DVAR TORAH by RABBI S HARRIS

We find at the beginning of Shemos that Hashem gave Moshe three miraculous signs to use as proof that He had appointed him as the redeemer of the Jewish people. One was that Moshe was told to throw his stick to the ground and it became a snake, and Moshe fled from it. Then Hashem told Moshe to 'stretch out (his) hand and grasp its tail.' When Moshe did this, the snake became a stick again in his hand (Shemos 4:3-4).

Following the tragic events of the Second World War, one of the greatest students of the Mirrer Yeshiva in Poland, Harav Zeidel Semiatitsky, travelled extensively to Morocco and different parts of South America to found Yeshivos there, and bring promising young Sephardic students to learn in the U.K and U.S.A. The guiding light for R' Zeidel's efforts was the sign outlined above. He would compare Jewish children to Moshe's stick. If they are never exposed to the beauty of Yidddishkeit, nor nurtured with a Torah Chinuch (education/training) and are, figuratively speaking, thrown to the ground and abandoned, they will be forced to run away. They will not simply be ignorant and indifferent to Torah and Mitzvos – they will become haters of religious life and everything associated with it.

However, if they are carefully befriended, given a Torah Chinuch and shown the pleasant ways of the Torah living, they can develop a 'stick of Hashem' with which miracles can be performed. All it takes is Ahavas Yisroel (love) of their fellow Yidden to teach them Torah and expose them to the beauty of Yiddishkeit.

Ice Lollies, Ice Cream and Reward Cards

As part of our new behaviour management system we have introduced reward cards. These can be earned when the students accumulate achievement points on the system known as SIMS.

20 points allows a student to earn their first reward card, 40 points a second reward card and at 65 points their third reward card is given to them. A third reward card earns the students a £5 youcher

One morning break this half term all girls who had earned their first reward card were allowed out of class 5 mins earlier to go to the hall for a treat and there they received a traffic Ice lolly.

The Zechor Yemos Olom Fellowship Reunion

For the past five years, Torah Umesoroh has been running an intense Holocaust studies programme for mechanchim and mechanchos, known as the Zechor Yemos Olom Holocaust programme. This programme has been offered to mechanchim and mechanchos throughout the USA and Canada and runs for six months, culminating in a trip to Poland which is funded by the claims conference.

In order to qualify for the trip and the certificate, many high quality assignments on the Holocaust and the hashkofo of the Holocaust had to be submitted.

For the first time, in 2014/2015, the course was offered to mechanchim and mechanchos in Manchester and four members of the community were accepted on to the course.

Last November, a re-union was organised for all mechanchim and mechanchos who had undertaken this course since its inception. This took place in New York in the Torah Umesoroh building and its purpose was for everyone to share their resources, ideas and experiences in disseminating Holocaust studies in their respective moisdos across America, Canada and Manchester. Mrs E Levy was one of two representatives from Manchester who travelled to New York to take part in this reunion; the other was a staff member from another school in Manchester

In conjunction with the Zechor Yomos Olom programme, Torah Umesoroh produced a resource book for mechanchim and mechanchos as an aid in teaching Holocaust studies. It was published and given to everyone at the reunion. It will also be offered to school throughout the USA and Canada. Over three thousand assignments were submitted and only forty were chosen. Of those, five assignments were written by two of our members of staff: three by Mrs E levy and two by Mrs R Stefansky.

In addition, all power points that were submitted by both members of staff were put on the CD of resources which was enclosed with the book.




