Child Development at age 8



- Converses at adult pace and level
- Enjoys humor and loves to play
- Takes things apart to see how they work
- Has gains in long term memory and selective attention
- Verbally expresses themselves
- Increased understanding of language and slang

- Growth slows overall
- Increased energy and activity
- Improved hand-eye coordination
- Able to label left and right sides of the body
- Increased awareness of sex and reproduction
- Hormonal activity triggers mood swings



- Sensitive and can be dramatic
- Outgoing and social but can be rude and demanding
- Self-competative and selfcritical
- · Child understands and interprets others' emotions
- Able to regulate their own emotions
- Child experiences fears and anxieties but is less likely to express these to adults

- Outgoing and social; likes to talk
  - Spends more times with friends
  - Prefers same-sex peer play over solitary play
  - Influenced by peer pressure and desires to be accepted
  - Uses tech to connect with peers
  - · Sensitive to criticism and correction
  - · Competitive with siblings
  - Seeks approval from adults; enjoys adult interaction
