



Alexander Movement Technique and The Easy Button

This class is an introduction to Alexander Movement, a technique that teaches participants to use their bodies efficiently and effectively, no matter what they're doing. Participants will take on a variety of everyday activities, finding "the easy button" approach to that task. Here is your chance to experience this new addition to Lawrence's curriculum!

The Psychology of Mindfulness Meditation

Mindfulness meditation (i.e., paying attention, on purpose and without judgment) is an emerging area of treatment for a variety of psychological problems. Its roots are in Eastern philosophy, and it is now being widely applied in conjunction with more traditional Western approaches. In this class, participants will explore the practice of mindfulness meditation and the research on its effectiveness for mental health. Be prepared for some experiential learning!

Freshman Studies: Borges and I

The short fiction of Jorge Luis Borges has been an important part of the *Freshman Studies* curriculum since 2006. Participants will examine how the story *Borges and I* manages to ask deep questions about the nature of identity, authorship and audience. In the process Borges captures the essence of *Freshman Studies*—in less than 350 words.

Thinking About Harry Potter

J. K. Rowling's tales of Harry Potter and his magical world have captivated readers of all ages, including many Lawrentians. Explore how Rowling cast Harry as a reconciler of opposites who brings hope out of despair. The hero is a product of the past but possesses the intellect to recognize history's shaping of the future. All levels of Harry Potter knowledge are welcome.

Wine encompasses everything: science, technology, art, history, religion, economics, psychology, even politics. Participants will consider this special treasure in a freewheeling lecture that includes the appropriate gustatory dimension.

Gamelan is a traditional percussion-based music from the Indonesian islands of Bali and Java. This hands-on workshop will offer participants an opportunity to learn the basic playing techniques of one of Southeast Asia's great ensemble music traditions. No musical experience necessary.

Sustainable China: A Ground-Level View

According to this new interdisciplinary program at Lawrence, understanding sustainability in China means understanding the "Three Cs"—commerce, conservation and culture. In this class, participants will look at the challenges of this incredibly complex relationship through the lens of a three-week, nine-city research trip that students and faculty took in December 2011, and also discuss how the program will give students and faculty hands-on opportunities to address sustainability in China in the future.
