Arab American Association of New York (AAANY) New York, NY \$30,000	<i>To support AAANY's efforts to increase transparency around the New York Police Department's surveillance and equipment procurement programs; to expand Know Your Rights and community education activities given changing local and federal policy climates; and to continue to play a bridge-building role between Arab, Muslim, and communities of color on the criminalization of these communities locally and nationally.</i>
Arab American Institute Foundation (AAIF) <i>National</i> \$50,000	<i>To support AAIF to counter anti-Arab and anti-Muslim bigotry by educating individuals and officials about discriminatory and biased policies. AAIF's program includes Congressional briefings and meetings; the #ReportHate Project in several locales; and the publication of key resources on the intersection of civil liberties and national security.</i>
Asian Americans Advancing Justice-Asian Law Caucus (AAJC-ALC) San Francisco Bay Area, CA \$65,000	<i>To support AAJC-ALC's operations, including the work of their National Security and Civil Rights Program, which integrates direct services, policy advocacy, impact litigation, and community outreach and education to increase civil rights protections in a national security, racial justice, and immigrant rights context.</i>
Desis Rising Up & Moving (DRUM) New York, NY \$60,000	<i>To support DRUM's operations, including educating, training, and mobilizing a base of directly impacted communities—mainly low-income South Asian immigrants—around issues of law enforcement surveillance and immigration policies locally and nationally.</i>
Equality Labs <i>National</i> \$120,000	<i>To launch a technology awareness training initiative within Muslim, Arab, and South Asian communities over the next year.</i>

Equality Labs Washington, D.C. \$30,000	<i>To provide project support for the Equality Labs project, D.C. Justice for Muslims Coalition (DCJMC) and its related core areas of programming: expansion of DCJMC, hosting the Muslim Women's Resistance Network, and launching the Muslim Women's Organizing Institute. DCJMC would join Equality Labs as a new project, after having been incubated at the Washington Peace Center since 2015.</i>
Georgia Muslim Voter Project (GAMVP) <i>Georgia</i> \$30,000	<i>To provide operational support for GAMVP to continue and expand programming on non-partisan voter engagement, advocacy, grassroots organizing and their Masjid Organizer Program.</i>
Greater Birmingham Ministries (GBM) Alabama \$30,000	<i>To provide project support to GBM's #StandAsOne campaign, which will be comprised of several coordinated grassroots organizers in the State of Alabama strategically placed at select campaign organizations with the goal of raising awareness on issues impacting intersectional marginalized communities and protecting their rights. The organizing efforts of #StandAsOne will include building a base of social justice advocates within the Muslim community in Alabama, and supporting their integration into the broader campaign.</i>

This year, this will include developing its strategic plan, and formalizing its training programs aimed at increasing awareness and knowledge of anti-black racism in both the American Muslim community and in wider allied communities.</i>

Desis Rising Up & Moving (DRUM) New York, NY <i>June 2017</i> \$2,685	<i>For members of DRUM and allied organizations working to implement "Hate Free Zones" to attend the Mijente conference on expanding sanctuary cities.</i>
Institute for Social Policy and Understanding (ISPU) National <i>July 2017</i> \$10,000	<i>To support ISPU's research for and post-meeting analysis of the 2017 National Interfaith Bullying Summit, which will bring together key representatives of diverse communities to discuss and tackle bullying, particularly of MASA communities.</i>
Muslim Advocates National <i>July 2017</i> \$7,000	<i>To support Muslim Advocates to carry out three regional "Not on Our Watch" convenings and one D.C. based event focused on regional and local coalition building, community and organizational education, and concrete policy change on issues central to MASA communities.</i>

Arab American Civic Council <i>Anaheim, CA</i> <i>August 2017</i> \$6,000	<i>To support the Arab American Civic Council's "Welcome Refugees" campaign that includes community-building events, advocacy and civic engagement trainings, and opportunities for community members to engage with local elected officials to foster dialogue about refugees. The grant will also assist in launching a grassroots and digital advocacy campaign to shift negative perceptions, attitudes, and behaviors towards refugees and immigrants.</i>
Arab Community Center for Economic and Social Services (ACCESS) <i>Dearborn, MI</i> <i>February 2017</i> \$6,000	<i>To support ACCESS's National Network for Arab American Communities to host 10 community teach-ins to provide Arab Americans with the information necessary to understand how recent executive orders concerning immigrants and refugees will impact them and their families, provide with them information on their rights, and connect them with legal resources if necessary.</i>
Asian Americans Advancing Justice-Los Angeles (AAAJ-LA) <i>Los Angeles, CA</i> <i>July 2017</i> \$6,000	<i>To support AAAJ-LA's Community Legal Advocate to meet the growing need to expand education, coalition building, and advocacy campaigns to combat regressive policies impacting Arab, Middle East, Muslim, and South Asian communities in Southern California.</i>
Bus Federation Civic Fund <i>National</i> <i>April 2017</i> \$10,000	<i>To support the April 2017 Youth Organizing Summit, the goal of which is to bring together youth activists and organizers from across the U.S. to convene and unite for social change, with a particular emphasis on protecting vulnerable communities.</i>

Muslim Ban Organizing Grants (\$81,400)

In the summer and fall of 2017, the SRC made a series of grants to support local and regional events and programming surrounding a coordinated national mobilization on October 18th relating to the Executive Order banning refugees and travel by individuals from mostly Muslim-majority countries.
