What happens to your input?

The information collected by the end of September will form the basis of a short report which will be submitted to the Task Force on Justice from 10-12 October 2018 in Freetown. This report will inform the work of the Task Force, as they investigate the scale and nature of the justice gap, and build a case for investment in justice. Their findings will be presented ahead of the 2019 High-level Political Forum on Sustainable Development, the UN's central platform for review of the 2030 Agenda and SDGs.

Think Justice will continue until the end of November. The Task Force will draw upon the ideas and insights shared for its final report and recommendations.
