



# HELENA NORDENSTEDT HEAD OF RESEARCH GAPMINDER

# Opening Keynote and 'Mind the Gap! ' Workshop Leader

Helena is the Head of Research at the Gapminder Foundation since 2018. Her background is as a physician with a PhD from Karolinska Institute, but then she turned into a global health enthusiast and researcher, via missions for Doctors without borders in Democratic Republic of Congo and West Africa during the Ebola outbreak.



# MAIKE WINTERS CHIEF IGNORANCE HUNTER GAPMINDER

Maike is Chief Ignorance Hunter at the Gapminder Foundation, crafting and testing hundreds of questions to see where chimps score better than humans. She is also a PhD student at the Karolinska Institute in Stockholm, focusing on risk communication and infectious disease outbreaks.







# JOANNA BUSZA ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR LONDON SCHOOL OF HYGIENE AND TROPICAL MEDICINE

#### **Panelist**

Joanna Busza is Director of the Centre for Evaluation at the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine, and Associate Professor in Sexual and Reproductive Health. She has over 25 years' experience in community-based public health research, with a focus on qualitative and mixed methods studies, including use of participatory methods to increase involvement of community members in the design and evaluation of interventions. She has collaborated extensively with vulnerable populations including sex workers, undocumented migrants, and street children. Joanna has worked throughout sub-Saharan Africa, Southeast Asia and Eastern Europe and was based in Ethiopia between 2013 and 2018 as LSHTM technical advisor to WHO and the Federal Ministry of Health for establishing and strengthening the national maternal death surveillance and response (MDSR) system. Her current research involves conducting process evaluations of complex interventions in the fields of HIV prevention and treatment, safe labour migration, and adolescent sexual health in both Ethiopia and 7imbabwe



# KATY FOOTMAN SENIOR ABORTION RESEARCHER MARIE STOPES INTERNATIONAL

#### **Panelist**

Katy Footman is a senior researcher at Marie Stopes International focusing on safe abortion and post-abortion care. She manages Marie Stopes' global portfolio of abortion research, led the development of the organization's safe abortion and post-abortion care strategy, and supports the translation of evidence into policy and programmes. Katy has worked in research, monitoring, and evaluation at Marie Stopes for five years, and previously conducted research on maternal health and health systems strengthening at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine.



# CARINA HIRSCH ADVOCACY AND PROJECT MANAGER POPULATION & SUSTAINABILITY NETWORK

#### **Panelist**

I have been working to improve the status of women and girls for over 10 years within UN agencies, International NGOs and now at the Margaret Pyke Trust for the past 5 years. I have solid field experience implementing projects to improve the lives of rural women in Niger, Sierra Leone, Burkina Faso and India. I advocate on the importance of SRHR, and family planning in particular, not only to improve the health, well-being and lives of women and girls, but also to further environmental objectives including habitat conservation and climate action. In the era of the SDGs, it is so important to ensure that SRHR is not side-lined and it is up to us to provide the evidence and be the voice that communicates the importance of SRHR to new audiences. In particular, I have been an advocate for the Population. Health and Environment (PHE) approach as an effective, rights-based approach to achieve better health, gender and conservation objectives for the rural communities representing the "last mile"



# TIZIANA LEONE ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR LONDON SCHOOL OF ECONOMICS AND POLITICAL SCIFNCE

#### **Panelist**

Tiziana Leone is an Associate Professor in the department of International Development at the London School of Economics. Tiziana's research agenda is focused on women's health in LMICs with a focus on lifecourse around maternal and reproductive health. She is currently studying the linkages that menarche, menopause and mid-life age have on fertility outcomes and health in later life. She has collaborated in expert roles with international organisations (eg: WHO, UNFPA and UNICEF) in tracking the progress of the MDGs and SDGs in LMICs on maternal health.



# JOE STRONG PHD STUDENT LONDON SCHOOL OF ECONOMICS AND POLITICAL SCIENCE

#### **Panel Chair**

Joe Strong is a PhD student in the Department of Social Policy at the London School of Economics. His current research explores the relationship between men, masculinities and emergency contraception and abortion trajectories in Ghana. Further research areas include sexual and reproductive health among adolescents, women's empowerment, and data collection methodologies. His most recent publication was a scoping review on puberty and menstruation knowledge among young adolescents in LMICs.



# KAREN GLASER PROFESSOR KING'S COLLEGE LONDON

#### **Closing Keynote**


Professor Glaser has been at King's College London for more than 20 years and is now head of the Department of Global Health & Social Medicine in the Faculty of Social Science & Public Policy.

Karen has had a long-standing interest in the demography of grandparental care. Since 2010 she has worked on a project investigating Grandparenting across 12 European countries, leading on to an ESRC funded research project entitled 'Grandparents Caring for Grandchildren: Impacts on Health'.

Karen recently finished leading a three-year crossresearch council consortium across six institutions investigating the impact of extending paid work in later life on health and wellbeing. The research examined how inequalities across the life course relate to paid work in later life in the UK

Currently, Karen is leading an ESRC funded project investigating how varying care systems are associated with inequalities in care and wellbeing in later life.
