










During Fiscal Year 2018 we logged 22,486 miles of official travel across the state to educate, mentor, and support Wyoming Congressional Award participants. Our goal: bring the message of service and development to every community in Wyoming!





In June, 42 Gold medalists and 138 family members traveled to Washington, D.C. to represent Wyoming and receive their medals at this year's ceremony. Only California, the most populous state in the U.S., had more gold medalists. Not bad for the least populous state in the country.





Each of this year's 55 service retreat participants logged 35 hours of projects with the U.S. Forest Service and National Park Service in Cody, Sunlight Basin, Yellowstone, and Thermopolis. Additionally, volunteers made 72 homemade breakfast burritos and 65 breakfast sandwiches because we know hard work makes you hungry!
