



TROPICAL STORM



Children play on the beach created when floods from tropical storm Agatha opened a new estuary in 2010. Communities who live on the Pacific coast of Guatemala are at risk of flooding every year.





EARTHQUAKE



The devastation in Port-au-Prince, the capital of Haiti, following a massive earthquake that struck on 12 January 2010.





FLOODS



Many areas of the Philippines are vulnerable to flooding and other extreme weather events – around 20 typhoons hit the country every year.

DEFINING DISASTER


Disasters are usually defined as events on a significant scale that cause harm to people through injury or death or through damage or loss to their property, environments or livelihoods.







COPING WITH DISASTER

COPING WITH DISASTER

- From where should resources, such as the money, equipment and labour, come to provide the things people need after a disaster?
