 pay equity, asset limits, zoning, EITC



Why does this matter?

"Over the last month we have witnessed a divisive, angry debate over the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program. DACA has become increasingly tied to proposals for radical immigration reforms, but it should not be. DACA is not really about immigration or immigration reform; it's not even really about immigrants. The "Dreamers" are already Americans in every way but legal status. They have lived here, grown up here, gone to school here, and served in the military here. English is their "native" language. At [its] heart DACA is about equality, opportunity and respect."

All young people deserve access to opportunity and the chance to pursue their dreams. DACA is about opportunity and respect. Dreamers are active members of our communities – these young people have grown up in our communities, these young people attend our schools, participate on sports teams, play music with their friends, and work summer jobs. These young people want an opportunity to go to college and access the opportunity our communities can provide. We need policy solutions that honor the deep connections Dreamers have within our communities and provide them with a clear path to citizenship.







Expanding the Circle of Concern

- Don't "otherize"
 - Use language that calls out commonality and humanity
- Make the case for "targeted universalism"
 - A focus on universal benefit with targeted efforts that recognize and remedy inequities may require different strategies in different communities/audiences

Expanding the Circle of Concern

- Using your subject, practice "targeted universalism"
 - State a universal benefit.
 - Where do disparities exist?
 - How will success require different strategies in different communities/audiences?

"Winning in the long term, though, requires getting people to think of the "other" as being inside their circles. That is entirely possible to do, as the abolition, civil rights, feminist, sexual liberation and many other movements have proven. But it takes a complement of cultural interventions alongside the political ones, advanced over five, 10, even 30 years. The cultural project has to establish the stories, images, and archetypes that prime a person to expand rather than shrink the circle of concern. That project requires us to deal with how race is lived in America, not just how it is legislated. How do we widen the circle of concern? Foster interdependence – a shared fate?"

- Tangible and part of lived experience.






Oregon military veterans are much more likely to be homeless than other Americans. VA reports indicate that on any a single night nearly 58,000 veterans are homeless; 57% were staying in an emergency shelter or transitional housing program; and the remaining 43% were living on the street, in an abandoned building, or unsheltered someplace. Additionally veterans are nearly twice as likely as non-veterans to commit suicide. This is a travesty. We need a comprehensive legislative plan to address the needs of our nation's heroes.

Oregon's Veterans deserve opportunity, safety, and stability. Oregon Veterans should have access to services to address their basic needs—from supportive housing for people returning with disabilities or injuries, to rent assistance to help prevent or end homelessness to assistance in buying their first home. Smart investments by the State can help our veterans return with dignity and leverage the federal resources they are entitled to.

One Challenge for Homeownership Advocates

"Homeowners are much more likely than renters to know their neighbors, call the police if there is crime reported in their neighborhood, and to know who their elected officials are. Plus, their kids graduate on time and are more successful than families that rent their homes."

Affordable homeownership provides safety, stability, and opportunity for families. Affordable homeownership is an important part of the housing continuum, and can help families build wealth over time. Access to an affordable place to call home can help provide stability so that kids graduate from high school on time, and families can plan for their future.


The Message Box

Your vision for the community, state, society. A sense of the purpose and goal that drives you to seek the change you are working for. Your aspiration and inspiration.

A clear statement of the problem you are trying to address in a way that everyone can see their stake in addressing the issue.



The solution you are proposing and the principles or outcomes it is designed to achieve.

The Level One Values that underpin the challenge and your proposed solution.

The answer to the "why does it matter" question.

Opportunity Agenda Message Box

Value:

Our nation is strongest when every one of us can contribute and share ideas, and when everyone's basic rights and dignity are respected. The DACA program does just that, enabling young Dreamers to fully participate in their education, work, and family life, and to contribute to our nation's social fabric and economic engine.

Problem:

President Trump's wrongheaded decision to terminate DACA violates our country's core values, and harms our national interest. It represents a doubling down on the divisive bigotry we heard from him after the white supremacist killing of Heather Heyer in Charlottesville.

Solution:

Congress must immediately move forward with practical solutions like the proposed bipartisan DREAM Act and American Hope Act that uphold our nation's values while moving us forward together. Those steps should go hand in hand with the commonsense policies that many cities and states are adopting to ensure that all young people can learn, work, and live their dreams.

Action:

Tell your member of Congress to protect the Dreamers and our nation's future.

Our communities are stronger and more vibrant when we meet our neighbors' basic needs for a stable, affordable place to call home. Homeownership is a powerful tool to help families achieve lasting stability in housing and remain in their communities. Homeownership provides an opportunity for families and individuals to build assets, and it can help address racial disparities in wealth, creating more equitable communities and preventing displacement.

Many Oregonians dream of the benefits of homeownership—today, this dream is increasingly out of reach due to record-high home prices. Even potential homebuyers with moderate incomes who are ready to purchase a home are priced out of many markets: there simply are not enough homes for sale that they can afford. Meanwhile, our already overtaxed rental market is even more burdened as qualified homebuyers must continue to rent.

We can take action to bring this dream within reach for more Oregonians by investing in new affordable homeownership units. Increasing the supply of affordable homes is a cornerstone of the solution to our state's housing needs, and homeownership is a critical part of the housing continuum.

HB 2570A creates a \$25 million revolving loan fund to serve Oregonians with low incomes by developing new affordable homes for sale. The resources would be directed to Oregon Housing and Community Services, who would then offer grants to non-profit organizations across Oregon.
