Re: Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Notice of Proposed Rulemaking: Revision of Categorical Eligibility in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

Dear Certification Policy Branch:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit comments in response to the proposed changes to categorical eligibility requirements based on receipt of Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) benefits.

Kentucky Voices for Health brings together individuals, advocates, community organizations, state agencies, and policymakers to address the underlying causes of poor health. As an advocacy organization focused on the improved health and well-being of all Kentuckians, we take this opportunity to comment in opposition to these proposed changes. The new rule will have detrimental impacts on the health and well-being of individuals, including children and their families, and add additional stress to the health care system in terms of increased utilization and costs.

SNAP is a critical health intervention and support for vulnerable Americans. Research shows that:

- Food insecurity increases the risk of negative physical and mental health outcomes
- SNAP decreases food insecurity;
- SNAP is associated with decreased health care costs; and
- SNAP is associated with improved physical and mental health.

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Food insecurity increases the risk of negative physical and mental health outcomes

Food insecurity is a risk factor for negative psychological and health outcomes.¹ (The U.S. Department of Agriculture defines food insecurity as a "lack of consistent access to enough food for an active, healthy life."² Food insecurity has deleterious impacts on health through increases in the prevalence and severity of diet-related disease, such as obesity, type 2 diabetes, heart disease, stroke, and some cancers. ^{3, 4, 5}

In addition, because of limited financial resources, those who are food insecure —with or without existing disease — may use coping strategies to stretch budgets that are harmful for health, such as engaging in cost-related medication underuse or non-adherence;^{6, 7, 8} postponing or forgoing preventives or needed medical care;^{9, 10} and forgoing the foods needed for special medical diets (e.g., diabetic diets).¹¹ Not surprisingly, research shows that household food insecurity is a strong predictor of higher health care utilization and increased health care costs.^{12, 13}

Kentucky experiences food insecurity at a higher rate than the national average, with a prevalence rate of 14.2% of households with low food security and 6.2% of households with very low food insecurity in 2017.¹⁴

SNAP decreases food insecurity

Overall, research shows that SNAP is effective at reducing food insecurity. ^{15, 16, 17} According to one estimate, SNAP reduces food insecurity by approximately 30 percent. ¹⁸ SNAP, therefore, is an effective anti-hunger program, and more eligible people need to be connected to the program given the current high rates of food insecurity in the nation. Nearly one in eight American households experience food insecurity during the year. ¹⁹

SNAP is associated with decreased health care costs

Research demonstrates that SNAP reduces health care utilization and costs.^{20, 21, 22} For example, a national study revealed that SNAP participation was associated with lower health care costs.²³ On average, low-income adults participating in SNAP incurred nearly 25 percent less in health care costs in 12 month, including those paid by private or public insurance, than low-income adults not participating in SNAP.

SNAP is associated with improved physical and mental health

SNAP improves children, adult, and senior health outcomes, including physical and mental health.²⁴ For instance, SNAP increases the probability of self-reporting "excellent" or "good health,"²⁵ lowers the risk of poor glucose control (for those with diabetes), ²⁶ and has a protective effect on mental health.²⁷ SNAP also helps reduce stress for struggling individuals and families worried about finances, and stress is highly correlated with poor health outcomes.²⁸ In Kentucky, SNAP can play an especially important role in improving health outcomes; Kentucky lags the national average in almost all major health indicators.²⁹

Opposition to the rule change is strong

Given Kentucky Voices for Health's mission, we write to express our concern with the Department of Agriculture's (the Department) interest in narrowing categorical eligibility for SNAP by implementing a penalty for families who save for their futures. Removal of broadbased categorical eligibility will dismantle the policy's dual purpose of streamlining program administration while ensuring that SNAP benefits are targeted to the appropriate households, so we ask that the Department not move forward with this proposal.

Kentucky Voices for Health also reaches out to those impacted by proposed policies to provide an opportunity for input. 102 individuals, representing SNAP recipients, their family members, and members of the community at large responded to our request for comments. Among SNAP recipients who responded, over 95% ranked the importance of SNAP to provide food for their family as an 8, 9 or 10 on a scale of 1-10 (over 88% ranked this as "10"). Using that same scale, almost 70% of SNAP recipients said they were worried they could lose their benefits due to this new rule. For all respondents, over 93% did not believe anyone eligible for assistance now should lose it because of the new rule. 88% of all respondents wanted the program's rules to remain as they are today, without changes.

Eliminating Categorical Eligibility Would Increase Administrative Burdens and Make it Harder for Households to Access Benefits

The harms of this proposal were clearly identified when an identical provision was introduced in the 2018 Farm Bill. Congress rejected this proposal because of the unjustified administrative burdens to the SNAP program and the widespread health impacts of a decrease in access to food. In addition, this provision contradicts the established role of the SNAP program and broad-based categorical eligibility. The United States Department of Agriculture estimates that 3.1 million individuals would lose SNAP benefits under the proposed rule, making up about 9% of SNAP recipients.³⁰ Kentucky's Cabinet for Health and Family Services, which oversees the SNAP program, has projected an 8% loss in SNAP eligibility, representing over 42,000 Kentuckians.

More than 40 states and territories already use broad-based categorical eligibility to effectively reach low-income communities with a low administrative burden. Broad-based categorical eligibility has allowed Kentucky to implement less restrictive asset requirements, which expands the social safety net to more low-income people who need help. Additionally, categorical eligibility has ensured those who would greatly benefit from SNAP experience a simplified application process by allowing those who have already undergone the qualification process for other benefits to avoid an unnecessary administrative burden.

Imposition of a savings penalty limits families' ability to weather emergencies

In Kentucky, an asset limit of \$2,250 would mean families could have enough in savings to weather unexpected expenses. For example, in rural Kentucky especially, owning a car is practically a requirement to obtain or maintain employment; without reliable transportation, recipients may not be able to continue employment. The sudden need for repairs or replacement could easily exceed \$2,250, placing the income-eligible household in a dangerous situation. Without reliable transportation, this unexpected expense can quickly turn into a catastrophic emergency. This proposed rule forces households to choose between building assets to cover such unexpected expenses or keeping assets low to feed their families, impairing their ability to climb out of poverty. The link between assets and poverty is well-established and should always be taken into consideration when designing safety-net policy.³²

States face significant cost increases under this proposed rule

Removal of broad-based categorical eligibility would be inconsistent with state rules on other federal programs like TANF and Medicaid, adding costly administrative burdens to the Commonwealth. This would require expensive changes in information systems, training, and eligibility processing procedures. As a result of this proposed rule, Kentucky would incur an estimated \$4M in additional costs just for those items.³³ The removal of broad-based categorical eligibility also increases program "churn," where households move on and off the SNAP program within a short period, incurring financial and administrative costs for both the individuals and the state. States with broad-based categorical eligibility have been shown to reduce administrative churn by 26%.³⁴ It is important to note that this churn is more often associated with recipients' inability to document assets timely rather than owning assets in excess of the limits. These administrative burdens put an unnecessary drain on state and federal resources, complicate administrative processes, and limit the ability of states to fulfill the intended purpose of the SNAP program and broad-based categorical eligibility.

The Department's own summary of the rule indicates that, overall, the Federal government will reduce expenditures because the administrative burden is less than the planned savings achieved by eliminating benefits. While this may be true at the Federal level, this proposed rule creates a financial loss to Kentucky on three fronts. First, Kentucky will spend more money to administer the program. Second, this increase in expenditures ensures that over 42,000 Kentuckians will lose benefits. Third, this loss of 100% Federally-funded benefits represents an estimated \$52M loss of 100% Federal benefits in Kentucky each year. This impacts all facets of the food industry, from farmers to grocery stores. In short, this rule would force Kentucky to spend more money to assist fewer families while harming the state's economy in the process.

The Proposed Rule Would Have Disproportionate Impacts on the Most Vulnerable Populations

Millions of low-income people rely on the program to access a nutritious diet and approximately two-thirds of SNAP participants are children, elderly, or people with disabilities. The percentage of households with elderly individuals in Kentucky has increased to nearly 20 percentage points, and the number of seniors using SNAP will only continue to grow as our

nation ages. ³⁵ The USDA estimates that 17.2 million households currently eligible under broadbased categorical eligibility would undergo a more burdensome application process under the proposed rule. ³⁶ These administrative barriers would disproportionately impact seniors and people with disabilities. For example, 13.2% of households with elderly members would lose SNAP benefits under the rule. ³⁷

Additionally, the inclusion of broad-based categorical eligibility in the SNAP program allows seniors and people with disabilities to build their savings. Under SNAP's existing broad-based categorical eligibility, Kentucky has eliminated the extremely low asset limit of \$3,500 for seniors and people with disabilities. Without broad-based categorical eligibility, seniors and people with disabilities are penalized for building even small nest eggs and are also less capable of weathering unexpected emergencies. The proposed rule would make vulnerable populations less financially secure, and one unexpected emergency—like replacement of an aged heating or cooling system—could have devastating consequences.

The existing program structure of SNAP helps address childhood hunger and its devastating impacts. SNAP participation is linked with better health for children throughout their life span, and has positive impacts on their caregivers, including improved maternal health.³⁹ Broadbased categorical eligibility also allows children to be automatically enrolled in free and reduced school lunch programs. The Congressional Budget Office estimates that 265,000 children are enrolled in free school lunches because of this expanded eligibility. While families would still qualify for free or reduced lunch with the elimination of broad-based categorical eligibility, the additional burden of qualifying for the separate program may be a deterrent for families, leaving more children in our nation hungry. We know the detrimental effects of poor

nutrition in children⁴¹ and the elimination of free school lunches for a quarter of a million children would exacerbate those negative impacts.

An overwhelming amount of evidence shows that the SNAP program has a dramatic impact on improving the health of vulnerable populations. Broad-based categorical eligibility ensures the people who qualify for and need food assistance can receive it without unnecessary administrative burdens. We strongly urge you maintain broad-based categorical eligibility in its current form, recognizing the critical role food security plays in health. An elimination of the status quo of the SNAP program—as recognized by Congress in passing the 2018 Farm Bill—would be a misguided action that would have devastating long-term health impacts for many low-income Kentuckians.

For most households, the proposed "money in the bank" limit is \$2,250. For households with a person getting disability or over age 59, the limit us \$3,500.


Kentuckians would not be able to get SNAP benefits until they proved they had less than these new limits. State workers would also have to prove people don't have too much money in the bank.



Do you or someone in your family receive SNAP?




Is any member of your household over age 59 or getting disability payments?




How important are SNAP benefits for you or your family to have enough food?




How worried are you that you could lose your SNAP benefits because of this new rule?



Poor people need money in the bank in order to cover emergencies, just like middle class people do. Car repairs, medical emergencies, appliance repairs/replacement are just some of the reasons that poor people need a nest egg saved. If their monthly incomes are so low that they need SNAP in order to survive, then their monthly incomes are too low to cover emergencies. Having money in a savings account is crucial.

How would a requirement that limits the amount low-income households can save affect your community? We need to encourage everyone to save for their future. Everyone should try to have both long and short term savings. It is very expensive to be poor and an emergency fund could save a job if a car needs repairs. Cars that are not repaired are often hazardous when driven.

How would a requirement that limits the amount low-income households can save affect your community? The amount being suggested as a limit is barely enough to cover one family emergency (e.g. car repair, home repair). This could be catastrophic to the progress that people receiving SNAP benefits have made toward overcoming poverty.

This limited thinking by politicians who have never known struggle, puts barriers on folks who are trying. Poverty is expensive.

How would a requirement that limits the amount low-income households can save affect your community? It would keep people from trying to save for emergencies and put them in vulnerable positions.

How would a requirement that limits the amount low-income households can save affect your community? Having basic savings can mean the difference between inconvenience and catastrophe when unexpected expenses arise in low-income homes. I don't want people to end up homeless if their hot water heater breaks down. Also it sounds like this change would cost a fortune in enforcement costs, which leads me to believe that this isn't about saving taxpayers money but rather about inflicting cruelty on already vulnerable people.

How would a requirement that limits the amount low-income households can save affect your community? Anything beyond an income requirement is an unnecessary barrier. SNAP benefits are extremely low - which is why there have been challenges to "live on a SNAP budget for a week". It is hard enough to navigate the system without added barriers to gaining and maintaining SNAP - not to mention the cost for staff to ensure extra requirements are met. If the income requirement is met, there shouldn't be any additional factors required, both to allow stressed individuals access to food and to minimize additional cost to workers to sift through these additional papers and requirements.

How would a requirement that limits the amount low-income households can save affect your community? Huge impact on school children, elderly, single parent income, minimum wage job earners, underemployed people. People need a basic rain fund and 2000 is nothing when facing emergencies.

How would a requirement that limits the amount low-income households can save affect your community?Less people to have benefits and buy goods they can sell instead of provide for their children. SNAP should be for healthy food only.

How would a requirement that limits the amount low-income households can save affect your community? Adding an assets test to SNAP qualifications would make an already complicated system even more difficult for struggling families. When individuals and families are not allowed to accrue any savings, they are one car repair, home repair, or medical bill away from disaster.

We are always preaching that people should have savings. When we force people to drain all of their existing assets before we help them, we place them in a dangerous place. Is it really ""help"" if we're forcing them to be further hurt before we give them a hand? When we require ""asset tests"", we start a cycle where people are never able to ""get caught up"" or ""get ahead"" because any day they have a savings of any size, they lose the help they've been counting on which helped them get to that point. We force people to choose between reliable food assistance and working overtime one week to save a bit for car repair. It's not a reliable ""help"". Proposed changes like this create systemic cycles of poverty by stripping people of their ability to save for rent downpayments, to move out of bad neighborhoods, to get a reliable vehicle, etc. We need to keep giving people the chance to actually improve their lives. These changes punish instead of reward good decision making."

How would a requirement that limits the amount low-income households can save affect your community?Low income households would have to make tough choices when buying since food is a

survival must have. Purchases other than food would be cut to the bone which would impact local merchants and service providers, health care cost would rise due to health impact, school absences would probably increase due to the same health issues impacting funding based on attendance and the level of peace and prosperity would lessen.
