



STILL WAITING

We don't really have to wait for anything, these days.

Apps downloaded on a smartphone keep us updated as to precisely when the bus is due and which trains have been cancelled or are running late. They can tell us how long our journey by car will take. Technology enables delivery companies to predict to within 30



minutes when the parcel will arrive. We no longer need to look out expectantly for the arrival of a letter from the person we love, since email is instantaneous. Once, an international phone call had to be booked in advance and the family waited for the appointed time to wish, say, a daughter overseas a happy birthday down a crackling line. No need to wait for that now. We're told that we can 'take the waiting out of wanting' if we only sign up for a credit card.

A properly organised life, using all that the most modern technology has to offer, needs no waiting. This is just as well since we're all so busy that waiting seems to be a frustrating waste of time. Instant gratification can be ours.

There's another reason why we try to reduce or extinguish the need to wait. We crave certainty and so we desire control over our future lives. This need to exercise control is borne of fear and anxiety about the unknown. We want to do things that will bring about our desired ends at a time and in a manner of our own choosing.

We are about to enter a mysterious, poignant, wonderful time of waiting in the season of Advent as we wait for the day when we celebrate the birth of Christ on that holy night, when the Word became flesh. Advent is a season of penance as we prepare to welcome the baby who was to become the Saviour of the world.

We can be sure that the 25th of December will arrive. But Advent is also a time for remembering that we are awaiting the Second Coming of Christ: that is open-ended waiting. In this waiting, we must have faith that Christ has died, Christ is risen and Christ will come again. We must give up control and trust in God's perspective of time.

In holding that trust, we might take the opportunity in this season of Advent to trust also that God's perspective includes plans for us. We can have no control over this process but must let our infinitely patient God define our lives according to His unending and unconditional love of us as individuals. Henri Nouwen said that "we wait, actively present to the moment, trusting that new things will happen to us, new things that are far beyond our own imagination, fantasy or prediction. That, indeed, is a very radical stance toward life in a world pre-occupied with control".

It is not easy to let go; there is a fear that, if we do, we might drown, or get lost, or fall off a cliff. In this season of Advent, we might pray for faith that we are held in God's hands and that we may trust the unknown enough to enter it. In the words of Minnie Haskins' poem, to go out into the darkness, and put our hands into the Hand of God, which shall be better than light and safer than a known way.

THINKING CHRISTIANS

Last time I suggested I'd continue thinking about the Old Testament not being a basis for Christianity. I'll change the theme a little.

There is no doubt conservative or fundamentalist Christians will argue with me about much of what I say, (and have done so) but I believe in it. As I said last time the Old Testament is good for its history and lessons of living, but in itself has no basis for Christianity other than a prediction of Christ's coming. Use the Old Testament for inspiration and the New Testament for practical living. The idea that our religion is based on the Bible per se leaves it open for heavy criticism. Christianity is based on Jesus Christ and his life, death, **resurrection** and teaching. If we claim it is based on the Bible then we must accept the whole Bible in all its parts, including the hundreds of Jewish laws, creation accounts and other parts, questionable in reality, as being literally true. The Bible teaches us about living. The Bible did not exist for the first 300 years of Christianity and so was not the basis then. If we claim any part as the basis it would have to be the New Testament but that in itself is based on Jesus and his resurrection. Without the resurrection there would be no New Testament.

The Old Testament is largely the old Jewish laws and the prophets. Why did that get included in the Bible? Well there are parts that are helpful in understanding there is only one God, how God dealt with the old Jews, and how they often disobeyed God, how they appointed Kings when God didn't want them to. Isaiah 53 in particular predicted the coming of the Messiah but the Jews missed it completely or understood it a different way.

Does the Christian life have a basis around the ten commandments? Some emphatically say we do while others say we don't. My opinion is they are not a basis but are useful in shaping how a person, Christian or not, should live. If we live by love as Christ taught then the ten commandments are not necessary. Love over-rules, and dictates our life style. If we ask the question "What does love require of us?" we would find ourselves obeying the spirit of the ten commandments, but we would not need to be know them at all. The first rules are love God and love your neighbour. All else is derived from those two.

It is my belief the Genesis creation accounts have been misinterpreted by those who insist they are literally true. The one good thing about Genesis 1:1 is it states "In the beginning God…" That indicates God was absolutely present at the beginning, even before creation, and was the one who created. The order of creation as written is generally roughly reasonable, but that it all happened in six days is totally unreasonable in today's knowledge of the ever changing cosmos. It was written in terms people of the day could understand and hear that it was the work of God.

Questions I have about taking it literally: Have we reached the seventh day yet? If so what happened on the eighth day? I see creation still happening. Earthquakes are an example of creation still happening in reshaping the earth.

Many will heavily criticise me (and I could be wrong), but I see creation and evolution as being the same thing looked at from different perspectives. Creation can be slow too. The initial few seconds of creation were of an enormous magnitude but I see it now still happening at much slower pace. In my studies I've discovered the Genesis creation accounts can be interpreted in so many ways by different, very serious and committed Christian theologians one gets confused. Perhaps you think I'm confused too. That's OK

The Bible is an essential part of Christianity but is not the source of Christianity. The resurrection of Jesus is the source. Some say the Bible is the inerrant word of God. I'll leave you to draw your own conclusion.

The Catalogue had a double-spread of an idea for children to contribute towards items which would be found in a village: a school, a rudimentary shop, a clinic and a vegetable garden. Each of these cardboard models cost \$15.

One of our members had the idea that we could purchase these models and then make them into a model village which would be displayed at the front of our worship space.

People were then invited to 'channel their inner child' and contribute to the village by making people, trees, chickens, animals, other buildings, a water pump — or whatever their imagination provided.

The original models were small in scale and one of the challenges was making the other items in similar scale – Lilliputian people, for instance!

As our village grew the congregation made monetary contributions in a bowl which was placed alongside it on a small table.

and through these objectives they work to ease the poverty and multiple struggles of people in developing countries.

Thus we have made our annual contribution to TEAR, people have been enthusiastically and generously involved and our worship space has been adorned with our model village.

Thank you to everyone for supporting the combined services with Kent Road that have been held every third Sunday of the month—whilst worshipping at one or the other church, on a monthly alternating basis, has been a bit of a challenge, worshipping together as a larger group is always an enjoyable occasion.

Our second Hymn Sing-along for the year was held on Sunday 28 October—this was well attended and, as usual, Rev Ian Collings provided interesting background stories to the hymns selected and organist, Geoff Anderson, helped us sing along with his excellent skill at playing the organ.

Westgate Flicks continues successfully and we are extremely grateful to Vic (from Vic's Flicks) for all his work in screening the movies and his unique style of entertainment. Our Christmas spectacular, 'Come to the Stable' was a great success with festive food, carol singing with the Stars of Hollywood and great door prizes, etc. The Flicks will be closed in January but will recommence in February on the third Wednesday starting with 'Now Voyager' starring Bette David, Paul Henreid and Claude Rains. The True Meaning of Christmas

Every year we try, but sometimes still fail. We cringe as we feel ourselves about to ask, 'What is the true meaning of Christmas?' It's a question as clichéd as it is grating, as jarring as it hollow. It's a question dripping in piety, prompting a mechanical rejoinder almost calculated to induce a crumbling Victorian sanctimony. 'Jesus in the manger,' the primary voices smugly chant, delighted to be privy to this secret. But, is it?

The first problem with this question is that it allows for only one meaning.

The Christmas of holiday and of family gatherings is good and important. The Christmas of presents chosen and given, of food carefully prepared and gratefully enjoyed is valid and valuable. We enjoy them and look forward to them – they are a part of what Christmas means to us and millions of others – and we shouldn't do away with them in a fit of puritanical fervour.

The second problem is that Christian teachers have little lasting allegiance to their previously professed answer. We teach children all about the stable scene, but then equally talk about the many other things relating to Christmas—which are wonderful and powerful insights, but are patently not about the crib scene. At any Christmas service, no sooner had we heard about the shepherds and the magi than we pivot to think about 'Jesus as light'. If the 'true meaning of Christmas' really is the nativity, then many Christians themselves appear to have little fidelity to the mantra.

Finally, we have the problem of historical accuracy, as our most cherished moments are snatched from our clutches. For example, the Bible makes no mention of Mary and Joseph travelling with a donkey. It's unlikely that a pregnant woman toured the hostels of Bethlehem. Mary almost certainly would have had a midwife. The three kings were not kings and we don't know how many there were. The magi and shepherds never met each other. Jesus was a baby who almost certainly cried and was not 'meek and mild'. If your head is spinning, you might be wondering just what is left of this 'true meaning of Christmas'. It's as if we're on a branch about to snap under the weight of inconsistency. 'Christmas is not about food and family,' we say – whilst guiltily enjoying both. 'Christmas is about the baby Jesus,' we mutter – wondering who will back us up. 'Christmas is about the stable,' we proclaim – hoping no-one will ask how we know.

Our 'true meaning of Christmas' is being assaulted on all sides: so how are we to cope with this? How do children cope with the splintering of their primary school Christmas? How can adults hope to navigate this confusion?

First, we must not treat the gospels as video documentaries. The texts are brimming with symbolism and meaning, and are truly beautiful accounts, but they are not chronicles, diaries or interviews. They have narrative gaps that any storyteller is (rightly) keen to fill in and smooth over. If we look for Biblical birthing details we will be disappointed and doubt the veracity of it all. But if we approach the texts attending to their deep meaning, we can find another truth resonating through the story. Strip away the storytelling requirements and luxuriate in the unalloyed truth. The gospel stories point us straight towards Jesus, and we should let all else gently fade into the background. In another context, it's close to what CS Lewis called the 'deeper magic'.

Second, there is no 'a priori' [deductive] true meaning of Christmas. The story doesn't exist in a vacuum and however ancient, its meaning is always new. Because amid the flurry of angels and bluster of shepherds, there is the truth that Christmas is about Jesus coming to live with, among and in us – pitching his tent amid ours. Christmas means meeting Jesus' life with ours, and it is deeply personal. So we shouldn't fear that the branch is snapping and the 'true meaning of Christmas' is about to be lost. It can't be found in firm allegiance to the nativity or an ascetic crusade on materialism. No, the true meaning of Christmas is in us welcoming and worshipping the Jesus who has come to us.
