years.

This year, Collin Rakowski is a social work intern from Indiana University South Bend. He brings skills and experiences that have prepared him for working with guests that often struggle with mental illnesses, addictions, and violence in their lives.

He works alongside Ronda Hughes, a Broadway member and volunteer who provides case management for guests, and Kenny Jones Sr., hospitality coordinator, by listening and helping guests to solve problems, and referring them to community services. He will coordinate intakes for Broadway's Christmas Jubilee.

Collin is also supervised in his internship by Broadway member Joann Phillips, MSW, a licensed social worker who also teaches part-time at IU South Bend. She

recently retired as Human Services program chair at Ivy Tech Community College, where many of her students volunteered and interned at Broadway, but this is Broadway's first IU South Bend student intern.

"Collin was my student at Ivy Tech, and I've had him in three classes at IU South Bend, so I know

him well, and I knew he would be a perfect fit for Broadway," explained Joann. "He is street-smart, but also caring and a good listener."

"In fact, Kenny started at Broadway nine years ago as an Ivy Tech intern," said Joann. "And Laurianne Stamm, Broadway office manager, also began as an Ivy Tech intern."

Many students from area colleges have made similar contributions over the years, whether through long-term internships or one-time volunteering, such as at Christmas Jubilee. Ivy Tech, IU South Bend, and Bethel College students have helped with the summer reading program. Saint Mary's College nursing students provide care for guests, and Broadway has had numerous Notre Dame graduate students participating in our ministries.

"The relationships with community partners such as Broadway benefit both the students and the agencies," explained Lesley Weiss, Coordinator of Field Education for bachelor's level social work students at IU South Bend.

Remembering Joe Taschetta

*“What’s that man talkin’ about?
He’s talkin’ ‘bout the band, the human band,
Cuz he belongs to that band, Hallelujah.” **

In July Broadway lost one of its most inspirational and entertaining members, Joe Taschetta, who suffered a fatal heart attack while on his Sunday evening walk along the St. Joe River, near his home. Survivors include his two daughters and his wife, Ronda, a stalwart Broadway volunteer and longtime member. He was 75 years old.

Joe had an accomplished career as an engineer and engineering professor, including a stint working for a NASA affiliate in Florida. But it was his talent as a songwriter and folksinger, along with his advocacy for social justice, that Broadway folks will carry forth in their memories.

He was a gifted performer on the banjo, guitar and autoharp, and wrote “The 5-String Banjo Primer — If A is May, F# Must Be February.” He worked for both the Iowa and Indiana Arts Councils in spreading his love of music and folk songs in many schools. He was also a self-taught artist, and exhibited locally, regionally and in the Netherlands. His paintings of scenes from Broadway’s Sunday Community Dinner and our Southeast Side neighborhood in South Bend oc-

cupy prominent places on Broadway’s walls.

For anyone who knew him, it was clear that Joe had a heightened perception for good music, good food, and good fellowship. Joe was always generous with his good cheer, and he was passionate about issues of

social justice and spoke his piece through songs performed at protest rallies and at Broadway.

We could always count on Joe to get people up and moving and singing when he unleashed his banjo during worship. Joe’s spirit infused Broadway each time we followed his lead in “When the Saints go Marching In” during our All Saints service (and most recently at Pastor Bette’s send-off), or declared that we “belong to that band” to conclude the Easter service, or with other songs on innumerable occasions.





Broadway is located on the corner of Broadway and Carroll streets in South Bend, Indiana. It is one-half block directly south of the South Bend Ivy Tech Community College campus.
