



COUNTDOWN TO EASTER

Pancake Day, Lent and Holy Week form a journey (or countdown) to Easter Day, which is the biggest Christian celebration of the year. It is a time when lots of people make time to think carefully about their life. For Christians, this means trying to live God's way and remembering all that Jesus did.

Why we have Pancake Day?

Pancake Day is also known as Shrove Tuesday. Long ago, one of the ways Christians prepared for Lent was to use up perishables, including eggs and fats, etc, before Lent began, by making pancakes and feasting on them. Then when Lent began, they would eat less food, or even fast (go without some foods) to help them focus on God and not on other things they wanted.



This tradition has been passed down the generations. This day always falls 47 days before Easter, a date which changes every year. This year Pancake Day / Shrove Tuesday occurred on the 5th of March and Lent began on Ash Wednesday, the 6th of March.

Why is Lent important?

Lent is a period of 40 days (excluding Sundays) and is scheduled in the liturgical year immediately before Easter. Christians use this time to remember the life and ministry of Jesus — particularly when, as a young man, he was preparing for his ministry to come and went into the desert for 40 days to be alone with God. He went without food and prayed. He was tempted away from what God wanted him to do in all kinds of ways, but he resisted this temptation. *You can read the story in the Bible in Matthew 4: 1-11*.



During Lent, Christians replicate this time of preparation, time of being alone with God. Often doing something different such as praying every day, or reading the Bible, or perhaps refraining from something. In this way, we remember Jesus' time in the desert to focus just on God and feel closer to him.

What is Holy Week?

Holy Week is the week leading up to Easter Sunday, beginning on Palm Sunday and including Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Holy Week is the time when we remember with sorrow the events leading up to the crucifixion of Jesus. On Easter Sunday morning sadness is turned to joy with the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus from the dead.



In March Sylvia and I talked about our latest




UCAF tour and in April we celebrated the Network's Easter Devotion with all members taking part.

JOAN'S JOTTINGS

Time to put pen to paper (or fingers to typewriter) for the next magazine. Should have something to report as I turned the big 90 on the 3rd of March. Celebrated with family and friends but also a sad time with the death of my sister, Ethel, in January.

Many thanks to all who offered best wishes and congratulations on my special day.

A few memories from my speech on the afternoon:

- Only heard mother say once that she would have liked four children. Not sure when I arrived if she thought "can't do better than that" or "wouldn't want another like that."
- Worked at the Country Roads Board (now Vic Roads) for 45 years and 3 days.
- Do not like being up front, but don't mind all I can do for the church in the background. Thirty plus years as Treasurer and about 20 as Secretary. Still going but perhaps not as strong.

How can one pick out special events over the 90 years. One was the privilege of taking mother back to England. She left there when she was 12 and we went back when she was 87 (75 years later)... She came from a place called Castleton which is 9 miles from Manchester. As I drove down Manchester Road into Castleton I couldn't believe it when she said "that street has changed it's name" and "Manchester Road didn't have a bend there." She was right. The street had been renamed and the road altered after it was bombed in the war.

We did go back to England again two years later.

These days it amazes me that I am still around. I read in the papers, or hear on TV or radio, all the things you should or shouldn't do. In the heat "keep cool, turn on the air conditioner" (haven't got one). Carry a bottle of water with you (only done that twice). We are also told what we should or shouldn't eat. I eat what I want, when I want and how I want. There are so many things on the 'do not eat' list we won't have to worry much longer. At the rate this is going we will all be dying of starvation.

A few quotes from bloopers in church bulletins:

- Don't let worry kill you off—let the church help
- Miss Charlene Mason sang "I will not pass this way again" giving obvious pleasure to everyone
- Low Self Esteem Support Group will meet on Thursday, please use the back door

A short story from the February-April 1986 magazine:

This little story is about Dr Brackett, a medical practitioner in the southern part of the United States. He devoted his life to serving the poor and would travel miles on cold nights to visit needy souls. He fell in love but his bride-to-be forsook him because, on his wedding night, he failed to appear—he had gone to save the life of a Mexican child. When he died there was a large funeral but people couldn't agree on a suitable memorial and one was never erected. Two people however did not forget, the parents of the Mexican child. Dr Brackett's surgery had been over a clothing store and, being too poor to erect a stone, they took the old brass plate from next to the clothing store and put it on the grave, It simply said:



Amazing Sea Story

The story circulated as early as 1942, and was popularized by John Euller in the magazine *Ships and the Sea* in 1953. A commonly circulated version is as follows:

The passenger steamer SS Warrimoo was quietly knifing its way through the waters of the mid-Pacific on its way from Vancouver to Australia. The navigator had just finished working out a star fix and brought the master, Captain John Phillips, the result. The Warrimoo's position was latitude 0 degrees x 31 minutes north and longitude 179 degrees x 30 minutes west.



The date was 31 December 1899. "Know what this means?" First Mate Payton broke in, "we're only a few miles from the intersection of the Equator and the International Date Line."

Captain Phillips was prankish enough to take full advantage of the opportunity for achieving the navigational freak of a lifetime. He called his navigators to the bridge to check and double check the ships position. He changed course slightly so as to bear directly on his mark. Then he adjusted the engine speed. The calm weather and clear night worked in his favour. At midnight the Warrimoo lay on the Equator at exactly the point where it crossed the International Date Line!


The consequences of this bizarre position were many. The forward part of the ship was in the Southern Hemisphere and the middle of summer. The stern was in the Northern Hemisphere and in the middle of winter. The date in the aft part of the ship was 31 December 1899. Forward it was 1 January 1900.

This ship was therefore not only in four different hemispheres, two different days, two different months, two different seasons and two different years but in two different centuries — all at the same time!


