Communication is conservation?








Šyša: beautiful meadow – problemic site

- Annual floods and water pumping issues
- Eutrophic meadows abandoned and overgrown with bushes

- Good practice example study visit for farmers

















ESRI ArcGIS platform – on spot communication tool






 Good practice example as recommendation for protected area specialists on providing efficient information for farmers
