




Image 13 - Regular HOG riders are Dick with partner Jen.






Image 14 - Dick pointing out a "Don't be a Dick" sticker on someone's helmet. But our Dick is not a Dick if you know what I mean!

Image 17 - It will soon be 9.00 am so it's time to address all riders present on ride procedures and protocols and Covid-19 Pandemic requirements.






Image 18 – Here we see Smiddy (at right in foreground) delivering the ride brief to all in attendance.






Image 21 – THAT'S not surround sound, THIS is surround sound!





Image 22 - Here we are about to turn right onto Rooty Hill Road, early on in the ride. There is no APP that gives you this experience!






Image 23 - What a glorious sight, Harleys taking up the whole roadway! Sounds good too!

Image 25 - Sparkles (Mark) and Chris are obviously pleased they came out today.






Image 26 (downloaded) - The Old Northern Road takes us through rural and bush areas on our way to Wisemans Ferry.





Image 27 - A stop for roadworks allows me to take a photo showing you the typical scenery along the Old Northern Road.







Image 30 - My friend Giuseppe is most impressed and envious of the great spirit in the HOGS and the terrific rides we organise.





Image 32 – Also with us today is Yogi (Rob) with his new Harley CVO.






Image 33 - As we wait for the ferry, Tail End Charlie Road Captain Danno (at left) arrives reporting no-one is left behind.






Image 34 - Enjoying the ride and the warming sun is Nigel with Lillian.





Image 35 (downloaded) - Travelling across the Hawkesbury River on the car ferry is all part of the fun and adventure and is an opportunity to enjoy its natural beauty. This ferry is capable of carrying 24 cars each trip and has a 120-tonne load limit. It operates 24/7 on demand and is toll free.






Image 36 - We are on-board at 10.30 am making the crossing. We all fit on easily with enough room for a few cars as well. It's a slow and steady crossing.

Did you know that until the opening of the Bridge across the Hawkesbury River at Brooklyn in 1945, this ferry was on the main route north out of Sydney?





Image 37 (downloaded) – Lets digress for a moment and talk about the bridge across the Hawkesbury River. The bridge crossing the Hawkesbury River at Brooklyn (known as the Peats Ferry Bridge) was completed in 1945 which then became the main route north out of Sydney. It has just one lane in each direction.





Image 38 (downloaded) – Of course progress in ongoing and here we see yet another bridge crossing the Hawkesbury river built adjacent to the Peats Ferry Bridge and it was completed in October 1973 with three lanes in each direction. It is 600 metres long and now carries the M1 Pacific Motorway.

The Peats Ferry Bridge on the right carries the Old Pacific Highway and is still in use.





Image 39 – Now back to the ride. We are still on the ferry and the crossing is 366 m in length and takes approximately 4 minutes to complete.



The Hawkesbury River is navigable from Windsor to the sea. There are no dams or locks on the river, and the effects of the tide are felt as far upstream as Windsor.






Image 48 - We have time for some happy-snaps and here we see Kelly with her Fat Boy Lo motorcycle.






Image 49 - Inseparable riding companions are Tarzan (Steve) with wife Jane.






Image 59 - The Tavern seating area is quite nice and spacious.

Image 63 - Social distancing is easy to comply with when you have such big, wide tables! Here we see Tarzan and Jane awaiting their lunch order.






Image 64 - After lunch we have a quick look around to check out the other retail outlets found here.

Image 65 - We then moved on to the Chocolate Factory which we could enter as others were leaving. Again, Nigel and Lillian pose for happy-snaps.






Image 66 - Inside the Chocolate Factory we see a range of artisan-made chocolates. I went for the dark chocolate covered coffee beans. Noiiiice!
