Touching Strangers

There is a triple meaning to "Touching Strangers." For Richard Renaldi, the meaning is captured by the nature of touch that he crafts. For the subjects of the photos, the meaning is the unexpected response of connection while posed. For those viewing the photographs, the meaning is how touching and evocative they are: a testament to our longing for connection.



Since 2007, photographer Richard Renaldi has worked on a series of photographs for which he asks complete strangers to physically interact while posing together for a portrait. Working on the street with a large format 8-by-10 view camera, Renaldi encounters his subjects in towns and cities all over the United States.

Renaldi's objective was to introduce an unpredictable variable into a traditional photographic formula, and to create spontaneous and fleeting relationships between complete strangers.

In the Spring of 2014, Aperture Foundation published *Touching Strangers* as a photobook (128 pages with 71 four color images), including new photographs from Renaldi's shoots in Albuquerque, Chicago, New York City, and Southern California.

Humans of New York (and more)

"This is a picture of me before I lost my job. It was only a year ago but I barely recognize that person now. I was thirty pounds heavier. I was much more confident. It felt like a guardian angel was guiding my



steps. Things always seemed to work out for me. Now it seems like my guardian angel is drunk. Now I look at this picture and see a man who's wearing a mask. The man in the picture wants to be seen as a person who does important things. He wants to be seen as confident, and harsh, and a leader. He wants to be seen as an attorney. Now I just want to be seen as a person. Someone who's calm. Who's balanced. Who loves his friends and family. And who's kind." (Moscow, Russia)

Brandon Stanton started *Humans of New York* in 2010. He writes, "The initial goal was to photograph 10,000 New Yorkers on the street, and create an exhaustive catalogue of the city's inhabitants. ... Along the way, I began to interview my subjects in addition to photographing them. Alongside ... portraits, I'd include quotes and short stories from their lives." The project expanded to feature photos and stories from over 20 countries. Stanton's work is featured in two exquisite books: *Humans of New York* (2013, 304 pages) & *Humans of New York: Stories* (2015, 428 pages).
