Diet and Physical Activity Grants

Grants of up to \$25,000 each will be awarded for projects that encourage and improve physical activity and healthy eating among residents in nine Central Louisiana parishes: Allen, Avoyelles, Catahoula, Grant, LaSalle, Natchitoches, Rapides, Vernon, and Winn. Nonprofits, government entities, and faith-based community groups may apply. Funds must be used to create, improve or repair physical-activity settings, such as walking trails, playgrounds or exercise stations, or for healthy food settings, such as farmers markets or community gardens.

Mini Opportunity Grants

These grants are intended to support projects of one year or less that fall under the foundation's priority areas with grants of up to \$10,000. Eligible requests include pilot programs or technical assistance for projects designed to test out an idea or specific time-limited projects that advance an organization's programs in some definable manner.

Program Opportunity Grants

These grants are intended to support large-scale projects or programs that fall within one of the foundation's priority areas: healthy people (promoting healthy behaviors and improving access to healthcare), education (increasing the level of educational attainment and achievement as the primary path to improved economic, social, and health status), and healthy communities (improving economic opportunity and family income, and enhancing civic and community opportunities for more effective leaders and organizations). Unsolicited requests for funding are not accepted under this program.

Technical Assistance Grants

These grants are limited to one-time only allocations of up to \$10,000 over a one-year period. Grants are made in an effort to respond to qualified organizations that recognize the need for project planning, research, and organizational development, in fields defined by the foundation (healthy people, education, and healthy communities)

Background

Incorporated in 1952 in CA.

Mr. Haas, who died in 1979, was president of Levi Strauss & Co., manufacturers of men's, boys', women's, misses', and children's apparel. Mrs. Haas served as vice-president of the fund until her death in 1990 The grantmaker is a signatory to Philanthropy's Promise, an initiative of the National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy (NCRP). By signing on, the grantmaker has committed to allocating the majority of its grantmaking dollars to marginalized communities and at least 25 percent to social justice strategies, such as advocacy, community organizing, and civic engagement.

Purpose and Activities

The mission of the fund is to help build a healthy, just, and vibrant society in which people feel connected to and responsible for their community. The areas of focus are the arts and culture, economic security, Jewish life, and public education. In addition, continuing support is provided to organizations that have long established ties to the fund.

Program Area(s)

The grantmaker has identified the following area(s) of interest:

Arts and Culture

The purpose of this area is to enable Bay Area residents to realize the full potential of the arts to build cross-cultural understanding and enrich individual lives. The four goals are: 1) Arts Education: To increase creative opportunities for children and youth who otherwise have limited access to studying the arts or to interacting with working artists; 2) Preservation of Cultural Heritage: To strengthen nonprofit organizations dedicated to the preservation of cultural heritage, particularly those that are based within and dedicated to sustaining arts traditions in recent immigrant communities; 3) Cultural Commons: Fostering shared understanding and a stronger sense of community through participation in the arts; and 4) via The Creative Work Fund: to foster partnerships between artists and nonprofit organizations to create new work and engage the public in new ways.

Economic Security

The purpose of this area is to help low-income adults and families achieve upward mobility and economic security. It supports programs that address these issues through direct services, public policy reform, and field building. The four goals are: 1) Workforce Development: To help low-income people gain the skills and access necessary to secure quality employment and achieve upward mobility; 2) Build and Protect Assets: To help low-income individuals and families gain and maintain the financial assets that increase economic security and upward mobility; and 3) Public Policy and Systems Change: To encourage changes in public policy, regulatory reform, and the delivery of services to low- and moderate-income people with the goal of increasing opportunities and removing barriers to economic security.

Employee Matching Gifts

The foundation matches the monetary gifts of its officers, trustees, and staff to charitable organizations.

Jewish Life

The purpose of this area is to foster a vibrant, inclusive Jewish community in the Bay Area, that offers opportunities for engagement in Jewish life and that encourages participation in the broader pluralistic society. The two goals are: 1) Promote Diversity: Build a strong and vibrant Jewish community able to harness the strength that results from a diverse population; and 2) Building Partnerships For Social Justice: Create effective partnerships based on shared values such as fairness, equality, and service.

Legacy Grantmaking

This program is designed to fund grants in fields important to the foundation's founders. Of particular note are the following programs: 1) San Francisco Parks: A small percentage of the grantmaking budget is allocated to exceptional community engagement initiatives that support and improve San Francisco's parks and open spaces (letters of inquiry are accepted); 2) Annual Grants: A limited number of grants will be provided to organizations supported by the donors in their lifetimes; 3) Jewish Community Federation: The foundation makes a significant contribution to the federation's annual campaign as a complement to the foundation's own Jewish Life program; 4) Descendent Grants: a small percentage of the foundation's grantmaking is reserved for descendent-initiated grants; 5) End-of-year Grant: The foundation makes a number of small grants to organizations that serve very low-income families and individuals; most of these grants are designed to address some of the special needs that arise during the holiday season.

Mission-Related Special Grantmaking

In keeping with its mission and values, the foundation will continue to be an active participant in its geographic, philanthropic and nonprofit communities. Most of their active engagement will be in one of the primary program areas. However, the foundation recognizes that there may be a relatively small number of special projects consistent with the foundation's mission, values and overall strategy that they would like to participate in. Such projects might involve advancing the effectiveness and accountability of philanthropy, for example, or be in response to extraordinary opportunities or crises facing critical community institutions and organizations.

Public Education

The purpose of this area is to improve the quality of public education by building effective school communities. The fund gives priority to programs that focus on increasing educational opportunities for underserved students. The three goals are: 1) School Leadership: To help principals and teachers in leadership positions improve practices in schools that result in academic gains for all students; 2) Teacher Quality: To help teachers improve instructional skills to engage students in rigorous, academic pursuits; and 3) Partnerships for School Improvement: To engage parents, youth, and the broader community in activities to improve the quality of education in public schools. The activities may be led by organizations external to the school system or be initiated within the public schools.

The Creative Work Fund

The fund invites artists and nonprofit organizations to create new art works through collaborations. It celebrates the role of artists as problem solvers and the making of art as a profound contribution to intellectual inquiry and to the strengthening of communities. Artists are encouraged to collaborate with nonprofit organizations of all kinds. Grants will be awarded to collaborating 501 (c) (3) nonprofit organizations, not directly to collaborating artists. Charrettes Grants

Grants for up to \$5,000 to assist housing developers with integrating green building systems in their developments and engage in a serious discussion of green design possibilities. Awards are given to affordable housing developers to coordinate a green design charrette.

Enterprise Bart Harvey Fellowship

Fellows provide substantial and creative support to Enterprise's senior management on projects selected for their strategic importance to the partners' mission. One applicant is selected every other year for the two-year fellowship. Key selection criteria are an evidenced commitment to public service and demonstration of exceptional skills in technical analysis, teamwork, leadership, and communications.

Enterprise Rose Architectural Fellowship

The fellowship creates partnerships between new architects and community-based organizations to direct the skills and passions of the architects in the service of low- and moderate-income communities. The fellowship is designed to promote architectural and community design in low-income communities and encourages architects to become life-long leaders in public service and community development.

Excellence in Urban Journalism Award

Awarded in conjunction with The Freedom Forum, this program recognizes two journalists who have demonstrated quality reporting on major issues facing the nation's urban populations, particularly in inner cities, with a \$2,500 award. Broadcasts, articles or series written by one reporter or a team can qualify. Topics may include, but are not limited to, housing, community safety, community development, welfare-to-work, child care, and transportation. The piece should discuss how a city or community has been affected by the situation. Ideally, the entry should include reporting on the outcome or resolution of the situation, or show responses through such vehicles as editorials and letters to the editor.

Green Communities Grants

This initiative works to build healthy, efficient homes for low-income people, and to make environmentally-sustainable development the mainstream in the affordable housing industry, by providing funds and expertise to enable developers to build and rehabilitate homes that are healthier, more energy-efficient, and better for the environment. Three types of grants are available under this program. Planning and construction grants award up to \$75,000 to cover planning and construction expenses, including additional costs of architectural work, engineering, site surveys, and costs associated with items such as a more efficient HVAC system, green materials, and energy-efficient appliances. Charettes grants of up to \$5,000 assist housing developers with integrating green building systems in their developments and engaging in a serious discussion of green design possibilities. Sustainability training grants of up to \$5,000 are also available for affordable housing developers, to cover the design and distribution of building operations and maintenance. Under this initiative, loans are also available to fund any or all of the typical costs related to affordable housing development prior to closing construction financing, or the acquisition of land or buildings intended to be developed as affordable homeownership or rental housing. Eligible applicants include 501(c)(3) nonprofits, public housing authorities, tribally-designated housing entities, for-profit entities, and for-profit entities participating through joint ventures with qualified organizations. Jim and Patty Rouse Award

This program celebrates the important work being done by community-based and regional nonprofit organizations and eligible tribal entities that engage in affordable housing development and comprehensive community revitalization. A \$10,000 award (in unrestricted funds) will be presented to a member of the Enterprise Network who develops and provides quality affordable housing, and has a strong record of strategic planning and community building and excellent residential and community services. Eligible organizations must be members of the Enterprise Network, be financially sound, and have a proven track record of housing development and other community services.

Lowering the Cost of Housing Competition

This competition is seeking submissions from multidisciplinary teams working to create multifamily affordable housing projects that improve neighborhoods and reduce traditional developmental and building costs. Up to \$250,000 in program-related investments will be awarded to the winning proposal. There is an additional \$50,000 in grant funds to be awarded to proposals that show innovation in practice or industry understanding of cost-lowering measures. Applications from teams comprised of architects, developers, and policy professionals are strongly encouraged, and entrants are further encouraged to develop creative collaborations that include policy makers, planners, social service providers, academic departments, and research institutes.

MetLife Foundation Awards for Excellence in Affordable Housing

Administered in conjunction with the MetLife Foundation, this awards program recognizes 501(c)(3) community-based or regional nonprofit organizations and tribes or tribally-designated housing entities that excel in property and asset management or provide housing to senior citizens. Grants of \$50,000 each will be awarded to applicants that showcase models of excellence in the design, operations, and property management of affordable senior housing; and that increase the understanding of how to achieve success in providing innovative and high-quality independent living for seniors.

Sustainability Training Grants (Post-Construction)

Grants of up to \$5,000 for affordable housing developers is available to cover the design and distribution of an operations and maintenance manual and the development as well as the implementation of a training curriculum that supports long-term operations and maintenance.

Building Reuse and Restoration Grants

This program works to assist North Carolina communities in reusing and revitalizing commercial properties. Three categories of grants are available: the renovation of vacant buildings; the expansion and renovation of buildings currently in use by certain types of companies; and the renovation and/or construction of health care facilities. Eligible expenses include, but are not limited to, materials and labor to install HVAC systems, electrical systems, plumbing systems, fire alarm/suppression systems, roofing, flooring, carpentry, drywall, and paint. Eligible applicants include units of local government located in one of North Carolina's 85 rural counties; priority will be given to projects in severely distressed counties, and towns with populations of fewer than 5,000. Funding of up to \$480,000 per project is available; applicants must demonstrate a 1:1 cash match for any grant monies received under this program.

Community Development Corporation Grants

This program funds community development corporations (CDCs) throughout North Carolina that carry out and/or support community economic development projects designed to improve the quality of life for residents in underdeveloped minority communities. Funded activities can include projects that promote business development, access to capital for local entrepreneurs, real estate development, small business development, commercial revitalization, housing development, and other issues that foster the economic growth and development of targeted communities. Grants of up to \$30,000 (for new applicants) and \$65,000 (for previously-funded applicants) are available.

Economic Innovation Grants Program

This program provides grants (of up to \$100,000) to help spur business activity, job creation, and public/private investment in North Carolina's rural communities, specifically in four arenas: advanced manufacturing in rural communities; rural health care industry economic opportunities that support growth in higher-skill, higher-wage jobs and that have the potential to positively impact health outcomes in rural areas; value-added processing for farmers, natural resource producers, and commercial fishing; and innovative community economic development strategies that capitalize on the unique assets of a community to create jobs, grow incomes, and strengthen local economies. Eligible applicants must be units of local government, nonprofit 501(c)(3) organizations, or educational institutions that are located within one of North Carolina's 85 rural counties, or is a statewide or regional organizations serving rural counties.

Microenterprise Loan Program

Loans, ranging from \$500 to \$25,000, are available to owners and operators of businesses in rural North Carolina or who have definite plans to do so, with the goal of promoting self-employment, small-scale business creation, and economic independence throughout the region. Eligible applicants must have a minimum credit score of 575, with no outstanding judgments or liens. Applicants must also be U.S. citizens or permanent residents, reside in North Carolina and are at least 18 years of age or older.

New Generation Leaders Program

Grants of up to \$20,000 each will be awarded to thirty community teams throughout North Carolina that work to engage rural young people to become active in civic life and to make a positive and lasting contribution to the communities. This program offers challenge grants, training, and technical assistance to support the formation of youth and young adult action teams who will: become immersed in their community's history, culture, and economy; engage actively in community discussion and activities; reach out to other young people for their perspectives, ideas, and involvement; and design and implement an innovative community improvement project aimed at attracting and retaining young adults in the community.

North Carolina Small Towns Economic Prosperity Program

This program provides grants to support economically-distressed small towns throughout North Carolina, especially those faced with economic hardships due to changes in the economy (such as manufacturing losses, loss of farms and farming operations, etc.) and/or natural disasters. Projects funded under this program should work to support economic recovery and revitalization in small towns through job creation, income growth, commercial investment, and business activity; and/or implement a comprehensive model of capacity building, technical assistance, and grant-making to spur revitalization efforts. Eligible applicants must be incorporated municipalities of fewer than 7,500 people located in any of the state's 85 rural counties, or a community designated as the county seat in a county that has no incorporated municipalities. Priority will be given to applications that: affect small towns that are severely distressed due to changes in the economy or natural disasters; show a commitment to participate in all aspects of the program; demonstrate that local government officials know and understand the benefits and responsibilities of participation; show an understanding of the importance of an inclusive community leadership team and its role in the development and implementation of programs; and demonstrate the potential for economic revitalization and recovery and economic transition. Grants of up to \$100,000 will be awarded, with a required five percent cash match.

Rural Hope Grants

This program awards grants to stimulate economic development and job creation in distressed areas throughout North Carolina through constructing and expanding health care facilities. Grants may be awarded for the renovation or construction of buildings for use by one or more job-generating private or nonprofit health care entities. At least one new job should be located in the project building for every \$5,000 in grant funds; grants must be matched by at least an equal amount of private or public funds. Eligible applicants include units of local government located in one of North Carolina's 85 rural counties; priority will be given to projects in severely-distressed counties, and towns with populations of fewer than 5,000. Funding of up to

\$480,000 per project is available.

Supports nonprofits that come up with new ways of working and reach across issue areas to collectively solve community problems. These \$10,000-\$20,000 grants provide support (in some cases multi-year support) projects that: 1) collaborate with other organizations across issues, sectors, or regions; 2) create a learning culture that strives for constant improvement and innovation; 3) work to understand and evaluate the impact of their work look at and address the root causes of issues or problems in Vermont; 4) engage their constituencies in ways that are new to their organizations; or 5) involve their constituents in direct decision-making and leadership roles.

Lake Champlain and Tributaries Restoration Fund

Grants will be awarded for new initiatives, one-time special projects, or continuing funding for outstanding, existing programs that address one or more of the following purposes: 1) protect, restore and enhance the ecosystem integrity and ecological connectivity of the community of aquatic life in the Lake Champlain ecosystem and its tributaries; 2) protect, restore and enhance lake sturgeon and their habitats in the Lake Champlain basin and its tributaries 3) restore a self-sustaining land-locked Atlantic Salmon population in Lake Champlain through habitat restoration and fish monitoring programs; or 4) protect the riparian zones along Lake Champlain tributaries for the benefit of the ecological and recreational resources through the purchase of land easements.

Samara Fund

The Samara Fund's mission is to help create a vibrant Vermont LGBTQ community and ensure that LGBTQ Vermonters are connected, healthy, appreciated, safe, and empowered. The fund can help: 1) individuals and families with who want to support LGBTQ causes both now and into the future and 2) nonprofit organizations that benefit the LGBTQ community by providing grants to help meet and sustain their missions.

Small and Inspiring Grants Program

This program will fund projects that: 1) connect people to each other through volunteer work or community-building efforts; 2) connect people to the environment around them in new ways; or 3) bring people together and provide opportunities for positive social interaction and benefit. Grants will be in the range of \$500-\$2,500.

Special and Urgent Needs (SUN) Grants

The foundation will consider any eligible organization that meets the overall grantmaking criteria of the foundation. Organizations that are working to meet basic human needs (food, shelter, health) will be given priority. The foundation looks for proposals that will allow an organization to: 1) conduct emergency repairs of building structure or mechanical systems (heating/cooling, water service, etc.) whose sudden and unexpected failure interferes with the provision of services; 2) replace essential equipment and technology whose sudden and unexpected failure interferes with the provision of services; 3) provide resources whose need could not have been anticipated or budgeted, and without which the work of the organization would be severely hampered; or 4) manage an unanticipated leadership transition or emergency succession of an executive director.

Upper CT River Mitigation and Enhancement Fund

he Mitigation and Enhancement Fund (MEF) provides financial assistance to projects, activities, and endeavors that will restore, protect, and/or enhance the river ecosystem affected by the 15-mile Falls hydroelectric project, or that will serve as mitigation for some of the impacts of the project.

Vermont Arts Endowment Fund

The Vermont Arts Endowment Fund focuses its grantmaking on the creation and presentation of new work by Vermont artists and arts organizations. Individual artists are welcome to apply. Grants are typically made in the fields of dance; theater; music composition and performance; creative writing, including poetry, short stories, novels, and plays; sculpture; painting; photography; and film, although work in other media may also be eligible. Arts organizations presenting the work of Vermont artists are also eligible to apply. These organizations can include galleries, theater companies, choruses, musical ensembles, festivals, and presenting organizations. Grants up to \$5,000 are available.

Health

Background

In 1925, Tracy and Katherine McGregor decided to make sure their extensive financial resources would continue to be used for social, educational and charitable programs. In that year, they established the McGregor Fund. They continued to add to the Fund's resources until it was large enough to commence an active grant program. During 1931-1936, Tracy identified the Fund's primary grantmaking priorities. They included higher education, youth services, health care and science. Special grants were given for programs aiding transients and homeless, the chronically ill, and education programs benefiting African Americans. In addition to the Fund, Tracy and Katherine continued to give generously from their own personal accounts to local charities including the Detroit Community Fund and the McGregor Institute. After Tracy's death in 1936, Katherine continued to give major gifts to the Fund and local charities until her death in 1954. Since then, the Fund has continued to carry out the legacy of Tracy and Katherine McGregor.

In considering requests from independent schools, priority will be given to those that can demonstrate high levels of educational quality and a commitment to diversity within their student body, faculty and staff. The fund will also consider requests from public school districts, with priority given to the Detroit Public Schools. Finally, the fund will also consider requests from 501(c)(3) organizations other than schools in the tri-county area for projects; 2) Support of Private Liberal Arts Colleges in Michigan and Ohio - the fund provides a special program of competitive grants for private liberal arts colleges and liberal arts colleges within private universities in Michigan and Ohio. The program awards up to three

grants annually of \$250,000 each to the selected institutions. Grant decisions under this program are made once per year in the spring. Grant payments under this program are made as one-time distributions restricted to the purpose outlined by the institution in its application. Colleges or universities that receive a grant under the program are not eligible to reapply until the third year after receiving a grant. As a result the institution may use the grant over a period of up to three years; 3) Support of Local Institutions of Higher Education - the fund recognizes that local institutions of higher education play a valuable role in supporting the quality of life within our region. The fund considers grant requests from institutions offering baccalaureate or graduate degrees. Requests from community colleges and other institutions not offering a baccalaureate or graduate degree will not be considered. Local private liberal arts colleges and universities may also apply under the Program of Support for Private Liberal Arts Colleges and Universities in Michigan and Ohio. However, institutions that receive support under that program will not be eligible to re-apply under either program for three years from the year in which a grant is received.

Health Care

Emphasis on improving access to primary medical care, mental health care and substance abuse treatment for indigent, low-income and other highly underserved populations, primarily within the City of Detroit. Support will be considered for community health centers, school-based clinics and other community based organizations.

Human Services

Emphasis on activities in southeastern Michigan addressing emergency needs in housing, provision of food, clothing and other direct aid.

Matching Gifts Program

The fund matches trustee and employee contributions to nonprofit organizations dollar-for-dollar.

Public Benefit

Support for major civic improvement efforts within the region as well as for civic and community organizations whose activities contribute significantly to improving the quality of life for residents of southeastern Michigan and to strengthening the non-profit sector.

Cottrell College Science Awards

The Cottrell College Science Award program is aimed at helping young faculty to start vigorous research programs at primarily undergraduate institutions. The awards support research in science disciplines with significant overlap with chemistry, physics, and astronomy. The program had initiatives for single investigators. The multi-investigator Cottrell College Science Award initiative accepts applications from teams with two or three members from the same institution. Total requests for Research Corporation (RC) funds for two-year awards must be \$35,000, with \$10,000 of institutional match for Single-Investigator Cotrell College Science Awards and \$75,000 or \$100,000, with \$25,000 institutional match for Multi-Investigator Cotrell College Science Awards coming from teams with two or three members, respectively. Expenses are limited to equipment, supplies, summer stipends for travel to conduct research outside the home institution. No indirect costs or fringe benefits (other than FICA at 7.65%) are allowed from award funds. Principal investigators must have faculty appointments in a department of chemistry, physics or astronomy, or if from another department, propose research that significantly overlaps with research in one of these three disciplines. For the Single-Investigator Initiative, applicants must be within the first three years of first faculty appointment. For the Multi-Investigator initiative, at least one team member must be within the first six years of first faculty appointment. Qualifying departments must offer at least the baccalaureate, but not doctoral, degrees. Proposed projects are judged on the basis of scientific originality, significance, feasibility, and ability of the principal investigator(s) and institution to sustain the activity. The potential of a proposed research project to add to scientific knowledge is a prime criterion in its evaluation, as is its potential for developing into long-term capable programs of research, capable of attracting future support from other agencies. Cottrell Scholar Awards

Cottrell Scholar Awards are for beginning faculty members who are committed to excel at both research and teaching. Applications should be tenure-track beginning faculty members whose primary appointment is in a Bachelor's and Ph.D. degree-granting department of astronomy, biochemistry, biophysics, chemistry, or physics, but not in a school of medicine or engineering. Eligibility is limited to those in the third year after their first tenure-track appointment. The proposal consists of brief proposals for both research and teaching. Originality, feasibility, and the prospect for significant fundamental advances to science are the main criteria for the research plan. Contributions to education, especially at the undergraduate level, aspirations for teaching, and the proposed strategies to achieve educational objectives are factors in assessment of the teaching plan. The ability of applicants to mount a strong research program and their commitment to teaching are weighed in the two-phase review process. The deadline for receipt of proposals is 5 pm (MST) on Aug. 1. Applications must conform to guidelines and directions, and need to be endorsed by the institution. Potential applicants can begin the online submission process by completing the online submission Eligibility Quiz. Consult the complete program guidelines on the website for full details.

Scialog Awards

The Scialog Award program is aimed at seeding highly innovative, high risk/high reward fundamental research in targeted areas that address problems of global significance and require multidisciplinary solutions. The Scialog program funds groundbreaking research by recently tenured faculty members, who are designated Scialog Fellows, at U.S. academic institutions. Scialog Fellows are convened annually, along with other world class researchers, to share critical feedback on their projects and further develop research ideas. The conferences have an unusual format with a limited number of formal presentations and significant time spent in breakout sessions and other forms of dialog. Participants are challenged to form small teams and write short collaborative proposals "on the spot"; for additional seed funding based on new ideas that emerge during the conference. The awards support research in science disciplines relevant to the targeted problem, which includes

chemistry, physics, materials science and engineering. The first Scialog initiative, begun in 2010, is focused on basic research to enable clean, sustainable, affordable energy for a world rapidly heading toward a doubling of its energy needs by midcentury. The initiative is aimed at accelerating underlying scientific advances on the molecular and nano scales to improve the efficiency and scalability of technologies that use solar energy to produce electricity and fuels such as hydrogen. Since 2010, when Scialog was launched, 30 Scialog Fellows have received awards totaling \$3.25 million. In addition, nine teams, composed of Scialog Fellows and other researchers, have received Collaborative Innovation Awards totaling \$900 thousand, based on their proposals written at Scialog conferences. There is no budget required for awards and principle investigators are given wide latitude for how funds are expended. No indirect costs or fringe benefits (other than FICA/Medicare at 7.65%) and institutionally mandated fringe benefits for postdoctoral fellows are allowed from award funds. Principal investigators must have faculty appointments at U.S. academic colleges or universities that are at least baccalaureate granting institutions in disciplines that are relevant to the targeted area of research. Background

Incorporated in 1930 in NY.

Since 1930, the Josiah Macy Jr. Foundation has devoted itself to the promotion of health and the relief of suffering. Kate Macy Ladd established the foundation to honor the memory of her father, Josiah Macy Jr., who was an eighth generation descendant of Thomas Macy, who emigrated from England in 1635. In 1659, Thomas Macy and nine other men purchased Nantucket Island (then a part of New York) to seek religious freedom. Six generations and nearly 200 years later, Josiah Jr.'s grandfather, Captain Josiah Macy, left Nantucket and established a successful shipping firm in New York City. Under Captain Macy's sons and grandsons the firm prospered, opened one of the first oil refineries in New York, and ultimately was purchased by the Standard Oil Company. In 1876, Josiah Macy, Jr. (known as a prominent philanthropist) died of typhoid fever at the age 38. The family's philanthropic tradition was continued by his daughter, Kate, who by the time of her death in 1945 had given the foundation \$19 million. This endowment has grown and represents the sole source of the foundation's funds. Until 1945, the foundation focused its grantmaking on medical research in such fields as traumatic shock and war-related

psychiatric disorders, geriatrics and aging, arteriosclerosis, genetics and human development, and psychosomatic medicine. The foundation's extensive conference and publication program was also started during this period. From the end of World War II through the mid-1960s, the foundation shifted its focus to support the efforts of medical schools to expand and strengthen their basic science faculties. During that time, the foundation also began supporting the emerging fields of basic reproductive biology, human reproduction, and family planning, and fostered their incorporation into the biological, behavioral, and social science bases of academic obstetrics and gynecology. Since the mid-1970s, the overwhelming majority of the foundation's grants have supported projects that broaden and improve medical and health professional education. Today, it is the only national foundation solely dedicated to improving the education of health professionals.

Limitations

The foundation's grantmaking is focused on projects that: a) Demonstrate or encourage interprofessional education and teamwork among health care professionals;b) Teach principles of patient safety, quality improvement, and system performance;c) Develop new models for clinical education, including community-based models;d)Increase the diversity of the health care professional workforce through career development for underrepresented minorities; and c) Improve education for the care of underserved populations.

Career Development in Health Professions Education

This program supports initiatives to nurture creative faculty members who are devoted to health professional educational reform. It also supports initiatives to diversify the health professions in order to achieve the goal of uniform excellence in health care.

Education for the Care of Underserved Populations

This program supports initiatives to increase the number of healthcare professionals who chose to serve in rural and inner city areas and some of the most vulnerable people in society--racial and ethnic minorities, elderly people, low-income patients and others--who are not receiving the care they need.

Employee Matching Gifts

The foundation matches gifts from full-time employees, directors, director emeriti, and officers to qualified charitable organizations. The gifts are matched up to two dollars for every dollar contributed with a maximum annual match of \$10,000 per participant.

Interprofessional Education and Teamwork

This program supports a variety of initiatives designed to support planned and rigorous interprofessional education, focusing on the strong evidence which demonstrates that health care delivered by well-functioning teams leads to better outcomes.

New Curriculum Content

This program supports initiatives for incorporating patient safety, quality improvement, and population health into medical education curriculum.

New Models for Clinical Education

This program supports initiatives that provide clinical education and training for the management of chronic diseases in outpatient or community-based settings.

The Macy Faculty Scholars Program

The Macy Faculty Scholars program - the first of its kind - launched in December 2010. The program aims to accelerate needed reforms in health professions education to accommodate the dramatic changes occurring in medical practice and health care delivery. Under the program, the foundation will select up to five faculty leaders each year. Each Scholar will receive salary support at \$100,000 per year over two years. Scholars must be nominated by the Dean of their institutions, who must commit to protecting at least 50 percent of the Scholars' time to pursue education reform projects at their institution. Each school may nominate only one candidate each year, and will be expected to provide a senior faculty member to mentor the Scholar. The foundation will support educational change in each Scholar's institution and develop a national network for the Scholars, who will receive career advice from a National Advisory Committee and participate in an Annual Meeting for the program.

The GAR (pronounced "jee-ay'ar") Foundation was born out of the financial success and growth of Roadway Express, Inc. and its chairman and major shareholder, Galen J. Roush. In 1956, Roadway Express became a publicly owned company, with the family controlling just over 50% of the stock. Over the next ten years, Roadway's annual revenues grew form less than \$43 million to more than \$134 million. The price of Roadway stock also steadily increased. In 1967, the foundation was established as a trust and, upon the advice of Mr. Roush's attorney, Lisle Buckingham, half of Mr. Roush's estate was designated to fund it. The name "GAR Foundation" is an acronym for "Galen and Ruth"

Limitations

The grant area supports arts programs and cultural institutions within Summit County and the region. The two priorities are: 1) to support arts institutions that enhance the quality of life in the foundation's area, serving a significant number of Summit County residents and making a significant contribution to the region's reputation and identity; and 2) to support arts education programs where excellence is measured by the level of participation-based programs delivered to low-income Summit County children, offered in collaboration with other arts organizations and historical or educational institutions.

Civic Enhancement

The grant area's three priorities are enhancing the economic strength of Akron and Northeast Ohio, improving the vibrancy of

place and supporting community development.

Education

From early childhood to K-12 education and beyond, the foundation funds quality, strategic programs all along the educational continuum in Summit County. The foundation's education grantmaking focuses on the following priorities: 1) Early Childhood Education: supporting parent education and school readiness, and access to high-quality programs; 2) Kindergarten through 12 (K-12): supporting efforts to increase high school graduation; out-of-school time (OST) enrichment; STEM and options for low-income learners; 3) Bridge to Post-Secondary: increase students continuing on to post-secondary education; increase availability of financial resources for students to attend post-secondary options; 4) Post-Secondary: improve retention and completion among targeted, at-risk students; support efforts that tie post-secondary education to workforce needs; 5) Lifelong Learning: support adult literacy; and 6) Systemic Change & Improvement: support for programs that improve the overall function of and outcomes produced by the education system, including smoothing the transitions from one level of education to the next.

Educator Initiative Grant Program

The program offers funding to teams of K-12 educators who are working to develop, implement, and assess instructional strategies for 1) helping their students meet Ohio's academic standards and; 2) helping their schools achieve goals identified in their school improvement plans. Only teams of educators from public, private, parochial and charter schools in Summit County may apply for Educator Initiative Grants. These teams must consist of at least two K-12 classroom teachers. Administrators may also be team members, but should submit applications only in concert with a group of teachers who will share responsibility for implementing the project for which funding is requested. All applications must be endorsed by the appropriate building principals and, in the case of public schools, by the appropriate district superintendents (by the superintendents of all districts that will be directly affected by the project). Health and Social Services

The program supports health and social service agencies serving Summit County. Background

Established in 1929 in MA as the Sarah A. Hyams Fund; in 1991 merged with the Godfrey Hyams Trust and adopted current name.

Godfrey M. Hyams was born in Baltimore, Maryland, in 1859. As a child he moved with his family to Boston, where he graduated from Boston English High School and Harvard College. Metallurgist, engineer and financier, he was responsible for the growth of such companies as the Anaconda Mining Company. He also planned and managed the construction of the Virginia Railway, which made available large sources of bituminous coal to the eastern part of the United States. To assure that his money would be used for charitable purposes in perpetuity, Mr. Hyams established a charitable trust in 1921 to which the major portion of his estate was given upon his death in 1927. In 1929 the major distribution of assets was made by the estate of Godfrey M. Hyams to the Godfrey M. Hyams Trust. At that time the trustees organized two Massachusetts charitable corporations, the Sarah A. Hyams Fund and the Isabel F. Hyams Fund, and transferred approximately \$1,500,000 worth of securities to each of these two corporations. For many years the Godfrey M. Hyams Trust and the smaller Sarah A. Hyams Fund had identical trustees and grantmaking purposes and processes. During 1993, the trustees voted to merge the Trust into the Sarah H. Hyams Fund and rename it The Hyams Foundation, Inc. The trustees of The Hyams Foundation, Inc. also serve as trustees of the Isabel F. Hyams Fund, a public charity which devotes all of its income to operations in East Boston. The grantmaker is a signatory to Philanthropy's Promise, an initiative of the National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy (NCRP). By signing on, the grantmaker has committed to allocating the majority of its grantmaking dollars to marginalized communities and at least 25 percent to social justice strategies, such as advocacy, community organizing, and civic engagement.

Limitations

Giving primarily in Boston and Chelsea, MA.

No support for municipal, state, or federal agencies; institutions of higher learning for standard educational programs, hospitals and health centers, religious organizations for sectarian religious purposes; support for medical research is being phased out.

No grants to individuals, or for endowment funds, capital campaigns, fellowships, publications, conferences, films or videos or curriculum development.

Purpose and Activities

The mission of the foundation is to increase economic, social justice and power within low-income communities. The foundation believes that investing in strategies that enable low-income people to increase their communities will have the greatest social return in these times. The foundation will carry out its mission by: supporting civic participation by low-income communities; promoting economic development that benefits low-income neighborhoods and their residents; and developing the talents and skills of low-income youth.

Program Area(s)

The grantmaker has identified the following area(s) of interest:

Affordable Housing: Community Organizing

The foundation makes grants for related community organizing activities in order to increase the supply of affordable housing.

Affordable Housing: Production and Preservation

The foundation has made a major commitment to increasing and preserving the supply of affordable rental housing and homeownership units, especially for very low-income families, in two ways: 1) through a special Request for Proposals (RFP) process in 2003 that resulted in a small number of three-year grants to community-based nonprofit housing producers that

have the expertise to bring housing production to a larger scale, need increased organizational capacity to do so and have available development opportunities and a complementary community organizing strategy; and 2) through a \$3 million Program Related Investment (PRI) loan to Home Funders, a collaborative funding initiative designed to create additional housing units for homeless and other very low-income families.

Civic Engagement: Chelsea

After extensive discussions with nonprofit organizations and public officials in Chelsea, MA, the foundation has developed a specific focus for its grantmaking in this city that it hopes will ultimately contribute to the academic and career success of Chelsea youth. The foundation believes that the achievement levels of youth in Chelsea can be enhanced by: 1) supporting the full and active participation of parents in shaping Chelsea's educational policies; 2) bringing together various constituencies within the community to create a shared vision of public education in Chelsea; and 3) working collaboratively to create an important new resource for Chelsea youth that increases their ability to achieve academic and career goals. The foundation will work with specific Chelsea organizations to pursue these three goals, beginning with an emphasis on parent organizing.

Civic Engagement: Community Organizing

Community organizing is a strategy that enables low-income community members to exercise their collective power to bring about positive change, gain social and political influence and help ensure equitable access to public and private resources. The foundation has found that community organizing that encompasses leadership development and public policy advocacy has the greatest potential for success. As a result, it will fund organizations that: 1) integrate organizing strategies with the development of community leaders and a clear public policy advocacy agenda that is determined by these leaders and other community members; and 2) focus on affordable housing, family economic self-sufficiency, and/or public education reform. Grants also will be made to: 1) coalitions of organizing groups that reflect these qualities and priorities; and 2) organizations that contribute added capacity to and are supported by these organizing groups.

Civic Engagement: Leadership Development

The foundation has made grants through two special funding initiatives that assist immigrants, refugees and other low-income people to become active leaders and participants in their communities and neighborhoods: 1) the Immigrant and Refugee Leadership Development Initiative; and 2) the Organizers of Color Initiative.

Civic Engagement: Voter Participation

In a democratic society, voting is a fundamental way for people to exercise their individual and collective power, ensuring that government is responsive to community needs. To achieve this goal, the foundation will continue its participation in the Boston Foundation's Civic Engagement Initiative, begun in 2002, and through a small number of direct grants that: 1) educate low-income people about voter registration and voting (consistent with the restrictions imposed on private foundations in this funding area); and 2) prepare refugees and immigrants to become citizens, voters and active members of their communities.

Family Economic Self-Sufficiency: Community Organizing

The foundation will also make grants for community organizing activities, in order to promote economic self-sufficiency for low-income individuals and families.

Family Economic Self-Sufficiency: Workforce Development

The foundation will focus on the critical role played by English language and basic adult literacy in enabling many adults to enter the workforce and advance to better paying jobs by targeting its direct grants to community-based English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) and Adult Basic Education (ABE) programs. It will give priority to those that are: 1) reaching newer refugee and immigrant groups; 2) interested in improving program quality in order to become stronger candidates for public sector support; 3) using curricula and teaching methods that enhance critical thinking skills and involve students as both active learners and participants in the programs; and 4) increasing their integration and developing new and stronger collaborations with the larger educational and workforce development systems, so as to significantly increase their graduates' access to opportunities and services.

Teen Development: Girls' Initiative

The foundation makes two-year grants to community-based organizations providing comprehensive services to girls who have been or are under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Court, the Department of Social Services, or the Department of Youth Services as a result of CHINS (Children in Need of Services) or delinquency. Selected grants also will be made to coalitions or organizations that contribute added capacity to and are supported by the Girls' Initiative grantees. Groups that believe they fit this criteria should submit a concept paper to the foundation (Attention: Ms. Sylvia R. Johnson, Assoc. Dir.). Concept papers will be reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Teen Development: Internships/Apprenticeships and Youth Organizing

The foundation will provide grants to community-based organizations that successfully foster the positive growth and development of teens by engaging them in skill-building and providing them with meaningful and rewarding opportunities to utilize, reflect upon and refine these skills in actual work and community environments. Priority will be given to applicants that: 1) serve teens ages 13-19; 2) provide connections to and support for the school success of teens involved; 3) support and motivate teens and have high expectations of them; 4) involve teens in program planning and decision-making; 5) provide a defined scope of work (e.g. contract) and compensation (e.g. stipend) for work performed and prepare teens for specific jobs, careers and successful workplace experiences; 6) teach youth leadership skills and provide specific opportunities to utilize these skills through community service, community education, advocacy, and/or organizing projects; and 7) engage youth on an ongoing basis and over a sustained period of time. Grants also will be made to: 1) coalitions of groups that meet the Internship/Apprenticeship and Youth Organizing criteria stated above; and 2) organizations that contribute added capacity to

and are supported by these organizations.

Unlike traditional transitional housing models which require individuals to move after two years, this program has been shown to be a better, most cost-effective approach for some families to achieve housing stability. Applicant organizations must: have been in existence for two or more years; have a direct relationship with the family emergency shelter system; have experience in successfully working with homeless families using a Housing First/Housing plus model; have the capacity to match service funding with rental subsidies; and have maintained fiscal accountability, including conducting an independent audit, within the last two years. Applicant agencies are not required to be United Way partner agencies.

United Christmas Service

Donated gifts (including food, clothing, and toys) are available to low-income individuals and families for the holiday season. Applicants can be referred by caseworkers from partner organizations, or apply individually for support; those who are referred will receive preference.

Winter Assistance Fund

Emergency funding is available to individuals and families who are unable to pay their heating bills during the winter months, and are not eligible for government energy assistance programs. This program runs from January until May.

The donor-advised fund will consider applications from schools and from organizations established to present concerts for the public to support performances of non-Western classical and folk musics by bearers of these traditions, and of contemporary compositions for traditional or Western instruments inspired by and incorporating elements of these musics.

Bobbie Steindler Beatty Academic Opportunity Fund

Supports youth between the ages of 12-18 who reside in Oxnard, Port Hueneme and Camarillo, to further their academic progress. The minimum grant amount is \$250 and the maximum is \$1,000. Grants may benefit one or more students. Funds may be used for a variety of expenses such as books, school supplies, clothes, eyeglasses, or for expenses that, if not funded, could stand in the way of an education for students who are from low-income families. Non-profit organizations and public entities (such as schools and/or school districts) are eligible to apply (one application per organization with exception of fiscal sponsors.) Community Response Fund

The funding priority for the 2013-14 Annual Grants Program is afterschool programming, such as tutoring/homework help, academic enrichment and arts programs for K-8 students, with a preference for programs that serve low income students. A total of \$19,000 is available. Requests up to \$5,000 will be considered. Community based, 501(c)(3) designated non-profit organizations, public entities (such as schools and/or school districts) are eligible to apply (one application per organization)

Destino: The Hispanic Legacy Fund

Established an endowed grantmaking fund to provide opportunities for the economic, educational, physical, emotional, social, artistic and personal growth of Latinos in Ventura County. Each grant cycle, founders and donors to the Fund review the needs of the community and vote to select issues of importance to Latinos in the County.

Douglas Roy III We Care Trust Fund

Established to support medical treatment for Douglas Roy III, who suffered severe burn injuries at the age of six. In 1995, remaining assets of the Trust were used to establish the Douglas Roy III We Care Trust Fund foundation. The purpose of the fund is to support the provision of initial medical care, subsequent medical treatment and support services for severely burned persons, provide other aid to burn victims and their families, and to provide fire and burn education.

Dr. Maxine Crossley Endowment Fund

The fund provides support for needed services for physically or mentally handicapped children in Ventura County. Schools and nonprofit organizations serving children and adolescents with special education needs are eligible to apply. Applications are accepted from 501(c)(3)-designated public charities, public schools and school districts.

Heritage Fund

Established as an endowed grantmaking fund to provide opportunities for local nonprofits to have the resources and time to study and document the County's heritage, share who we are, and how our county has grown and prospered. The Heritage Fund celebrates Ventura County's unique history beginning in the early times and will continue throughout the years in the future. In 1959, Joyce Mertz and her parents, LuEsther and Harold, established a family foundation called the Mertz Foundation. Joyce married Robert Wallace Gilmore in 1964, and the couple began managing the foundation's operations. Together with their colleague and friend, Bayard Rustin, they became strong advocates for peace and civil rights, which was reflected in their grantmaking. They also were committed passionately to the quality of life in New York City where they lived and made grants to performing arts institutions and to groups working to protect the city's environment. Their interest in the environment led them to support programs reaching beyond the city to include state, national and global issues as well. Initially, family members provided the foundation with funds on a yearly basis. However, when Joyce Mertz Gilmore died in 1974, her will provided for an endowment to the foundation. Robert Gilmore soon changed the foundation's name to the Joyce Mertz-Gilmore Foundation in her honor and memory. Robert Gilmore died in 1988, but not before he set the foundation on a new course by expanding the Board beyond the family. His heirs donated a generous portion of his estate to the foundation. In 2002, the Board of Directors changed the name of the foundation to the Mertz Gilmore Foundation to honor the memory of Robert Gilmore.

Community Impact through Nonprofit Excellence

The foundation supports programs designed to strengthen the organizational capacity of nonprofit organizations in North Carolina by addressing program delivery and impact; fundraising and long-term financial stability; board leadership and contributions to the organization; operational efficiencies and infrastructure; and collaborations and partnerships with other organizations to better serve stakeholders. The initiative also includes the Healthy Community Institute, a two-day board and staff training program designed to build organizational capacity; 5 Good Ideas, a half-day interactive training for nonprofit leaders focusing on management skills and leadership development; and Community TIEs, and grant program honoring achievement in Technology, Innovation, and Evaluation.

Health of Vulnerable Populations

The foundation supports programs designed to improve health outcomes for North Carolinians served by health care safety-

net organizations. Special emphasis is directed toward programs designed to increase quality, supply, and access to medical and dental care through coordination and continuity of care; increased number of providers serving vulnerable populations; increased provider use of evidence-based protocol and quality improvement measures; and enhanced operations and infrastructure of health care safety-net organizations. The foundation also supports programs designed to improve individual health, with a focus on diabetes, cardiovascular, and oral health; self-care and preventative behavior; reduced number of visits to emergency departments for non-urgent care; blood pressure control; A1C less than or equal to 7; and increased rate of completion of phase 1 dental treatment plan.

Health of Vulnerable Populations - Equipment and Training Grant

The foundation awards equipment and training grants to improve health outcomes for vulnerable populations and increase the capacity or scope of service of safety net providers. Special emphasis is directed toward projects that serve low-income, uninsured and medically underserved individuals. Grants are awarded for clinical equipment that will allow a safety net provider to deliver more care in the clinic setting rather than referring a patient out for care; equipment that enhances provider efficiency or quality of care; training that enhances quality of care or access to care for underserved populations; and training that supports team-based clinicians in operating at the top of their licensure. Grants range from \$1,000 to \$10,000.

Healthy Active Communities

The foundation supports programs designed to increase physical activity and access to healthy food through the use of the physical environment to create space, and places for physical activity and healthy food options; organizational and institutional policies that support increased activity and healthy eating; initiatives that increase physical activity and knowledge of healthy foods both during and upon completion of the program; and plans that address the built and policy environment for physical activity and healthy eating in local communities.

Healthy Active Communities - Equipment Grants

The foundation currently awards physical activity equipment grants of up to \$5,000 that result in increased physical activity. Massachusetts Institute for Community Health Leadership

Through the Massachusetts Institute of Community Health Leadership initiative, the foundation builds leadership capacity among healthcare organizations in the Commonwealth that serve the needs of low-income and uninsured residents. The 18-day educational program is designed to help those with leadership potential increase their own personal impact, strengthen their effectiveness in their organization, and enhance the organization's influence in the healthcare system.

Background

Incorporated as a voluntary agency in 1900 in NY and established as the Association for the Aid of Crippled Children in 1908; current name adopted in 1972, affirming a broader focus on children at risk.

The association was publicly supported by voluntary contributions until 1944, when substantial funds were received from the estate of Milo Belding as a testament to his wife, Annie K. Belding, who had given many years of devoted service to the association. In its early years, the association's name reflected its actual activities, which centered on teaching crippled children, but it soon defined aid to these children and their families more broadly and often included material help. The association's work changed again when nursing in the home and school became the main focus. As these services became community supported and as the funds of the Belding estate became available, the association shifted its attention to the prevention of causes of handicapping. From the early 1950s until the early 1970s, most funds supported research into genetically based disorders and fetal abnormalities. Recognizing the nature of its evolving program, the association changed its name in 1972 to the Foundation for Child Development. Today, its principal interest is childhood poverty, with grants focused on child development research and other research concerning young children and their families, public policy affecting children and families, and in New York City, program development and programs that help to translate research knowledge into policies and practices that affect the daily lives of children and their families. The foundation is governed by a board of directors. The board meets three times a year to determine foundation policy and current program expenditures.

This program encourages applications from scholars who are: 1) from historically disadvantaged or underrepresented groups, (e.g. first-generation college graduates, and those from low-income communities); and 2) scholars who represent a variety of disciplines and methods, given that mental, physical, health, social, economic, institutional, and community factors impact early learning and child development. Eligible researchers will have received their doctoral degrees (e.g., Ph.D., J.D., Ed.D., Psy.D., M.D.) within seven years of application submission, ten years for physician applicants.

Mr. Goldseker, an immigrant to the United States from Poland, founded and was president of the M. Goldseker Co., a real estate firm in Baltimore. The Goldseker will suggests that the foundation give special consideration to charitable organizations which, by loans or grants or other steps, give aid and encouragement to worthy individuals to continue their education, establish themselves in business, overcome such adversities as accident or illness, or maintain or support themselves or their families. The trustees of the foundation, Sheldon and Simon Goldseker, are nephews of the donor. As Mr. Goldseker stipulated in his will, the trustees control the foundation's assets, but all grant decisions are made solely by the selection committee composed of the presidents of the Johns Hopkins University, Morgan State University, and the Associated Jewish Community Federation of Baltimore. All decisions on grant proposals are made within a framework of clearly defined policies. At the discretion of the committee and board, these policies may be subject to modification in response to changing needs and problems in the Baltimore metropolitan area. In accordance with the donor's will, the foundation may not award more than 5 percent of its net income in any calendar year to any single institution. The foundation retains a full-time professional staff to serve as liaison among the board of trustees, the selection committee, and the community at large. The staff is responsible for regularly informing the public of the foundation's policies, priorities, and ongoing grantmaking activities.

Program Area(s)

Child Care Lending Initiative

This program works to retain existing child care spaces and develop new ones in New Hampshire communities by lending funds and providing training and technical support to nonprofit child care centers and family-based child care providers within the state. The program provides child care centers with technical assistance and loans for purchase, renovations, leasehold improvements, and other safety and/or licensing improvements.

Community Housing Program

This program is designed to expand the supply of affordable housing in New Hampshire, and keep them permanently affordable, by making loans and technical assistance available to nonprofit housing development organizations throughout the state. The program provides pre-development financing to 'core' borrowers, short-term financing to acquire building sites, 'gap' financing at critical junctures in a project's evolution, and longer-term financing for special projects that are unable to secure appropriate conventional financing. Applicants must demonstrate that their project helps people with low and moderate incomes (per standards set by the Department of Housing and Urban Development), has a long-term benefit to people with low and moderate incomes, has a demonstrated source of income to repay the loan to the fund, has community support, and attracts other resources to the effort.

Cooperative Home Loan Program

This program provides reasonably-priced fixed-rate loans to individuals in resident-owned communities, including first-time home buyer loans through New Hampshire Housing Finance Authority, refinance/home equity loans, and purchase loans for existing homes. Eligible homes must be located in a resident-owned park and be owner-occupied; eligible borrowers must have the ability to repay loans and have a satisfactory credit history.

Individual Development Accounts

The fund offers individual development accounts (IDAs) to low- and moderate-income people, to help them become homeowners, small-business owners, and graduates of post-secondary education programs. Savings deposits by participants are matched by donated funds from charitable organizations at a rate of 3:1, up to \$2,000. Eligible individuals are required to develop savings goals/plans, access economic literacy training/education, and plan for asset management.

Nonprofit Facilities Lending

This program works to help nonprofit organizations better serve their communities (especially those with lower incomes) with essential services such as childcare, soup kitchens, mental health services, legal services, etc. The fund can lend funds to help a nonprofit organization buy a property to reduce overhead or expand services to better meet its mission.

Sunflower Trail Grants

Since 1949, the foundation has made over \$90 million in grants to a broad variety of nonprofit organizations. Over the years, it has evolved from a small, board-managed organization with informal grant making procedures to a strategic and proactive professionally-staffed foundation. Inventive and enterprising industrialist Raymond John Wean established the foundation in Warren, Ohio in 1949. Having achieved success in the flat rolled steel processing industry, Wean created a foundation that would serve the communities in which he had achieved his success. Through the years, the Wean family remained highly engaged with the foundation's board. Jack Wean served as acting chairman of the foundation until the time of his death in 1980. His wife, Sara R. Wean, continued his legacy and served on the board until her death in 1986. Jack and Sara's son, Raymond John Wean, Jr., continued the family's mission. As an original board member of the foundation since its creation in 1949, he served as chairman until his death in 2006. Today, Gordon B. Wean, a third generation member of the Wean family, serves as chairman of the foundation. More recently, new initiatives and a tailored focus have shifted the foundation's processes and grant making during the years. In February 2006, the foundation hired PolicyLink to assist with refinining the foundation's strategic focus. PolicyLink is a national research and action institute that works collaboratively to develop and implement local, state, and federal policies to achieve economic and social equity. Over nine months of interviews and visits, PolicyLink produced a report, "A Community Building Philanthropic Initiative to Strengthen the Mahoning Valley." The report presented recommendations to the foundation on the focus, approach, and structure of a philanthropic initiative that will support the equitable renewal of the Mahoning Valley and expand economic and social opportunities for its residents. The foundation is in the process of implementing the report. The foundation annually grants approximately \$4 million. Those funds were earmarked for nonprofits in Mahoning and Trumbull Counties. Through these efforts, the foundation continues to enhance the community's well-being and vitality through grant making, convening, advocating, and providing leadership. The grantmaker is a signatory to Philanthropy's Promise, an initiative of the National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy (NCRP). By signing on, the grantmaker has committed to allocating the majority of its grantmaking dollars to marginalized communities and at least 25 percent to social justice strategies, such as advocacy, community organizing, and civic engagement.

The William J. and Dorothy K. O'Neill Foundation was founded in 1987 by Mrs. O'Neill and her eldest son, William J. O'Neill, Jr. William J. O'Neill was born in 1906. He was the youngest of four children born to his Irish and German immigrant parents. Dorothy Kundtz O'Neill was born in 1910, and was the youngest of nine children born to her Hungarian and German parents. Both were raised in Cleveland, Ohio in the Catholic family tradition. After graduation from Notre Dame University and St. Mary-of-the-Woods College respectively, they each returned to Cleveland and were married. Mr. O'Neill, with his brothers Hugh M. and Francis J., started and acquired a number of trucking, leasing and transportation companies in the 1940's and 50's. These companies were brought together as Leaseway Transportation Corp. and taken public in 1961. Mr. O'Neill was Leaseway Transportation's first President and later became Chairman of its Board. Under his stewardship, along with that of his brothers, and the subsequent stewardship of his son and nephews, Leaseway Transportation grew to become a billion dollar a year, pre-eminent physical distribution company with operations throughout the United States and in foreign countries as well. Mr. O'Neill, who was noted for his philanthropy, died in 1983. Mrs. O'Neill died in 1998, and is now survived by six children, nineteen grandchildren and thirty-one great grandchildren, many of whom play active roles in the foundation.

Civic/Community Affairs

Education

Environment, Conservation and Animal Welfare

This area is defined as projects that preserve natural features of the local area, or enhance or re-develop features that have been neglected over time. This area includes funding for animals, parks and natural resources. Impacts include: 1) increase access to and sustainability of natural resources; 2) promotion of green technologies; 3) environmental education, outreach and awareness; and 4) efforts to improve the basic health and welfare of animals.

Health

The foundation provides support for medical programs and facilities. Impacts include: 1) supporting non profit public health clinics; 2) childhood obesity reduction; 3) indigent health care; 4) health education; 5) pre-natal care; 6) minority health issues; 7) mental health; 8) preventative healthcare; 9) chronic disease prevention; and 10) long term disabilities.

Human Services

This area addresses basic human needs of food, shelter, clothing, and seeking solutions to systemic social problems. Impacts include: 1) decrease community and domestic violence; 2) programs to educate, advocate and assist immigrants in obtaining citizenship; 3) programs to promote basic needs such as food, shelter, clothing; 4) efforts that reduce poverty and the causes of

poverty; 5) promote affordable housing; 6) decrease foreclosure rate; and 7) disaster preparation and relief.

Scholarships

Through the generosity of many families and individuals, the foundation manages more than 55 scholarship funds for the benefit of eligible students. Students benefit from the financial assistance as well as the academic recognition of being a scholarship recipient. Each scholarship fund targets students with different characteristics such as graduation from a particular high school, plans to attend a specific college or selection of a certain field of study such as finance, fine arts, and nursing.
