
## MoesGoes to Cambodia

JOY IN MOMENTS GREAT AND SMALL

I'm a person who lives for the loud moments - once-in-a-lifetime opportunities that make my heart race. I've always struggled with the small moments and average days that pass without anything



I've been blessed the past few months with many loud moments - indeed, many loud *days*. My coworker Muntar invited me to her neighborhood's Khatan (a three-day celebration where offerings are made to the local temple), and we ate boboa (Khmer porridge) and danced in circles around the pagoda. Cambodia YAGMs had our first fall retreat in the rainforests of Ratinikiri, where we swam in freshwater lakes and rode longboats to visit Khmer tribal communities. I celebrated a birthday with cake and a frosting fight. Four different missions groups from

Australia and Singapore have passed through Kruos, bringing with them medical supplies, dinners at new restaurants, community baptisms, and plenty of dancing. The latest mission group was here for perhaps the 'loudest' moment I've had yet: Christmas in Cambodia, complete with traditional dances, a pageant (I was Herod's Servant), Khmer Christmas Carols, and literal dancing 'round the Christmas tree.

As I continue to settle into life in Cambodia, and novelties of daily life here become increasingly 'normal', I'm reminded that another reason I chose to do YAGM is *because* days would become unexciting. I'm slowly



learning to find the beauty of simplicity: taking walks through the village with my sisters, laughing at a joke my student makes, learning a new way to cook vegetables, harvesting rice again and again under the vast Khmer sky.

In moments great and small, I'm finding goodness here.

## REFLECTIONS **ON TEACHING**

While I work in a variety of capacities in the Kruos Community, my main job is to teach English, both at church for village children (free classes offered to them). and with 8th and 9th graders at the local secondary school.

I won't lie - I've wrestled with being a teacher. I struggle with unfamiliar learning styles, confusing government standards, and translating grammar into an unfamiliar alphabet. At the beginning, I especially struggled with my identity as a teacher here, as I had never really considered teaching English to be a large part of ministry.

I'm realizing quickly, however, how vital this education is not only for the people here but for the development of the Lutheran Church in Cambodia as a whole.

First and foremost, English is a language that is required for almost any outward-facing job in Cambodia, from the quickly growing tourist-industry, to any job that deals with international economic development (which is most larger business jobs, as most of





Cambodia's economic growth is being jump-started by foreign businesses). This means that for the youth of my community, learning English is vital for getting a good job and being able to reinvest in their own community's growth.

Because English is such a strongly desired skill set (as are some of the church's other course offerings, including coursework on agriculture and using computers), the fact that the church in this rural village offers these courses for basically free is a HUGE deal. This means more people than ever, both children and adults. are coming to the church every single day, and subsequently being exposed to its ministry and messages.

It also means that the church is actively engaging in the message that Jesus preached: reaching out to its community and providing true "love thy neighbor" services without out regard to religion, ethnicity, or any other factor. That fact alone has helped me really come to appreciate the work I get to engage in this year and the people I get to do it alongside.
