Many wedding photographer will include these in your wedding photography package or offer a discount if you plan on using them for your wedding day too!

thing you'll want to do is sit down with anyone who will be contributing to your wedding and establish a **budget**.

You'll also want to have a general idea of you guest count, so you can pick an appropriately sized venue.

planner, book them as soon as you can! The earlier you book them the more they can help you plan. (DFTC Events does weddings!)

Pick your **wedding party**! You and your fiance should pick your bridesmaids and/or groomsmen for your day. These people can help you out as you plan your wedding and other pre-wedding festivities.

All the **vendors**! There isn't a specific

order you need to book vendors. I recommend starting with your top priority and working down from there. So if you are dreaming of your wedding photographer, start with them, or if you know you want a killer DJ, book them now! The key vendors in most weddings are caterer, florist, DJ, photographer, and videographer.

Time for wedding dress shopping! You'll

want to start shopping and have dress bought no later than 6 months before your wedding, so you have sufficient time for alterations.

7-10 Days Around 1 week from your wedding day, you should make sure to go get your marriage license. Some states do have a

waiting period between when you pick it up and when you can actually get married,

so make sure you leave enough time!
