



The Pronto Bio-Toilet is a futuristic solution for a challenging national problem; the Mobile 1000 concept bypasses legacy hurdles; the SHUDHU solution has virtually eradicated health challenges in specific geographic pockets; the E-Learning initiative has graduated educational delivery into the next generation.
