MENTOR REFLECTION

"As much as I am teaching Obedi, he is certainly teaching me just as much. He and his siblings find wonder and beauty in almost everything, which has truly inspired me to further reflect on how I view moments in life. For example, it was pouring rain two weeks ago, and I walked into the house and apologized to Obedi for not being able to go on an outdoor field trip. He responded by saying, "That's okay, Chris. HOME MENTORING

The Home Mentoring Program started in 2010 and since this time has been one of the foundations of our work.

The Refugee Response Home Mentoring Program provides one-on-one mentoring to over fifty refugee students in Cleveland, Ohio. The Refugee Response pairs each refugee student with a volunteer mentor from the community to provide meaningful academic and acculturation support to their student. Students spend two hours once a week after school with a mentor over the course of two academic years before completing the program.

Mentors spend time developing a relationship with the student and the family to better understand their individual needs and priorities for support, and submit monthly reflections on students' progress. Mentoring takes place primarily at the student's home, with opportunities to plan excursions of cultural and educational value to the student.

A critical component to the success of this program has been the relationships formed with local schools and school systems. In 2018 the Refugee Response established official partnerships with Lakewood City

Schools and the Cleveland Metropolitan School District to access student scores and information, so that we are able to provide data driven and targeted educational support.



ACADEMIC SCHOLARSHIPS

The Refugee Response continued to

provide scholarship opportunities to 6 students. In 2018 our scholarship students attended St. Joseph's High School and Urban Community School. Scholarships have been supported through the Carfagna Family Foundation and in cooperation with the Geis Foundation and the Catholic Community Foundation.

This year Nay Soe and Htoo Htoo, two scholarship students attending St. Joseph's Academy, were selected by the Cleveland Foundation as Place Makers as a part of an exhibit by local photographer Billy Delfs

After providing mentors to students we saw real results in meeting or exceeding their OELPA* growth targets.

*OELPA is the Ohio English Language Proficiency Exam and is used to measure the English language development of non-native speakers

ADULT TUTORING

"Can your teacher teach me, too?" "Do you have to pay her?" "How can I get a tutor?" If my students, recently-resettled women from Afghanistan, were asked these questions once, they were asked dozens of times. Rana Noormal, Anita Azimi, and I began working together three years ago, but had only been meeting a short time before the persistent inquiries from their friends began. I had met Rana and Anita informally through the Refugee Response who was kind enough to get us started but there was not yet a formal program.

In the meantime, I fell in love. Make no mistake: this is a love story. I bonded very quickly with these warm, intelligent young women and their growing families. I fell in love with their culture and hospitality. I was inspired by their determination to learn English and to gain independence in the U.S. The hours spent with them were the best hours of my week.

Rana and Anita have their driver's licenses now. They can manage doctor's visits, school meetings, and shopping without a translator. Next year they will be eligible to become citizens. Sitting with these young women for a couple hours each week, I have experienced joy and fulfillment beyond anything I've ever known. I've learned that I can do something I didn't know I was capable of, and that I can make a real difference in the world with nothing more than my willingness. I'm convinced that if lasting bridges are to be built across cultures and religions, it will happen like this - woman to woman, one conversation at a time.

In early 2018 the adult tutoring program started with 20 Afghan women who were matched to a tutor, this quickly expanded to reach 40 women by the end of the year. Learners are provided support for a minimum of two years, with many setting individual development goals that include attaining a driver's license and passing the citizenship exam.

In 2019 the program will be expanding to reach additional clients, potentially including adults from Myanmar and the Democratic Republic of Congo.

FOUNDED IN 2010 the Ohio City Farm is powered by the Refugee Response and is located in the historic Ohio City Neighborhood in the near West Side of Cleveland, Ohio.

In 2018 the Ohio City Farm transitioned from a program model to a for-profit business with a robust social mission. Triggered by the loss of federal funding in late 2016, a new vision for the Ohio City Farm was fully implemented in the 2018 growing season. A farm advisory board was established, comprised of professionals in the farm, food and non-profit worlds.

The Ohio City Farm created 11 positions, including 9 resettled refugees. Farm sales totaled \$176,625 accounting for 29.3% of the total operating budget of the Refugee Response.

Significant investments were made to improve the infrastructure of the farm. This included installing an electrical connection, a walk in cooler, an additional high tunnel, a tractor as well as additional material for composting, recycling and attachments for the walk behind tractor. The strength of the farm team and the improved infrastructure led to our highest ever harvest of 38,625 lbs of organically grown produce sold to the Cleveland community.

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REAP the Benefit—Feed the Land

Over 500 guests were in attendance for this year's annual benefit. 21 restaurants served dishes featuring produce from the Ohio City Farm and over \$100,000 was raised for the evening. The Key Note Speaker and Guest of Honor was Mr. David T. Dombrowiak, President and CEO of the Community West Foundation. Community West, apart from being a major supporter of the Refugee Response, was the Presenting Sponsor for our most successful benefit ever.

UPCOMING DEVELOPMENTS

- Launching Teen Response a new program for 30 refugee teens at CMSD's John Marshall High School
- Hosting Cartography an original theatrical production from NYC in partnership with Playhouse Square and Cuyahoga County Public Libraries
- Expanding the adult tutoring program to reach an additional 20 learners
- Hiring a full time community engagement coordinator to support children's education at home and in the community

- Expanding the CSA Memberships to 230 members for the 2019 growing season
- Launching a 4 season growing plan on the Ohio City Farm with the increase in infrastructure
- Moving to a new headquarters based on the Urban Community School campus in mid-2019
- Furthering Collaboration and partnerships with other refugee services providers and beyond
- Continuing to respond to those we serve.
