Our **Fieros In The Village 2017** Car Show was a success in spite of the rain showers that plagued us most of the day. We had 21 entrants: 7 GTs, 4 Formula cars, 4 Coupes, 1 High End GT Restomod, 4 SEs and 1 1984 Indy Pace Car.



4 of the GTs sported upscale engines with the Chevy 3.4 liter V6 being the most popular conversion. This conversion is a very interesting one in that the conservative 20% plus gain in horsepower (HP) and torque leaves most Fieros still inside the design limits of the original 2.8 liter V6 car; this is especially true for the 1988 GT and Formula cars that had better Factory suspensions and brakes than the earlier GT models.

Once you substantially exceed a 20% gain in HP and torque you began to run into the need to upgrade suspensions, tires, wheels, brakes, cooling systems, fuel systems, transmissions, clutches etc.

This is a whole new level of modification and investment.


My White 1985 GT was the only car that definitely fell into the High End Restomod category. This car has a 4.6 liter NorthStar V8 and 300 HP (more than double the 140 Horsepower that came with the original factory V6 engines). The rest of the car is totally rebuilt. Last year we had 4High End Restomods.

This 2017 Fiero Car Show had a total of 4 cars with converted engines as compared to 7 cars last year ... the rain kept some of last year's Restomods safe in their home garages. Over 30% of the 2016 entrants were sporting upscale engines; for 2017 the number was about 20%.

Any of you who know me will realize I am an ardent believer in the Fiero as a Restomod. Our lovely mid engine sports cars would have been in production much longer than 1984 through 1988 if GM had seen fit to put 200 horses in front of the rear axle ... replacing a 2.8 liter 140 HP engine with one that costs about the same dollars and produces close to 200 HP seems like a no brainer. The conversions to engines that have over 200 HP are in another league, cost wise, due to the changes needed for safety, drivability, durability, and handling.

All this talk of modified Fieros should not over shadow the classic crowd for there were many exceptional Fiero classics on display at this year's show.

In fact, the **Overall People's Choice Award** went to a Superb Classic 1988 GT, entered by Rick Jarosz. The following are pictures of Rick, his lovely red 1988 GT and the reward he received:

It's amazing how well the Cadillac 4.6 Fits in the Fiero.




Best Custom Wheels went to Lou Oles for his 1988 Black Formula Fiero.
